


CIC (completely in canal) Aids work best for me



One hertz simply means "one cycle per second" (typically that which is being counted is a complete cycle); 100 Hz means "one hundred cycles per second", and so on. The unit may be applied to any periodic event—for example, a clock might be said to tick at 1 Hz, or a human heart might be said to beat at 1.2 Hz.



One Cycle per Second = One Hertz






Microphone Location – Where Should it Be Located To Be Most Effective Sound Input – In the Canal or BTE?

My Journey with a Cochlear Implant

Bill Templeman

Bill Templeman has suffered from hearing loss, which has gradually declined for 35 years. About 3 ½ years ago, his loss lead him to consider the evaluation process for a cochlear implant. The clarity of sound and speech was declining, and he particularly missed his enjoyment of Bluegrass music.

He was evaluated by Dr. James Kemper, an ENT-Otolaryngologist in Austin. "I believe selection of an experienced and qualified surgeon & audiologist is a MUST", said Bill. After testing and conferences, the surgery was performed, which surgically placed the implant underneath the skin attached to an electrode inserted in the cochlea. After several weeks, the external sound processor was attached. The miracle of sound returned to his deaf ear.

The highly trained audiologist took the reins. Only mild imbalance episodes occurred, as he began training his brain to process the sounds he was now hearing. He used the Internet version of Angel Sound, which is an easy program to navigate, under the direction of his cochlear audiologist with occasional tweaking & adjustments to the program. The program is easy in the beginning but progresses to more difficult listening situations. Bill does wear a normal-type hearing aid in his non-cochlear ear, provided by Dr. Jill Davis. His hearing has been restored to 85-95%, and he is enjoying Bluegrass music again. A tremendous Success Story.

Searching & Comparing

New Hearing Aids

I have worn hearing aids for about 15 years; these are the steps I followed in my search for new aids

Features:

I listed the features that are important to me – T-coil (of course), music quality, rechargeable if possible, connectivity with Android phone; reduce surrounding sounds in a restaurant or group settings.

Provider:

You must have a special relationship with your provider & know they want the very best for you. Someone said last week, "I just didn't like the person." Time to check a different provider.

After lots of research about the aids I wanted to try, I asked Dr. Jill Davis to fit me with the new Widex Evoke 440 Fusion. But the search wasn't finished.

Compare:

I began comparing features of the Evokes with other manufacturers by using this same web site - Compare Hearing Aids -

I compared the Widex Evoke with 4 other (Phonak, Oticon, Starkey, ReSound) manufacturers – one at a time with the Evokes' After about 6 weeks, felt confident the Widex were the best for me. Results:

I can control sound & programs from my Android without wearing an intermediary device.
