# Animal Shelter of the Month Living Grace Canine Ranch



Welcome to Where Love Resides for adoption-disadvantaged senior dogs. Located in Bertram, the sanctuary offers over 10,000 square feet of residential caregiving to over one hundred dogs with medical, mobility, and emotional challenges.

In 2020, LGCR was founded and organized as a 501(c)(3) charity by Rhonda Minardi, a Georgetown, Texas resident. Rhonda envisioned a Texas where homeless old dogs were scarce in shelters and absent from roadside abandonment. The tragic truth about Texas shelters is that sixty-four percent of older dogs are euthanized for lack of adoption or rescue organization interest. Yet, the ASPCA estimates that ninety percent of those euthanized had treatable conditions. LGCR's mission is to save, serve, and embrace old lives with dignity, love, and respect.

"It's a precarious situation for senior pet companions when a parent passes or becomes incapacitated. At LGCR, we serve as medical caregivers, protectors, and loving parents to those who have devoted a lifetime to humans, asked for nothing, and deserve much more during the final trimester of Life." ~ Rhonda Minardi



On Christmas morning of 2020, fifteen sanctuary sweethearts awoke to new toys, sweaters, and the smells of something delicious emanating from the bunkhouse kitchen. Today, over one hundred dogs of all breeds and sizes will experience Christmas and the New Year feeling loved and renewed.

## OH NO, THE VET!

#### Who is more afraid of going to the vet? You or your dog?

Probably you are nervous, making your dog more nervous. It is your job to make the visit stress-free and comfortable for you, your dog and the vet.

It is difficult and, occasionally, unsafe for vets to examine our overstressed dogs. Keeping your dog calm before he sees the vet helps the vet perform the examination and give the vaccines.

#### Plan Ahead and Be Proactive!

When you first get your dog or are switching to a new vet, ask if you can drop in with your dog for a few minutes, just as far as the lobby, when it is quiet, and you do not have an appointment. Ask if the receptionist can give your dog a treat. Make it a short visit, less than five minutes. Let your dog step on the dreaded scale, greet the receptionist and get a treat - then go out the door. Doing this a few times before a real visit will make the place familiar to your dog, easing stress a little.

Make sure your collar/harness/gentle leader or whatever you use is secure so that your dog cannot slip out of it.

When you arrive for a real visit, leave your dog in the car while you check out the waiting room. Is it empty, full of dogs and other animals, are some dogs barking, whining? Maybe it's not the best time to bring in your dog and start off on the wrong paw. Ask if they will call or text you when it is your turn to come into the facility.

Take your dog for a quick walk to relax him, let him sniff where other dogs have gone already. Caution: If you know the vet will want a urine or stool sample, ask them if this is OK to do.

Do not drag your dog into the building. Keep a happy upbeat voice and ask your dog to "WALK," treating delicious soft treats as needed. DO NOT USE A FLEXI OR EXTENDED LEASH IN A VET OFFICE.

Keep away from other dogs. Some dogs or other animals might be sick, scared, or uncomfortable around your dog. Never assume other dog owners know what to do. After all, isn't everyone's dog friendly? NO! While in the waiting room, focus on your dog, pet your dog, and talk to him to keep him calm. HINT: Do not use the word "COME" to get your dog into the vet's office. That is a quick way to re-train or train your dog to not respond to "COME" since it brought him someplace bad.

# OH NO, THE VET!

Bring special treats for your dog. Once in the exam room, see if your dog will take a treat (stressed dogs often do not accept treats). When the vet tech or vet comes in, ask them to give your dog treats. Ask the vet to get down to the dog's level. Keep your hands on your dog as much as possible to keep your dog comfortable.

When your visit is over, open the door to the lobby carefully and see if it is safe and comfortable for your dog to exit before walking out.

Most vet offices have back door entrances. If you feel entering the lobby either when arriving or leaving is not right for your dog, ask for an escort in or out of the back door.

<u>To muzzle or not to muzzle</u>? If you know your dog will not be "pleasant" to the vet tech or vet, call in advance and ask if you can muzzle your dog before you come in. Your vet will probably appreciate it!

#### When in Doubt - Medicate!

The dog - not you! Some dogs are highly anxious, and vet visits are extremely stressful for them. Call your vet in advance and ask if they can prescribe something before coming in. It just might make the exams easier for everyone.

#### End on a Good Note!

When possible, reward your dog for going to the vet - even if it did not go perfectly. Take your dog for a walk someplace new where he can sniff, have a special treat ready for him when you go home or take him for a special doggie ice cream or pup cup on the way home.

# Cat Corner

## Has your cat partied too much during the Holidays?

#### Your Cat's Weight & Health

Your cat's weight is an important part of their overall health, even if you don't think about it. When your cat is overweight, just like people, its risk of developing serious and potentially life-threatening conditions rises dramatically. Even a few extra ounces can have a significant impact on your cat's overall health and vitality.

#### Health Risks Faced by Overweight Cats

If your feline friend is carrying excess weight, they face an increased risk of developing these serious conditions:

Diabetes

**Arthritis** 

Urinary tract infections

Joint pain

### How To Tell If Your Cat Is Overweight

#### Look for Your Cat's Waistline

Look down at your cat from directly above while he or she is standing. Look for a small indent above your cat's hips, where their waist should be (this can be a bit tricky with long-haired cats). If you can't see their waist or their sides are bulging, your cat is probably overweight.

#### Feel for Your Cat's Ribs

When your cat is at a healthy weight, you should be able to slightly feel their ribs by gently running your hand along their chest. If you can't feel your cat's ribs, your cat may be overweight.

#### Struggling to Jump

Cats are born with the ability to run and jump quickly. If your cat takes several tries to jump up onto their favorite piece of furniture, or if they give up entirely, their weight could be the issue.

# Cat Corner

#### Getting Your Cat's Weight Back On-Track

Your cat's breed, age, and lifestyle all make a significant difference to their nutritional needs. Make an appointment with your veterinarian if you suspect your cat is overweight. Your veterinarian will determine your cat's current weight, as well as what their ideal weight is and how to assist them in achieving their weight loss goals.

If your cat is just a little overweight, you may be able to continue feeding them their regular food but at reduced portion sizes.

If, on the other hand, your cat needs to lose a significant amount of weight, it may be best to switch your kitty over to a specialized food that is formulated to help cats lose weight.

#### Unexplained Weight Gain

If your cat has suddenly begun to put on weight without cause, it's time to see your vet. Unexplained weight gain can be a symptom of an underlying health issue.
