From the Ambassador

I don't know if I've mentioned this before, but the USAPA sponsors a Google Groups 'Ambassadors Forum'. This is a forum, open to all pickleball ambassadors, where we can post questions and share ideas with other ambassadors around the country. The day after I submitted my July column to Kitchen Talk, this question was posted on the forum by an ambassador in Maine:

"Ref announces score, receiver's partner raises both paddle hand and other hand in the air. What's the call?"

Coincidentally, this was the topic I'd originally picked for my July column. So, now that we're into September, what do you think the call should be? I'll give you a hint. Rule 4. I.2., states:

"Doubles. When calling the score in doubles, the referee does not have to wait for the receiver's partner or the server's partner to be ready. It is the receiver's responsibility to signal not ready for his or her partner."

While the rule seems pretty explicit, the original question posed may have left out some important facts. Was there a 'ball on court' or other distraction? Was he or she asking for a time out? Had an incorrect score been called? Those are all valid reasons for stopping play. If, however, the partner just wasn't ready, the server could serve the ball and play would begin. If the receiving team then stopped play, claiming the partner wasn't ready, it would be a fault on them and a point awarded to the serving team. Here's a link to an excellent example of this happening in the Men's Pro Doubles bronze medal match at the US Open. The referee is Byron Freso, a well-known 5.0 player and expert referee. The call comes at about the 30:20 mark.

That's exactly what should occur in sanctioned tournament play. However, in the social atmosphere that most of us play in, we wait until both opponents are ready (maybe do a little trash talk) and then serve the ball. After all, it's all about "Fun, Friends, and Fitness."

Next Beginner Mentoring Class Starts 10 September. The next session of the Beginners' Mentoring Program will run on Saturdays from 11 am – 1pm, 10 September - 8 October 2016 on Courts 5 and 6. The program is designed for players who have completed the Introduction to Pickleball class, joined the Club and wish to improve their basic pickleball skills. Before completing the program, players will demonstrate *basic* shot strokes – forehand, backhand, volley, overhead, and the serve; be able to conduct a short rally with players of equal ability, and be familiar with court positioning in doubles play. The goal is to enable participants to develop the skills to more confidently participate in Club Time play, while having fun and enjoying the social aspects of the game. If you are interested in this program and can **commit to attending all scheduled classes**, which are conducted on 5 consecutive Saturday mornings, contact our Club's Player Development Director, **Peg O'Toole** to register.

Skills and Drills with Simon, Thursdays from 11 am – 12 pm. This past week, the Club resumed its weekly 1-hour open drills session on Thursday from 11 am – 12 pm for novice players who have either completed the Mentoring Program or have been playing pickleball for 3 or more months. Each week we introduce several drills with a focus on specific pickleball shots and techniques. All you have to do is show up on Courts5 & 6 with your court shoes and paddle. Here is the schedule for this month.

29 Sept 2016	Overhead Smash, Defending Against the Smash, Drop Shots

Simon is Getting Company. The Board just approved purchase of a second pickleball throwing machine for the club. "Simone" is actually a Pickleball Tutor Machine that is about half the size of Simon and weighs in at just 29 pounds. The new machine can hold up to 125 pickleballs and is oscillating to randomly fire side-to-side shots. It is customizable, allowing the operator to choose from a high lob, a short dink or a quick, direct fire at speeds up to 50 miles per hour. Best of all, the Tutor Machine accepts both indoor and outdoor balls. More details on "Simone's" use will be announced to the club membership as soon as the machine comes in and procedures are established.

New Rules on Pickleballs Coming on 1 October

"Chuck, is that the new ball?" This is one of the most frequently asked questions I hear... especially when I pull a different colored ball out of my bag. As most of us have heard, there are supposed to be new rules governing the balls we play with. In fact, the new rules have already been written and will go into effect on October 1, 2016.

The next question I get is, "Why all the changes?'. Well, according to the USA Pickleball Association Board, "It became apparent that the ball specifications were insufficiently specific and allowed for too much ball speed and bounce. In order to preserve the traditional nature and character of the game and preserve the skills traditionally required to play the sport, the Board determined that the tolerance of the specifications needed to be tighter and the tolerance descriptions more detailed, resulting in the rule changes."

Sample Variety of Balls Currently on the Market

Effective 1 October 2016, any balls not meeting the new specifications will be removed from the list of USAPA approved balls. Here is a list of balls that we know will NO LONGER be approved. Others will be tested between now and October.

Balls No Longer Approved by USAPA After 1 October 2016

Hangzhous Yihao – MNBALL (lime-green)
Jugs Bulldog (white, green)
Mach-Z (white, yellow, red, green)
Monarch:Outdoor Pickleball (yellow)
Indoor Pickleball (yellow)
Onix Sports: 503 (outdoor) (white, yellow, orange)
Pure Outdoor Pickleball (yellow)
Pickleball Now "Indoor Ball" (green)
Uniker Sport Ace 40 (yellow)
Wilson "Neon Flare) (neon green)

Note that large-hole balls are customarily used for indoor play and the small-hole balls are customarily used for outdoor play. However, all balls are acceptable for indoor and outdoor play.


Fred's Corner (One Man's Opinion)

What Happens If...?

If you've had the opportunity to play pickleball indoors, perhaps at the Georgetown or Cedar Park Recreation Centers, you've likely played with portable nets. These net systems usually include a horizontal bar that may include a center base at the bottom of the net. So, what happens if, during play, the ball hits one of these obstacles? According to paragraph 12.J.5 of the International Federation of Pickleball Tournament Rulebook...

If the ball hits the horizontal bar or the center base before going over the net, it is a fault.




Figure 1. Still in Play.

If the ball goes over the net and then hits the horizontal bar (Figure 1), the ball is still in play.

If the ball goes over the net and then hits the center base (Figure 2) or the ball gets caught between the net and the horizontal bar (Figure 3) before touching the court, it is a let and must be replayed.

A Bit About Fred...


