


Why this SIG? And what is it all about?

What's it all about?

- It is intended to explore the specific photographic genre of Travel Photography
- Like other specific categories, Landscape, Street Photography, Portraiture, etc., there are certain elements that ought to be present in the image
- Not all photographs from our travels are necessarily Travel Photo
 - They document where we were
 - They remind us of the experiences we had
 - They are primarily for us
- A "good" Travel Photo is for others
 - It is meant to convey the essence of a place, a history or culture to others






Travel Photography can encompass many different categories of images

This SIG is intended to explore Photo Travel as a specific genre with the hope of improving our ability to "see" these compositional elements so that we can add an additional dimension to our photography when traveling.

Format for this SIG

- We will meet once a month, using Dropbox for Photo submissions
- This is not a competitive SIG
 - No voting or scoring of images
- We will have 2 sections each month
 - One for Comments and Critiques (CC), where the photographer asks for suggestions
 - One for Simply Sharing (SH)

How are we going to evaluate or critique the images if we a new to Photo Travel category?


I'm suggesting we use the PSA definition of Photo Travel.



While I prefer the more "artistic" definition quoted earlier, the advantage of using the PSA definition is that it comes with judging guidelines. Although most of us may not be interested in competition or exhibition, these guideline can act as a framework for our comments and critiques of each other's images.

Opinions and Comments

- I think that Travel Photography, more than any other field, is very personal.
- The photographer was trying to capture a feeling or a moment that caught their attention.
- In the end, it's their opinion that matters most.





• A Photo Travel image expresses the characteristic features or culture of a land as they are found naturally. There are no geographic limitations. Images from events or activities arranged specifically for photography, or of subjects directed or hired for photography are not permitted. Close up pictures of people or objects must include features that provide information about the location.

• Techniques that add, relocate, replace or remove any element of the original image, except by cropping, are not permitted. The only allowable adjustments are removal of dust or digital noise, restoration of the appearance of the original scene and complete conversion to greyscale monochrome. Other derivations, including infrared, are not permitted. All images must look natural.

The following slides contain the specific statements within the definition and an explanation of that guideline.

"A Photo Travel image expresses the characteristic features or culture of a land as they are found naturally."



"If the image is of a landscape, the image must have some identifiable feature for a person to recognize i.e. **characteristic features.**"

This image does not meet that guideline. It could be an agricultural valley anywhere in the world.

"A judge does not need to know where the location is, however, the image should have features that are unique and recognizable if the site were to be visited"



This applies to cityscapes as well



You could crop that to remove some of the trash, but you can't remove it .


"In Photo Travel the image must tell the travel story."

But we still want images that demonstrate good photographic elements; like composition, sharpness, and focus.



This image might have some of the necessary elements of a good Travel Photo, but it simply is not a good photo. Nothing is in focus, and although one isn't meant to remove objects, the towers are so out of place they are overly distracting.

"All images must look natural."

"This is by far one of the most important sentences in the PT Definition. Always ask yourself does the image look natural. It should not be over saturated nor over sharpened "



"Always ask, "does it look natural?""




"I wish to emphasize that we cannot expect the images in Photo Travel to be of the same standard as we find in PID (digital images) or PPD (print)."



"Photo Travel is not about images taken in the best light, perfect composition or models being directed—such images belong in PID or PPD. Photo Travel is about reality, the PTD (travel) was founded specifically for this kind of image, to show things as they really are and not like we wish they were."
