FEDERATION RULES – (As modified for Sun City Play)

- 1. The initial pallino thrower always throws the first bocce ball.**
- 2. Each succeeding ball is thrown by the team that does NOT have the ball closest to the pallino.**
- 3. A team whose ball ties the opponent's closest ball must throw again.**
- 4. The team closest to the pallino only throws if opponents have thrown all 4 balls.**
- 5. Balls may be bounced off or played against sideboards.**
- 6. If a player throws wrong color ball, it is replaced with a correct color ball after the ball comes to rest.**
- 7. If a player throws when the other team should throw, the ball is removed from play.**
- 8. There are no "kiss" points, so a "kiss" only counts as one point**

What I Remember of the Early Years of Bocce

I started playing Bocce in the year 2000. Back then I was a member of the Visual Arts Club and one day I took a walk behind the building and found the bocce courts. Back then the courts were not bounded by cement with a rubberized lining, but with wooden two by six boards. The boards were not exactly six-foot long, so they had to put them end to end with a vertical board. It was used to hold them together with nails. To visualize the problem back then, I will attempt to use the alphabet. Think of throwing a ball like the capital letter K as in a back shot off the left bank. You assume if you throw the ball at say a 40 degree angle it should do the same when coming off the wall. The wood was a bit weathered. If you looked down the length of the wall, some of the wood stuck out a bit like a capital D. The wood was bowed out and at times you would hit the end of a piece of wood and instead of a K you got an upside down capital L. The ball went straight across the court to the other side.

Three or four years after I joined the Bocce Club, I became President. As President, we were assigned a position on the Sports Committee. One of the things I did on the committee was to ask to fix the Bocce courts. One of the members on the Bocce board talked to a Sun City Bocce member in Arizona. They recently improved their courts and gave us their estimates and costs and materials they used. I passed that on to the Sports Committee and the cost was too much. No improvements for our courts!

A few years later, a resident got approval for the military memorial. I was told that when they were in the planning stages that same resident looked at our courts and decided they needed improvement because they were too close to his planned memorial and our courts might make the memorial look bad, plus they couldn't move the bocce courts anywhere else.

I don't remember when this happened, but we had what I think was outdoor carpet on the courts. The carpet had a rubber or plastic base. During the summer rain water would get under the carpet and when we had three or four days of plus ninety degrees, the carpet would billow up and hide almost half the ball from view. We complained to maintenance, but they did little to help. So, one day someone took a knife to the carpet, but then we had ruts in the carpet.

Next, we went to a carpet that was described as artificial putting green. It was like astro turf, but the grass blades were thinner to imitate Bermuda grass. They added material which I think was a combination of tiny rubber beads and sand. The material was raked in half inch at a time until the grass blades were just visible. We added a large broom and a water filled roller to maintain the surface of the courts. Someone built a ramp so we could get the roller up and in the courts.

This is how I remembered the bocce courts. Today, they are much better, but there is always room for improvement.



The Bocce Club was saddened to hear that Gail Davis passed away last week. Many of our members knew Gail and remember what a fun person she

was. Gail was the past Social Director of the Bocce Club.
