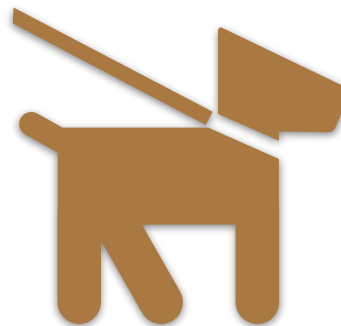

Re-Homing Pets Policy

The Pet Club has assisted many SC residents in the past to re-home a pet, regardless of whether they were a Pet Club member or not.

However, we have been receiving way too many calls from people who are fostering, helping a family member, friend or neighbor, and even people outside of Sun City and **out of state!** It has now become an issue.

The Pet Club Board has decided to limit re-homing assistance to **ONLY** Pet Club Members and their **personal pets**. This is a service we will gladly provide to our members. We will no longer advertise pets from shelters, sanctuaries or from anyone, including members who are fostering a pet to be adopted.

This also applies to anyone seeking a new pet. We will only put that request on our Newsletter Bulletin Board for Pet Club Members.

While we would like to help everyone, we are all volunteers, and our primary responsibility is to serve our members.

Meet The Pet Club Day

We had over 30 volunteers help set up and run this event on January 16. In addition, 23 volunteers baked over 60 lb of homemade dog treats and packaged over 160 bags to sell. WOW!!! The dog treat table made \$288. Our merchandise table sold about \$350 worth of new items. The remainder of the items were donated to the shelters in attendance and to Goodwill.

13 new members joined the Pet Club that day, 9 people signed up to be potential Dog Trainers and 8 people were interested in becoming Pet Partners Therapy Dog Teams.

We donated \$1,500 to our presenter All Things Wild, plus \$500 each to R.O.C.K., Living Grace Canine Ranch, Austin Siamese Cat Rescue, Williamson County Regional Animal Shelter and Harley's Angels for their participation. I spoke to all of them, and they were all very pleased with the event and will do it again.

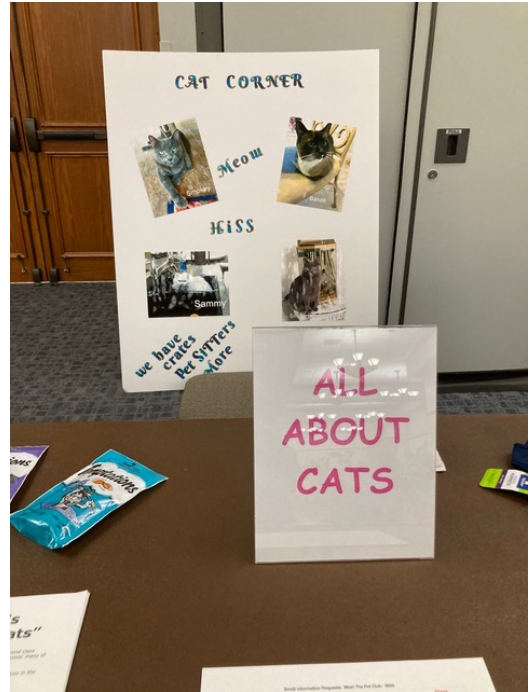
We had 250 residents attend, which made this a very successful day.

A special thanks goes to the Wag Heaven team for making pet name tags and donating 100% of the proceeds to the Pet Club, \$112. Thank you Jusak and Jeff!!

Pupology and Wag Heaven each had to pay a CA fee of \$200 to be at the event, and we thank them for taking part to promote and educate members about their stores. Their fees went towards the donations to the shelters.

Introducing a new dog class starting in March

AKC Canine Good Citizen Intermediate Class With CGC Evaluation

What is the American Kennel Club Canine Good Citizen (CGC) Evaluation?

Canine Good Citizen is a 10-skill test that demonstrates a dog's good manners and responsible dog ownership. The dog must pass all test items to obtain the CGC certificate.

By passing, you and your dog will deepen your bond and be a more connected team. Not only will you and your dog demonstrate the basics of dog training and skills like sit, down, and stay, but your dog will become a welcomed community member when out in public.

Prerequisites for the class: The dog should have the skill sets listed below to be ready to pass his CGC evaluation. AKC (American Kennel Club) registration is not required.

How is the 3-week class set up?

The first 2 weeks of the 3-week semester, we will review all test items to prepare you for the evaluation. The 3rd week will be the evaluations.

Test Items:

Test 1: Accepting a friendly stranger This test demonstrates that the dog will allow a friendly stranger to approach it and speak to the handler in a natural, everyday situation.

Test 2: Sitting politely for petting This test demonstrates that the dog will allow a friendly stranger to touch it while it is out with its handler.

Test 3: Appearance and grooming This practical test demonstrates that the dog will welcome being groomed and examined and will permit someone, such as a veterinarian, groomer, or friend of the owner, to do so. It also demonstrates the owner's care, concern, and sense of responsibility.

Test 4: Out for a walk (walking on a loose lead) This test demonstrates that the handler is in control of the dog.

Test 5: Walking through a crowd This test demonstrates that the dog can move about politely in pedestrian traffic and is under control in public places.

Test 6: Sit and down on command and staying in place This test demonstrates that the dog has training, will respond to the handler's commands to sit and down and will remain in the place when commanded by the handler.

Test 7: Coming when called This test demonstrates that the dog will come when called by the handler.

Test 8: Reaction to another dog This test demonstrates that the dog can behave politely around other dogs.

Test 9: Reaction to distraction This test demonstrates that the dog is confident at all times when faced with common distracting situations.

Test 10: Supervised separation This test demonstrates that a dog can be left with a trusted person, if necessary, and will maintain training and good manners.

Upon passing this evaluation, if your dog is AKC registered, you may pay the AKC a fee for the Canine Good Citizen (CGC) title and a certificate.

If your dog is not AKC registered, you have two options: 1. Receive a free certificate from the Pet Club. Or 2. Pay a fee to register with the AKC and then a fee to the AKC for the title and a certificate.
