When I was a kid, we lived in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, six blocks from Lake Superior. My dad said the we had two seasons. Winter and Fourth of July. Well, in Central Texas, we have two seasons, Summer and New Year's Day.

Needless to say, it is hot and going to get hotter this summer. Please stay hydrated and be careful out in the heat. Be aware of Heat Stroke.

Heat stroke symptoms are: body temperature of 104°; confusion, agitation, irritability, or disorientation; slurred speech or staggering; seizures or coma; sweating, then dry skin; headache: dizziness or lightheadedness; nausea or vomiting; flushed or reddened skin; rapid breathing and heart beat; and muscle weakness or cramps.

If you suspect that someone has a heat stroke, immediately call 911 or take the person to a hospital. Any delay seeking medical help can be fatal. (continued on page 2)

From The Chair (continued from Page 1) While waiting for the paramedics to arrive, initiate first aid. Move the person to an air-conditioned environment -- or at least a cool, shady area -and remove any unnecessary clothing.

Try these cooling strategies:

*Fan air over the patient while wetting their skin with water from a sponge or garden hose.

*Apply ice packs to the patient's armpits, groin, neck, and back. Because these areas are rich with blood vessels close to the skin, cooling them may reduce body temperature. Immerse the patient in a shower or tub of cool water. David Hubbell

Drought and Wildfires

Our current drought conditions create an environment favoring wildfires. Sun City and over 80% of Texas is in some stage of drought (U.S. Drought Monitor). The current drought started in Jabuary, receeded briefly after the extreme cold and snow in February. It quickly came back in drought by mid-March. Currently, Sun City is in serve drought according to the <u>Drought Monitor</u>. Long range forcasts indicate it will continue.

The main conditions that favor wildfires are dry vegetation and winds over 20 mph. These conditions can easily occur here.

A spark can start a wildfire! Be careful with smoking materials, matches, where you park tour car, and more.
