
Our club is growing exponentially year over year. And, with that growth come problems and complaints. As is typically the case, many of the complaints have been made by those who did not show up for the meeting.

Sun City Team Medals at Texas A&M Pickleball Tournament

Texas A&M University hosted its 1st Recreation, Parks and Tourism Sciences (RPTS) Pickleball Tournament on Sunday, 15 November 2015. The event attracted sports enthusiasts from local and surrounding communities for tournament play that included age and skill level bracketed pickleball competitions. There was no need to worry about inclement weather as matches were played indoors on 12 beautiful courts set up in the university's newest gym (PEAP - opened in 2013).

Three of Sun City's own participated in the tournament – Mary Payne, Barb Patterson and Stan Payne. Mary and Barb partnered to bring home the silver in women's doubles. In a match for the gold, they won their first game, lost the second 13 to 15, and ultimately lost the third game in a fiercely fought battle.

This tournament enabled students in the Recreation, Parks and Tourism Sciences class to gain experience with the logistics of planning, organizing, and implementing management skills in a real life setting. This was one of several non-profit venues they support throughout the semester to further hone their skills and prepare for their futures.

The Paddles and Balls Are Changing

DON'T PANIC YET

By now you may have heard that the USAPA is revamping their testing approving paddles and balls for sanctioned play. And you may have heard that certain balls and paddles will not be approved. Most of what you've heard is probably right, but **DON'T PANIC.**



First of all, the USAPA is doing a great job and we are very thankful for them and their efforts.

What is happening, as you all know, is that **pickleball is growing faster** than anyone ever thought it would or could. And because it is growing so fast it is attracting the attention of companies big and small who are **trying to create new equipment** that will or could fundamentally change the game as we know it.

When pickleball was invented, the creators built a great game with rules and equipment that were designed to **keep** an even balance between offense and defense. Their hope was that neither side of the net would have any distinct advantage over the other side.

That is why we have a **"double bounce rule"** and an **underhand serve** and a **non-volley zone** that somebody mysteriously decided to call a kitchen. That is why paddles must not have a gripping surface and can only be a certain overall size.

Until now the USAPA has used only a very limited amount of tests to approve balls and paddles, and it was pretty easy to pass those tests. Now manufacturers are coming up with all kinds of new equipment that pass those tests, but some of the new paddles and balls were changing the fundamental game.

So the USAPA has put some additional tests into their approval process and given manufacturers until May 2016 to get their stuff within the new guidelines. This will help keep our great sport as it was intended to be.

So what does this mean right now to you? Virtually nothing!

The vast majority of paddles already on the market will be just fine. And if you've heard that our old reliable Jugs Indoor Balls will not be approved after May 2016, that is correct. But Jugs is working diligently to get their ball updated and within the new specs. So relax. What you will see is a new Jugs ball as well as all the other balls that will still bounce great on any surface, but it will also do all the new stuff too. From a playability standpoint, we probably won't even be able to tell a difference.

So the USAPA is doing a great job of trying to prevent troubles before they occur rather than wait until it is too late. That is a good thing for all of us.


Twas the night before Christmas, when all through Sun City, not a player was stirring; it's really a pity.

When out on the courts there arose such a clatter, Nancy sprang from her bed to see what was the matter.


Away to the window she flew like a flash, tore open the shutters and threw up the sash.

Despite their concurrence, the CA response ("Let's table the issue.") was most frightening.




The first will recommend a fair court schedule for all; the second will alert the community of the issues with pickleball.
