October is my favorite month to play Bocce. While everyone else is thinking pink for breast cancer awareness month, I'm thinking life more abundantly – and Bocce is a part of that. As a breast cancer survivor, I appreciate the 'think pink' effort to confront this disease, but living each day without dwelling on the 'survivor' stigma is more important to me. Here in Sun City, that is an easy achievement. My husband and I moved here from Colorado three years ago and began playing Bocce with our neighborhood on a regular basis. I love the courtyard setting, the competition and most importantly, the camaraderie playing Bocce offers. It's just a lot of fun.

Of course, I wasn't thinking about Bocce when I found a lump one morning in my breast. A week later I had confirmation, a couple weeks after that my first surgery. My diagnosis was pretty dire and this was the beginning of a long and tumultuous time for me and my family. I would ultimately have several surgeries and chemotherapy, and learn I had a BRCA I gene that made my chances of re-occurrence skyrocket. We then discovered that my daughter had the same gene. She chose a proactive approach of combating the disease by having the same procedures I did before she developed cancer. The process for both of us took three long years.

To any women reading this, I would tell you to make sure you self-examine regularly and get those recommended tests done as well. If anyone finds a suspicious lump or bump, get a diagnosis quickly. It can and will save your life.

I've been cancer-free for more than seven years now and am still grateful to God every day. So, this month you'll see me on the Bocce courts enjoying myself. The heat of the summer is gone and the leaves are turning. It's beautiful in the courtyard. Come join me!

God Works in Mysterious Ways

Rick and I are native Texans. He was transferred several times in his career that took us away from Texas for 20 years. Our last stop in Oklahoma was, at first, met with disappointment on my part, wanting to be back "home". God had other plans and I kept asking Him to enlighten me as to His plan for me. I met a wonderful older woman (Eula) at our church in Ada. She was in remission from her cancer but after a while it was back and I offered to drive her to the doctor since we had become friends. I never knew anyone personally that had cancer, so knew nothing about what to do, but I soon learned. I decided this was why I was there – to help my friend, take her to chemo, radiation, and tests.

On April 1, 2013, our youngest daughter, Jennifer, called me to say she went in for a follow-up mammogram. She was only 36 years old, but

the year before found an unusual spot on one breast and her doctor recommended the first mammogram just as a precaution, and thus, a baseline for future mammograms. That spot was nothing and went away. The radiologist on that April 1st, found a tiny spot that wasn't there in the baseline and recommended a biopsy. When Jennifer called that day, I had a sinking feeling but, trying to alleviate her fears, told her it was probably just a benign fibroid cyst that the women in our family were prone to have. The biopsy was scheduled for April 8th and I drove down from Oklahoma, where we were living at the time, to be with her and Jeremy, our son-in-law. It was a couple of days later that Jennifer called me again with the news. It was ductal carcinoma. Cancer. How? Why? No one in our family has ever had cancer. She's only 36 years old and her daughter is only 10. Oh, how I wanted to jump through that phone line and put my arms around my baby to protect her! That's what mothers are supposed to do - protect their children. Instead, when I hung up the phone, I cried and prayed for an hour until Rick got home from work and then we cried some more and prayed a lot more.

The following week, Jennifer had an appointment with an oncologist and I drove back down to Burleson to be there with her. We were escorted into a conference room and it wasn't just an oncologist, it was a team. These men and women knew everything about Jennifer the moment we walked in and already had a plan for attack and treatment. There was some good news for her too. They said the spot was so tiny, the radiologist had to draw an arrow so the surgeon could see it. They told her that she was at a .5 stage of cancer, the lowest possible and looks like she would not have to have chemo after surgery. I felt that these doctors, these men and women, could cure my child and I knew I could put her into their care.

Surgery was scheduled for April 26th and she would undergo a double mastectomy and reconstruction. The weeks before surgery were filled with doctor appointments – surgeon, plastic surgeon, hospital testing and pre-admission. We were kept busy and I was handling it as though this was normal routine and then it was April 26th.

Jennifer came through the surgery very well. Prayers for safe keeping and successful surgery were heard and answered and we were so very thankful! I did whatever was needed the next two weeks – cooking, cleaning, drainage tubes to empty and clean, getting Jennifer outside to walk to gain her strength back. It became a routine for us and we settled into it during the days. The nights – they were long and sleepless and with the door closed to "my" room, I cried myself into a fitful slumber of sorts. Jennifer never heard me, she never knew.

Jennifer's follow-up after surgery with the oncologist brought more news. The cancer was a little more invasive than realized, found after

surgery when testing the tissues. She was now at stage 2 cancer and would need chemo – and lose her long hair. It was a devastating blow to all of us. Her oncologist told her that had she waited until she was 40 years old for a mammogram, she would still be sitting in that chair and would be told she was at stage 4. It now became a miracle, with a long road ahead to a cure.

As we have always done in our family, we make lemonade out of sour lemons and find humor in all things and, in the process, try to bring joy and laughter to those who may not think there is any joy in their lives. Jennifer made it through the chemo, losing her hair (which she donated before beginning the chemo), then 28 rounds on radiation on one side, and then the final reconstructive surgery.

We have two girls, completely different in every way and of the two, if I were pressed to answer which would handle the situation the best – it would not have been Jennifer. To say she surprised us is an understatement. Jennifer is a strong, courageous, fierce, gentle, kind, and loving person. She fought her battle with cancer and she is winning. I sat with her through almost all her chemo treatments and drove her many times to downtown Ft Worth for radiation treatments. I discovered that I too, have strength and courage that I did not know I possessed. God grants us those things we need when we need them.

When Jennifer was diagnosed, my mother told me that God did not send me to Ada for Eula, He sent me there to learn from Eula, how to help my child.

COMMON COURTESIES IN BOCCE

The Sun City Bocce Club encourages friendly social interaction and competition. The following common courtesies should be displayed always.

1. Respect fellow players and refrain from using Profanity and Unsportsmanlike conduct.

- 2. Discard all trash in appropriate containers. This includes wrappers, bottles, etc.
- 3. Team players not having scored should post the points on the scoreboard.
- 4. Players should exit the court after throwing the bocce ball to allow the next player the use of the court. (Physical limitations being the exception).
- 5. Be ready to play when it is your turn.
- 6. Don't take too long thinking over a shot.
- 7. No glass containers or pets allowed on the courts.
- 8. Put the balls in the rack before starting play.
- 9. Arrive on time so games can be played as scheduled.
- 10. If you bring a cell phone, put it on vibrate and limit usage.
- 11. Respect the volunteers that organize the games. Offer to assist when you can.
- 12. Remain quiet while a player is setting the pallino and/or rolling a bocce.
- 13. After each frame, leave balls in place until points have been determined.
- 14. No Smoking.
- 15. Enjoy the fun and fellowship.
