The Pet Club is looking forward to 2023, continuing to add programs and events to keep our Club informative and fun.

Part of the Pet Club's mission is to assist local pet shelters and sanctuaries by making donations of items they need. In 2022, we donated over \$16,000 in pet food and supplies to various shelters plus over \$9,000 worth of donated items. This can happen only through collecting dues and class fees. Thank you to all for contributing to this cause.....we do make a difference.

Thanks to our new dog training team, we will be offering over 125 dog training classes in 2023. This is a huge effort by our trainers to make this happen. 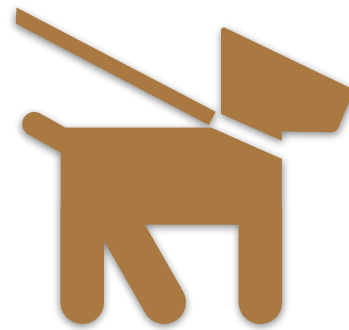

Santa Claws (2014)

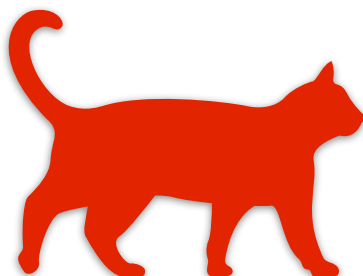
A cute movie where the cats have to save Christmas because Santa can't fly his sleigh due to cat allergies. Silly but fun film for all.

Dog Training Tips

Why You Should Train Your Dog

Training is an essential part of owning a dog and can be started at any age. Training builds confidence, provides mental stimulation and strengthens the human-animal bond. Dogs are always learning just like we are. Dogs want to learn; they want to learn how to communicate with us and to understand what we want them to do. Dogs have no concept of right or wrong. It is up to us to teach the dog what is right. The key in training is consistency, clear instructions with concise wording.

Our dogs should bring us joy, companionship and a sense of pride. With training, both you and your dog will have a happier, calmer life. No matter what the dog's age, breed or temperament, every dog can benefit from training.

5 Reasons to Train Your Dog:

1. Become a Team

Dogs love to spend time with us and have fun with us. Training increases the bond between you and the dog; you become a 'team.' Training is exercise and can tire that overactive dog out quickly because they are not only using their muscles, they are using their brain. Dogs were bred to work; training is work - and fun at the same time. The dogs like to please us by doing what we ask. Age of the dog does not matter. Start with a young pup and continue training throughout its life. Old dogs can and like to learn, too.

2. Socialization

A well-trained dog is accepted in a social setting vs. an untrained dog. Knowing how to sit politely and wait for the handler, walk without pulling the handler, not barking, not begging for food, not jumping on people are signs of a well-trained dog. No one wants to visit a house with a dog that is jumping all over them.

3. Prevents Behavior Problems

By knowing what is expected of him, a trained dog is calmer and exhibits less stress and less behavior issues. He understands words like "calm" and "bed" where he can go to relax. He is less fearful of being left alone because he knows what to do and what not to do. He can entertain himself.

4. Training Benefits Both the Dog and You

We are never too old to learn either. Taking a well-trained dog for a walk outside means exercise, fresh air and meeting new and old friends. You get to learn the names of all the dogs in the neighborhood. Going to a dog park allows more interaction with your peers while your dog is getting his exercise, too. It has been proven that seniors with pets live longer and are healthier both physically and mentally.

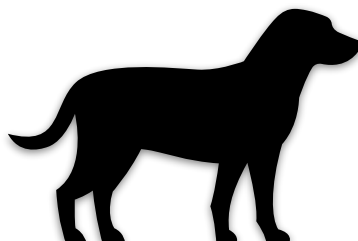
5. Different Types of Training

Training is not only in group classes where you learn basic skills (but it is a great start). All training should be positive reinforcement so the dogs learn with a calm, positive manner. Different breeds like different skills. Many dogs are bred to sniff things out, search, dig, hunt. As the Pet Club is growing, so are the classes we offer. If you have any ideas of different types of classes, let us know. The Pet Club has some new "tricks" in mind for next year!

How To Stop Your Dog From Jumping on People

Now is the time to focus on teaching your dog not to jump on people. Dogs jump to get attention from someone. They do not understand negative attention such as "NO!", being pushed away, or yelled at. All they know is they won, got your attention and will keep jumping. Every time a dog jumps on you, do this: cross your arms putting your hands on your shoulders, do not look at the dog, do not speak to the dog. The dog will find you boring and walk away. When the dog is relaxed, reward them for keeping 4 paws on the ground. If you have company, tell them to ignore the dog and do the same action. If their arms are full with yummy food, just ask them not to talk to or look at the dog. This technique works as long as you are consistent. It also works when someone is sitting in a chair or a dog is begging at the table.

5. Click on SAVE DATA
