Our Pet Club Dog Trainers

Years' ago, there was one lonely Pet Club dog trainer who taught three six-week sessions a year, three classes each session, and all classes outdoors in all types of weather, meeting the needs of approximately 60 dogs a year. Life has changed since 2021; there are now 19 dog trainers offering 11 semesters of classes monthly. Our indoor classes have trained over 290 dogs in the first six months of 2023!

With two or three trainers in each class with either 4 or 6 dogs, our trainers can give individualized assistance in all levels of classes. If you feel the training is too slow or too fast for you and your dog, let us know and we can adapt the class to meet your needs. Often, we are required to remove a dog from the classroom environment and work outdoors, giving that dog one-on-one training to address their personal needs, with the goal being to return to the group inside. Classes take place 11 months a year - we take December off. We don't just train dogs - we train humans, too! We want the handlers to understand their dogs, know how to communicate with their dogs, bond with their dogs and make sure that training is always FUN.

Our trainers do not provide one-on-one training outside the regular class schedule. We do not come to your home and provide private lessons - we are all about group lessons.

The Pet Club is constantly growing and so are the types of classes we offer. Recently we added Rally Obedience and Canine Good Citizen, both of which are very popular. We are currently working on two new classes which will be announced in the next few months and also a totally new amazing **FREE** program for our members!

In addition to group classes, we offer monthly **Educational Seminars** where the humans come without their dogs and ask questions, present problems and learn ways to deal with their dogs. These seminars are held the second Thursday of every month in the morning. Announcements are always sent out to club members, but it is open to any Sun City resident. Invite your neighbors and friends to come to the seminars.

As we grow, we always need more volunteer dog trainers. Our "Train the Trainer" program helps participants learn how to train dogs, how to communicate with handlers to help them understand their dogs better and how to train in a group environment. Human Foods That Could Be Deadly to Cats:

If you're a cat lover, you've probably given your pet at least one human food treat. After all, cats love to eat just about anything, right? Well, not exactly. Some human foods are toxic to cats. The following are the most harmful human foods for cats and why.

Citrus Foods

These fruits can cause vomiting and diarrhea in cats. If ingested in large quantities, citrus fruits can cause nervous system problems such as seizures.

Raw Seafood

Raw seafood, especially raw fish, can contain bacteria that cause food poisoning and even death. It's also possible for cats to get a parasitic infection called anisakiasis if they ingest raw fish or squid. Anisakiasis can be harmful without treatment.

Nuts

Many nuts, including almonds and walnuts, are toxic to cats. Ingesting even a small amount can cause vomiting, diarrhea, and pancreatitis.

Alcohol

Alcohol is toxic to cats and can cause liver damage, coma, and even death. So the next time you have a party, make sure your cat stays away from the booze to avoid getting you into the temptation of giving it a sip.

Garlic and Onions

These vegetables can cause liver damage and anemia in cats. Ingesting them even in small amounts can be harmful.

Candy and Gum

Xylitol is a common sweetener in gum and candy. Although it's not toxic to humans, ingesting even a small amount of xylitol can cause the cat's blood sugar levels to drop and lead them into a coma or death if untreated.

Dairy Products

Cats are not meant to eat dairy products because they are carnivores. In addition, adult cats are lactose intolerant because they do not have the enzyme necessary to break down the dairy sugars (lactose) in milk. Ingesting too much lactose can cause diarrhea, vomiting, and even dehydration.

Raw Eggs

Raw eggs contain a protein called avidin, which binds to biotin and makes it unavailable to the cat. This can lead to skin problems, hair loss, and even seizures.

Chocolate

Chocolate contains a compound called theobromine, which is toxic to cats. Ingesting large amounts of chocolate can lead to vomiting, diarrhea, heart problems, and seizures.

Raisins and Grapes

Raisins and grapes can cause kidney failure in cats. Ingesting even a small amount can be harmful. So, the next time your cat begs for a bite of your sandwich or an ice cream cone, remember that these human foods are poisonous to cats.

Caffeine


Caffeine can cause nervousness, vomiting, diarrhea, and even death in cats. So the next time you want to share your coffee with your cat or offer a caffeinated drink like tea or soda pop instead of water, it's best not to give them one since caffeine is considered toxic for cats.

Bones from Fish, Poultry, or other Meat Sources

Bones from fish and poultry can splinter inside the cat's digestive system. This causes internal bleeding and even death if untreated. It is never safe for cats to eat any bone.
