Visit our new Bird/Wildlife Observation Blind!

The Nature Club financed and constructed (with CA Board Approval) a Bird Blind along one of the new hiking trails in the North Point/Rocky Hollow area. The blind was completed in October, and on November 1, when the new trails were opened to the Sun City community, this bird blind became accessible to the public as well. Many of you may have attended and visited that day, and despite all the foot traffic and commotion, 18 species were spotted on that day alone! (list below)

Please come (or come back) another time when you can experience the blind in solitude, and possibly hear and see additional birds and wildlife (including resident beavers and other mammals that inhabit the area). Although much of the surrounding area has been graded, in season you will experience some beautiful wildflowers, butterflies and more on the hike in (about a mile from either trailhead). We deliberately avoided putting benches and tables at the blind so as not to encourage activity that might frighten the critters. However, there will be several lovely benches and table very close by. Below is something I wrote that might be included on a sign at the blind: a link to the map of the trails, parking, and the bird blind: and below that is a list of the birds seen on Nov 1.

Be still! Animals are here. Listen, look, and sniff the air. Be patient, and alert. Wrens will chatter, Chickadees will repeat their name, and Cardinals will chip, warning of your presence. Once they know you are not a threat, they will continue to go about their business. That's when you can really enjoy and be a part of nature!
