See Top Dog Toxins of 2023

Human over-the-counter medications -

Pain medications (ibuprofen, acetaminophen) are the most common.

Toxic Food —

Chocolate and chocolate-based products. The darker the chocolate, the more toxic.

Plants containing allium, including onions, leeks, and chives.

Macadamia nuts.

Vitis vinifera fruits, including grapes, raisins, sultanas, and currants.

Ethanol in alcoholic beverages.

Foods and products containing the sweetener xylitol. <u>XYLITOL is found in</u> <u>some Peanut Butter</u> brands. <u>Check your labels!</u>



Toxic Human prescription medications —

Antidepressants

ADD and ADHD drugs

Benzodiazepines and sleep aids

Birth control medications

ACE inhibitors

Beta-blockers

Thyroid hormones

Cholesterol lowering agents

Toxic Outdoor Plants —

Sago palm

Lilies

Plants containing **cardiac glycosides** (e.g., dogbane, foxglove, milkweed, kalanchoe, lily of the valley, and oleander),

Blue-green algae found in stagnant, warm water.

Toxic indoor plants —

Spring flowers (e.g., daffodils, hyacinth, and tulips)

Kalanchoe

Plants from the Araceae family (e.g., philodendron, pothos, peace lily, calla lily, dumb cane, arrowhead vine, mother-in-law's tongue, sweetheart vine, devil's ivy, umbrella plant, and elephant ear)

English shamrock, rhubarb (leaves), and tropical star fruit

Corn plant/dragon tree

Household toxins -

Traditional cleaning agents can contain toxins such as bleach, ammonia, chlorine, phenol, isopropyl alcohol, and formaldehyde, all of which are potentially harmful to your dog.

Other types of household toxins include rodenticides, chemical pesticides and insecticides, glue, ethylene glycol (antifreeze), and automotive products (e.g., windshield cleaner fluid or brake fluid).

Insecticides —

Most insecticides used around homes and yards are basic irritants to dogs and cats and can result in clinical signs of drooling, nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea. Rat bait is poisonous to dogs, but bromethalin is especially deadly.

Recreational drugs —

It's important to realize that THC levels in cannabis are higher than ever before. CBD products for dogs do not contain any notable levels of THC so don't fear using CBD products that are specifically designed for dogs.

If you know or suspect your pet has ingested a toxin of any kind, call your veterinarian, the nearest emergency animal hospital, the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center hotline at 888-426-4435, or the Pet Poison Helpline at 855-764-7661 immediately.

Are Christmas Trees Safe For Cats?

As pretty as your Christmas tree is, it can be dangerous to your cat if he eats some of it."Live Christmas trees are not toxic to any animal brushing past them," Dr. Cunningham told The Dodo. "Rather, the ingestion of branches, needles or water in the tree stand can cause illness." Here's why Christmas trees can be bad for cats:

Tree chemicals and sap

Christmas trees contain chemicals called terpenes, such as pinene, which are toxic to cats. These chemicals are what give pine trees their classic Christmas-y smell.

"Most varieties of trees (whether pines or firs) contain these toxic terpenes," Dr. Cunningham said.

When cats eat part of a Christmas tree or sap, they can show symptoms such as:

- Lethargy
- Vomiting
- Diarrhea
- Lack of appetite
- Muscle weakness
- Drooling
- Unusual breathing

Needles

Pine needles have been known to puncture the intestinal lining because they're so pointy, leading to internal injury when ingested.

Water

Christmas trees need water to stay fresh throughout the season, and you probably add some preservatives to the water so your tree lasts longer, too. But if your cat drinks some of the chemical-filled water, he could get sick.

Pine needles and sap can also get into the water, which can cause problems if your cat takes a drink.

And if you don't change the tree water frequently, it can develop bacteria that can be harmful to your cat, too.

"Standing water can also grow harmful bacteria or mold that can cause digestive distress if ingested," Dr. Cunningham said.

Fertilizers

Some trees may be treated with fertilizers, pesticides and preservatives before you buy them, which can be poisonous to cats.
