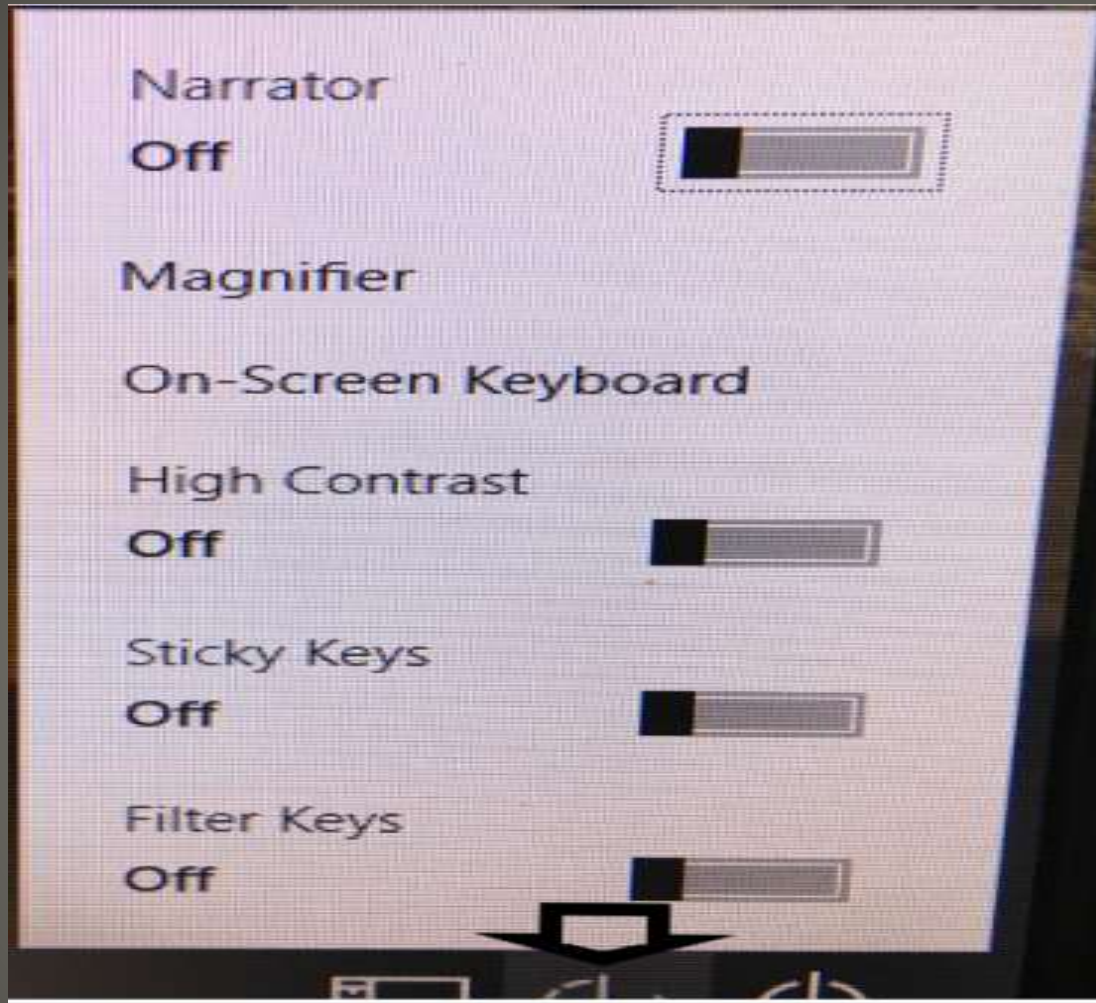

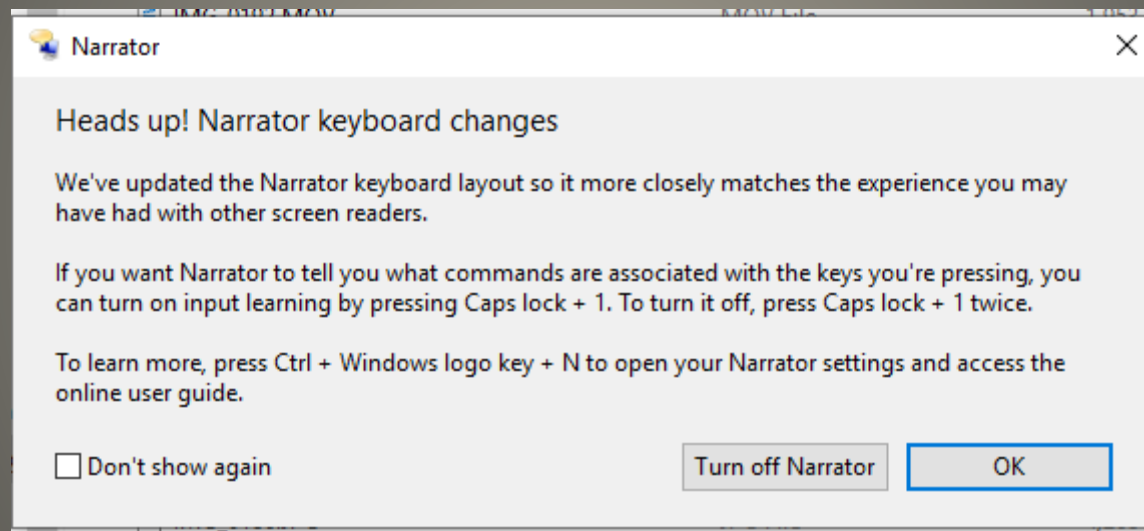


Ease of Access

Use high contrast mode

Applies to: Windows 8.1, Windows 7

If it's hard to read text on your screen because you need more color contrast, you can turn on high contrast mode.

Note

- To turn high contrast on or off from the keyboard, press **left Alt+left Shift+Print Screen**, then select **yes** or **no**.
- In Windows 10 and Windows 8.1, you can turn on high contrast from the sign-in screen. Select the **Ease of Access**  button on the sign-in screen, and then choose **High Contrast**.

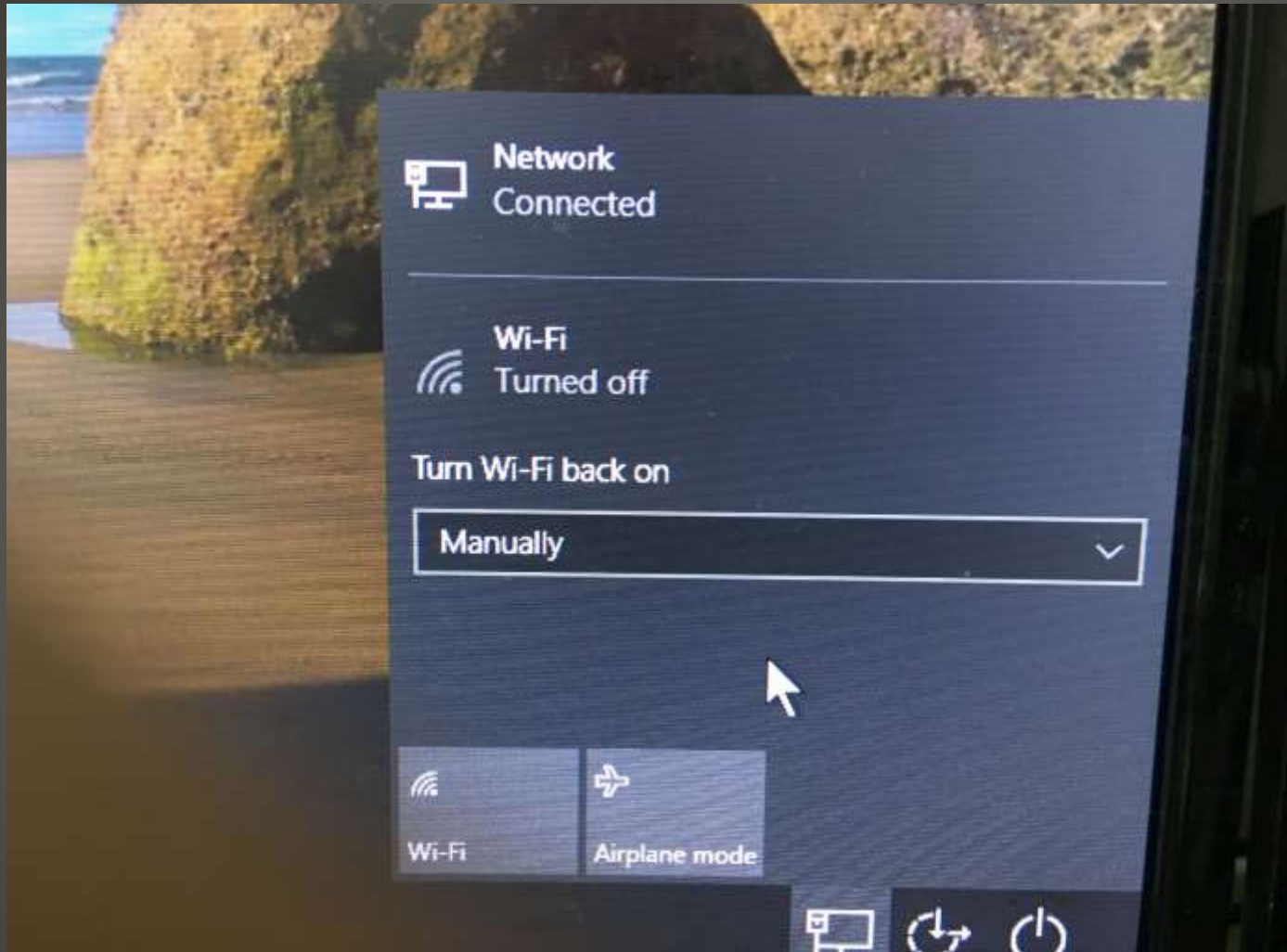
High Contrast

- **Sticky keys** is an accessibility feature of some graphical user interfaces to assist users who have physical disabilities or help users reduce repetitive strain injury (or a syndrome called the *Emacs Pinky*). It serializes keystrokes instead of pressing multiple keys at a time, allowing the user to press and release a modifier key, such as Shift, Ctrl, Alt, or the Windows key, and have it remain active until any other key is pressed.

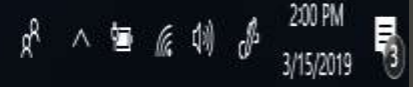
Sticky Keys

- **Filter Keys** is a Microsoft Windows accessibility feature that allows the computer to ignore brief and repeated keystrokes that may be caused by slow or inaccurate finger movements. Tip: The **Filter Keys** feature can be enabled and disabled through the Accessibility Options or Ease of Access Center in the Windows Control Panel.
