


Spring Is Rattlesnake

NEW! Pet Club Refund Policy Effective March 1, 2024

There are <u>NO</u> refunds for any tickets purchased for events or dog training classes after the time of purchase.

All Dog Training Classes:

If you purchased a ticket from the "ticket" system online or at the Member Services Office and you wish to cancel for any reason, there are <u>NO</u> refunds. If you want to re-sell your ticket, contact the Lead Dog Trainer. After the ticket sales end, you will be provided with a wait list. It will be up to you to contact someone on the list to give or re-sell the ticket. Tickets cannot be sold to anyone who is not on the list. Seller must notify the Lead Dog Trainer of the person who received the ticket or if you choose not to sell your ticket.

All Events:

If you purchased a ticket from the "ticket" system online or at the Member Services Office and wish to cancel for any reason, there are <u>NO</u> refunds. You can sell your ticket to any Pet Club Member. Seller must notify the Special Projects Leader of the person who purchased the ticket.

If you wish to not re-sell any ticket you purchased, it can become a donation to the Pet Club.

March 6, 2024 General Meeting. Guest Speaker:

Officer Angela Jones, Georgetown Animal Services

Officer Jones gave a great, fun, informative presentation of what the Georgetown Animal Services does. She fielded many questions and here are three that stood out.

Extended (Flexi) Leashes: Are these considered legal?

Answer: NO If your dog is involved in any incident while on an Extended Leash, it is considered an "animal at large" (not in control) and you can be cited. A 6ft leash or less is required (Chapter 7.01, Definitions) for your dog to be considered under your control. Extended leashes are also dangerous to the handler. Your dog can more easily pull someone down or get itself wrapped around your legs.

Dog and Cat Licenses: It is a City Ordinance that all dogs and cats must be licensed. It is FREE to anyone 65 or older, one pet per person. If your pet ends up at the shelter and cannot be ID'd through a chip or a collar with tags, it will be available for adoption in only 3 days. If they do have identification, they are held for 7 days. You can acquire a dog or cat license online or at the GTAS or WILCO animal shelters. Proof of rabies vaccine is required to apply for a license.


Loose Dogs and Cats: Sun City's HOA Pet Ordinance is more strict than the City of Georgetown's. HOA rule: "Dogs must be on a leash at all times whenever outside of a fenced area. All dogs must be controlled so as not to interfere with or pose a threat to any Person or other animal, whether wild or domestic."

"No pets will be allowed to roam free in common or residential areas."





Identifying Poisonous Lilies

Some lilies can be extremely dangerous to cats—even just exposure to their pollen can lead to acute kidney injury or toxicosis. Learn which lilies pose the most risk for your feline friend:

Exposure to these lilies can lead to acute kidney injury. The most common clinical signs to watch out for include vomiting, anorexia, and depression.





Peruvian Lily (Alstroemeria spp.)

(Convallaria spp.)

Lily of the Valley

Calla Lily or Trumpet Lily (Zantedeschia spp.)



Peace Lily (Spathiphyllum spp.)



Flame Lily

Exposure to these flowers does not result in acute kidney injury but can still make your pet sick.

Call your veterinarian or the ASPCA® Animal Poison Control Center if your cat has any exposure to a lily. It is imperative that an accurate identification is made to determine toxicity risk and treatment needed, so take pictures of the flowers, stem, and leaves to help experts identify the plant.

Building Confidence

Five Tips to help insecure, fearful, or submissive dogs gain confidence and improve their quality of life in our world.

- 1. <u>Eliminate scary triggers</u>. Identify what scares your dog. Once you know, you can start to help him. The first step is to eliminate his exposure to scary objects, sounds, and sights. Eventually you will slowly re-introduce your dog to desensitize him at a later time. (See #5)
- 2. <u>Make everyday life predictable</u>. Work on keeping his routine the same, every hour, every day and every activity. Consistency is vital for a calm, relaxed dog. By doing this, your dog's arousal and fear will be lower, and he will be more able to accept what life throws at him. Always talk to your dog in a calm, soothing voice (not baby talk) to build his confidence in you so he understands that you are in control of situations.
- 3. <u>Build your dog's trust in you</u>. You are his guide; you are the person who will help him learn that life is unpredictable but you can manage it together. Don't rush him on a walk; let him sniff to get relaxed. Don't raise your voice near or at him for wrong behavior. Respect your dog's body language and allow him more control in his own life.
- 4. <u>Do simple training at home</u>. Training = confidence. When a dog knows what you want, he can do it. If he has no idea what you want, he will often do the wrong thing. If he wants the food dish put down, he has to SIT. If he wants a treat, he needs to go DOWN. Doing little training sessions (1-2 minutes) throughout the day engages your dog and builds confidences in himself and you.
- 5. <u>Set up scary triggers carefully</u>. Life is unpredictable, and we cannot always expect it to go perfectly. Always have a Plan B, Plan C and, yes, Plan D! If you get stressed, so will your dog. If you show fear, so will your dog. Keep the 'scary" triggers at a distance and relax and direct your dog correctly. Praise him for being relaxed and accepting the trigger without fear.

The Pet Club can help you with fearful, insecure, or submissive dogs and show you how to progress your dog to Step 5 in the correct manner. Doing this incorrectly can make the issue worse. Just ask for help. The process of successful desensitization varies from dog to dog and from fear to fear. A dog that shows insecurity, fear or lack of confidence needs a gentle hand from the owner and lots of patience, but it is worth it.

How To Ensure <u>Both Residents</u> of a Household are Members and Receive Pet Club Information


