Seeds of Summer

The Bocce Club hosted "Seeds of Summer" on Thursday, August 3rd. Usually, playing bocce is the "big event" when hosting an event, but on Thursday it was the "Seed Spitting" event that took precedence. After eating as many slices of seedless watermelon your tummy could hold (or your bladder), twelve seed-

spitting contestants quickly lined-up for the first “Sun City Bocce Seed Spitting” contest.



Everyone was given a cup of 10 pumpkin seeds which were used in place of watermelon seeds because Steve Mellinger couldn't buy watermelons with seeds. After his long search of traveling to grocery store to grocery store to find watermelons with seeds, he finally conceded and bought packages of pumpkin seed ammo (they worked just as well).

Ken Pardee oversaw the project of creating a “Spitway” or target for the contest. He taped two large plastic table cloths together, and then spray painted two gigantic targets with red bulls-eyes in the center of each. He then took blue spray paint and painted a blue circle around the target. To finish the target, he encircled the outside the blue target with black spray paint. Each circle was given a different point value. The target farthest away from the free throw line received more points. To challenge the “over-achiever spitters”, Ken placed a doggy bowl at the top end of the targets. WHOPPING BIG POINTS could be made if your seed landed near the bowl or inside the bowl!



The judges, Steve, Pat and Ken, stood by ready to record the value of each contestant's seed landing, and cleared the target area for the next spitter. If the seed fell outside the "Spitway", no point was recorded.

Some contestants admitted that they were a little nervous because this was their first spitting event and they didn't want to mess-up. "Relax," says Steve Mellinger and just "spit".

The first spitter up, toes to line, was Anna Ruth and as soon as she spat down the runway, howls of laughter erupted from the crowd. She had broken the ice and tensions were released through giggles and chuckles. Everyone relaxed and was eager to be next in line.



Some participants had quite a time launching their seeds. Some seeds stuck to their lips, making it only a few inches from their feet, while other contestants had no problem launching the little white missiles. They either created an arc and hoped the wind gust would carry it down to the farthest target, or they inhaled deeply, leaned back to achieve maximum force, and propelled the seed down the spitway.

Colene Caravello stepped up to the line. Her cheeks puffed up, her head coiled back and with one mighty heave she launched a seed that hit nearest the DOGGY BOWL! That one seed secured her seat in the top three spitters!



Many techniques were used, but Sherry Nogle believed that the real key to spitting is in the tongue. your tongue, Nogle said. “It Lastly, “You take a deep as hard as you can and through your rolled tongue.”



“Make a taco with acts like a cannon.” breath and then blow bullet the seed

Doug Brumm got so tickled that he almost swallowed his seeds (no one wanted to perform the Heimlich on him, except maybe, Maureen). He finally got serious, and bulleted his seeds down the "Spitway".



Colene Caravello, Lois Hammelman, and Sherry Nogle earned the bragging rights and their names memorialized in the September Bocce Newsletter. Their pictures are also displayed in the Sun City Bocce Bulletin Board. These winners received "Happy Face" buttons to testify to being the Best Seed Spitters in Sun City (or at least the Bocce Club).

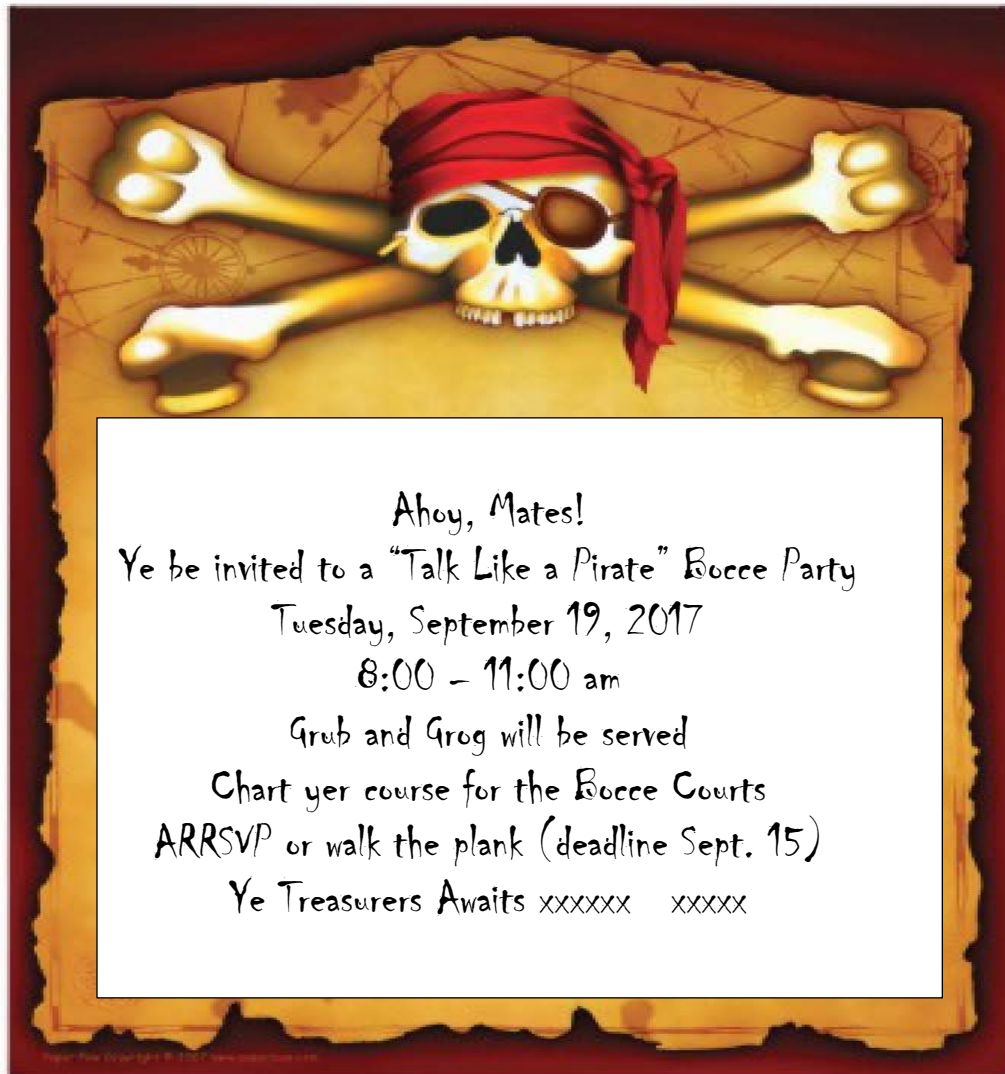
