Sometimes it is Christmas all year long. The Georgetown Blue Santa Program reaches out to the citizens of our community to help make this very special program a success. Each year, our goal is to ensure that every child in our Georgetown community who is in need of toys receives a special gift from Blue Santa during the Christmas season. Throughout the year, anyone may

donate a new, unwrapped toy or make a monetary donation in the lobby of the Police Department. Your donations are tax deductible and you may request a receipt at the time you make a donation.

CARING EVENTS

In 2012, we distributed toys to approximately 1,800 underprivileged children in Georgetown. Our friends in Sun City Texas have been a tremendous asset to our Blue Santa program for many years. Clubs and organizations have held holiday dinners, special events, and/or toy drives that have resulted in hundreds of toys and thousands of dollars. These gifts are used to prepare a fun-filled box of toys and books for every child under the age of 15 whose family has applied for assistance through the Blue Santa Program. On gift distribution day, the children even get to visit with Blue Santa!

In addition to the many events and toy drives held in our community, the Christmas Stroll has become a big event for Blue Santa. Our police volunteers push blue shopping carts to collect toys along the parade route. They keep a close watch for anyone holding up a toy to contribute and especially love it when they see "kids giving to kids."

FRIENDS & PINS

The Friends of Blue Santa and Blue Santa Elf Pin projects offer local businesses and individuals an annual opportunity to provide support to the program. The Friends of Blue Santa project allows businesses to support the program by selecting from various levels of monetary sponsorship. The Blue Santa Elf Pin project allows individuals to make a minimum donation of \$15 to receive a collector pin to wear proudly and show their support for the program.

DONATION INFORMATION

All donations are tax deductible and you may request a receipt at the time of your donation, if required. All funds collected for Blue Santa are deposited in a special Blue Santa account managed by the Citizen Police Academy Alumni Association, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization supporting all major community programs for the Georgetown Police Department.

Residents' Guide to Community Association Governance

ven with a map, compass and a certified guide, sometimes it is hard to find the way to wherever we are going. Unfortunately, sometimes the same can be said for those trying to understand how our Community Associationⁱ (the "CA") is governed by reading its Governing Documents, which include the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (CC&Rs), the new Design Guidelines, the CA's By-Laws and the CA's Rules and Regulations. Given the complex nature of these documents, this article has been drafted to provide residents with a general understanding of the CA's governance structure.

CORPORATION GOVERNED BY BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The CA is a registered Texas nonprofit corporation. Everyone who owns a lot within Sun City Texas (i.e., individual residents and the developer, Pulte) is automatically made a member of this corporation. As with all corporations, the CA is governed at the top by a Board of Directors who are elected by the members. ⁱⁱ The Board is authorized to create committees to assist the Board in running the CA. The role of these committees is to advise the Board on various matters and to perform whatever specific tasks are assigned to them in the committee charters issued by the Board.ⁱⁱⁱ The CA also employs a full-time staff that oversees the daily functions of the CA.

CA COMMITTEES

To date, the Board has used its authority to create/charter the following 13 committees to assist in the running of the CA:

- Chartered Clubs (Non-Sports)
- Communications
- Covenants Committee
- Elections
- Emergency Management
- Finance
- Golf
- · Landscaped Maintained Homes
- Modifications
- Nominating
- Property & Grounds
- Sports
- Wildlife Management

Each of these committees is comprised of five to nine indi-

viduals, all of whom are appointed by the Board and must be members of the CA (i.e., homeowners within Sun City Texas).

As mentioned, each committee fulfills the tasks assigned to it in its charter. A committee only has those powers specifically delegated to it in its charter. Each charter prescribes the committee's purpose, composition, terms of office, delegated authorities, committee officers, and other issues uniquely related to that committee. Typically, these charters require the committee members to provide the Board advice and recommendations on specific matters. For instance, the Nominating Committee provides the Board advice and recommendations about candidates for committee positions, while the Finance Committee advises and makes recommendations on CA financial matters. The Communications Committee advises and makes recommendations for maintaining and improving communication between the residents, the Board, CA staff, the developer and the Georgetown community at large, and the Wildlife Committee advises and makes recommendations related to wildlife and habitat management.

The Modifications Committee and the Covenants Committee are somewhat different than the other committees, in that their roles are not limited to providing advice and making recommendations. Rather, these two committees are authorized to make substantive and binding decisions on behalf of the CA and the Board. Specifically, the Modifications Committee is authorized to review, and to approve or reject, proposed modifications, additions, or alterations to existing homes. Likewise, the Covenants Committee is established as the "hearing tribunal" of the CA and is authorized to impose sanctions for violations of the Governing Documents or any rule or regulation of the CA. Only the Covenants Committee and the Board may assess fines for violations of the Governing Documents.

HANDLING OF RESIDENT CONCERNS/ISSUES

If you ever have a concern that needs to be addressed by the CA, you should first approach the appropriate CA staff member in an attempt to resolve the issue. If staff is unable to adequately resolve your issue, you should then contact the appropriate committee. (Note: If you have any confusion about which committee to contact or how to do that, staff will be able to answer those questions.) In the rare instances where a resident does not believe the staff or the committee has resolved their issue, the resident may request a hearing before the CA Board of *Continued on page 9*

Board Member Views Submitted by Glynn Hatley, Vice President

What's important to Sun City Texas residents?

In preparation for this article, I approached a few residents to get their input—questions and/or comments about what is important to them in Sun City Texas. The results were not very scientific, but they were very interesting. Thanks to all residents who participated in this effort.

Note: There were no two responses on any one subject and there was nothing said about golf, which seems to me a strong indicator that, in general, the community is pretty satisfied with the way things are being run. Kudos to the staff, our many committees and to the Board.

I can't, in this short space, address all of the issues discussed, so I have picked a few issues that I think have wide interest and what we are doing to address them:

- **Residents with special needs:** A special task force is now studying this important matter and we should be getting the results of this study very soon.
- **Traffic:** Traffic is the City of Georgetown's responsibility, but the CA maintains close communications with the city and there is even a Sun City Texas resident sitting on one of the city's traffic boards. This is an issue to which we can all contribute—be cautious and courteous.

- Monthly financial reports, including new home sales: These reports are available on the Sun City Texas website. On the homepage, www.sctxca.org, under the Community Association tab, click Financial Information. Once on that page, click on Monthly Financials in the bar on the lefthand side. You have the option of looking at the current month and past months.
- What if Pulte elects to build more homes in Sun City Texas? Should Pulte choose to add more homes to our community, residents should be thinking about what additional amenities they would like to see.
- **Firewise:** This is an ongoing project that is funded in the 2014 Sun City Texas budget.

Finally, we had one potential issue that may win the Gold Medal Award: According to a Fox News release, one HOA has taken DNA samples of the residents' dogs in order to identify and punish those who don't pick up after their pets. Just shows how important this matter can be to a community. So, pet owners—scoop the poop!

Directors. These requests must be made through the office of the CA's Executive Director. All Board hearings are held in "executive session" and are not open to other residents. The Executive Director's office will make all arrangements for the hearing and advise you of the time, date, location, and requirements for the hearing. Residents appearing before the Board will be required to submit a written statement regarding their issue about one week before the designated meeting or workshop. During the hearing, the resident will be provided a reasonable time to outline their issue and the Board members may ask questions.

Hopefully, this short guide adequately clarifies how our Community Association is governed and to whom you should turn if you ever have an issue that needs to be addressed by the CA.

As you remove political signs and plan for holiday decorations, take a look around your yard and see if there are any dead or dying plants that need to be replaced or removed. Maintenance of established beds does not require an application for modifications, so feel free to change out turf, add mulch, and replace plants, groundcover and shrubs as necessary. If you do want to expand one of the beds or change out mulch to river rock or decomposed granite, then we will need an application for modifications (B-1 Form) to be filled out. scape modification, we recently developed a worksheet for landscape modifications that may be helpful. If you would like a B-1 Form, a plot plan to use for sketching proposed changes, or a copy of the new worksheet, you can email our office at communitystandardsoffice@sctexas. org, and provide either your home address or membership number, and we'll be happy to reply with the forms to help you complete the process. Of course, you can always come by the office and pick up printed copies of any of the forms we require.

Finally, November 15 heralds the start of our holiday season. Decorations may be displayed through January 15. This is the time to decorate mailboxes, hang lights on houses, and add displays in the yard that are appropriate to the season. Have a lovely Thanksgiving!

Current Issues in Wildlife Management - Cotton Rats

The hispid cotton rat, often mistaken for the Norway or brown rat, is usually seen in Sun City Texas after the mowing of common areas, which disrupts or destroys their habitat.

DESCRIPTION

The cotton rat is moderately large with a scaly, sparsely haired tail. Distinguishing characteristics are the rough, grizzled appearance of blackish, brownish, or grayish back fur and grayish-white or buff underside. The animal's total length averages 10 inches, including a tail length of four inches. The cotton rat may be distinguished from the Norway rat by its smaller size, shorter tail, and longer grizzled fur.

HABITAT

Cotton rats prefer dense cover such as grassy fields, overgrown roadsides, or fencerow vegetation. Under protective cover, the rats have well-defined runways radiating from their nest sites usually located in underground chambers or in dense clumps of grass or piles of brush



above ground.

The rats are normally herbivores, eating the roots, stems, leaves and seeds of a wide variety of plants. They also feed on fruits, nuts, insects, the eggs/young of ground-nesting birds, and animal carcasses.

BEHAVIOR

Cotton rats are active year-round and are typically nocturnal, but they will venture out in the day. They are very prolific; several litters may be produced annually, averaging 2-15 per litter. The gestation period is 27 days, and young are weaned in 10-15 days. Most cotton rats begin breeding at two to three months of age, while their average lifespan is about six months.

CONTROL ECONOMICS

Cotton rats rarely invade houses; if they do, it is the result of damage or destruction of their habitat; their instinct is to return to their nests as soon as possible. Control measures for cotton rats are limited, and include the following:

- Exclusion: Sheet metal barriers are usually not practical.
- **Cultural Methods:** Removal of dense cover by burning, mowing, plowing, or the use of herbicides can reduce habitat and prevent large population increases.
- **Repellents:** None are registered (or listed) for effectively repelling cotton rats.
- **Fumigants:** Not very practical because of infrequent use of their tunnels and burrows.
- **Trapping:** Small rodent live traps or rat-sized snap traps are effective.

Time to Change Your Clocks - and Smoke Alarm Batteries!

Daylight Saving Time ends on Sunday, November 3, allowing us an extra hour of sleep-and a great reminder to change the batteries in our smoke alarms, or replace the alarm unit entirely. Batteries should be changed at least once per year, while the smoke alarm unit should be replaced every 8-10 years. A properly installed and maintained smoke alarm is the only thing in your home that can alert you to a fire 24 hours a day, seven days a week. According to the National Fire Protection Association, almost two-thirds of home fire deaths resulted from fires in properties without working smoke alarms. While you're setting back your clocks, consider also checking your smoke alarm-it could just save your life.

Hopefully, you have already made adjustments to your controller to accommodate the cooler temperatures we will experience in months ahead. It is important not to overwater during this time of year, as it can lead to fungus in the landscape.

WATER SAVING TIPS:

- Designate one glass for your drinking water each day or refill a water bottle. This will cut down on the number of glasses to wash.
- Rather than following a set watering schedule, check for soil moisture two to three inches below the surface before watering.
- Make sure the rain sensor on your irrigation controller is working so your system doesn't run while it's raining.
- Don't use running water to thaw food. Defrost food in the refrigerator for water efficiency and food safety.

Flu Season is Here

It's flu season and time to consider getting your flu vaccination. According to the Center for Disease Control, "Over a period of 31 seasons between 1976 and 2007, estimates of flu-associated deaths in the United States range from

a low of about 3,000 to a high of about 49,000 people. During a regular flu season, about 90 percent of deaths occur in people 65 years and older." The CDC suggests that anyone over the age of 6 months get a yearly flu vaccination.

Influenza, more commonly referred to as "the flu," is a contagious respiratory disease caused by a virus. There are various strains of the flu virus and the CDC works with vaccine manufacturers to develop vaccines for the most likely strains for each flu season. The vaccine contains each of the virus strains in a deactivated form. After receiving the vaccine, your body builds up antibod-

Confidentiality – A Report from the Covenants Committee

When addressing non-compliance issues, the Covenants Committee conducts its work confidentially. Why, and what does it mean? First of all, the Committee's activities are kept confidential to ensure the privacy of all residents. An individual who reports an incident needs to be assured the information provided is kept within the Committee. Similarly, the resident against whom a complaint is made deserves to be heard so that the Committee can obtain all facts before making any decision—frankly, all initial reports are not always completely accurate. The Committee seeks to focus its decisions to correct misbehavior so it will not recur, rather than simply punishing the resident. Finally, the Covenants Committee Charter specifically directs the Committee to do its work in a confidential manner.

The Committee gathers all available facts confidentially, then deliberates in closed session to seek the most appropriate solution to the reported incident. Solutions can include sanctions or a fine if it is determined such is appropriate; however, the Committee may elect merely to counsel the resident, or simply close the case—the resident is notified of the decision. If the incident was reported by another resident or a CA staff member, that individual is notified that the Committee has investigated and taken appropriate action without specifying any details. In the event of sanction or fines, the Community Standards Office ensures appropriate action is taken. Other CA staff members are informed only if their having knowledgeable input is absolutely necessary.

Thus, the Committee's overall process is designed to ensure our community and its residents remain in compliance with our rules and our decisions are fair to everyone. Equally as important, we seek to continue to keep Sun City Texas the best active adult community in the nation. ies to protect it from the viruses. It takes about two weeks for enough antibodies to be produced to be effective against the flu. You cannot get the flu from the vaccine.

Flu season begins as early as October, but usually peaks around January or February.

December 8-14, 2013, has been designated by the CDC as National Influenza Vaccination Week to emphasize the importance of getting your annual vaccination.

Sun City Texas hosted a Flu Clinic in September, at which time Walgreens administered the vaccines. Medicare Part B and most insurances cover the cost for individuals. Another Sun City Texas Flu Clinic may be held in January if the severity of the season demands it. Watch your weekly CA Communicator for more information as it becomes available.

You don't have to wait for Sun City's clinic to get your vaccination! There are many places that offer flu vaccines, such as Walgreens, CVS, HEB, Target and, of course, your own doctor. Stay healthy, my friends!





November Tips for a Beautiful Water Wise Landscape

Make plans now to improve your soil for a better year-round landscape. To learn about your soil's needs, you can have a soil test for specific recommendations. Go to http://soiltesting.tamu.edu/files/ soilwebform.pdf for submittal form with instructions.

TOP DRESSING: NOW'S THE TIME TO APPLY!

To improve moisture retention in turf or flowerbeds, you need as much soil with organics as possible below the turf. You can slowly build up your soil while increasing moisture retention by spreading top dressing, a fine compost that you can purchase at a reputable nursery. In the heat of summer, top dressing would burn your grass, but fall is the perfect time to apply! Spread one-fourth to one-half inch thick— it will pay dividends in next summer's heat and drought.

SOIL AMENDMENTS

You may have heard the common medical phrase, "First, do no harm." This phrase also applies to amending soil in your flowerbeds. Never work soil that is wet, for you can damage soil structure to an extent from which it may never recover. Soil should be moist enough to hold together in your hand, then easily break apart. If it sticks to your spade, wait for it to dry a little. On the other hand, if it is powdery dry, add moisture and wait several hours or until the next day to work with it. A garden fork is recommended rather than a spade for tilling, as it disturbs soil structure less. How do you recognize correctly amended soil? First off, your spade goes in the soil easily. As described above, hold the

soil in your hand to test its moisture. If it is too hard, add one-third to one-half of an inch of compost. If more nutrients are needed, again, add compost. A good supply of nutrients in the soil will keep plants healthy, which will protect them from future insect/disease problems. If your plants are unhealthy, and you think you have a brown thumb, use more compost!

If more drainage is needed, add some granite sand and/or expanded shale. Expanded shale is expensive, but it is a long-term investment, as it does not break down and, therefore, does not need to be replaced like other amendments. Expanded shale gives excellent drainage and soil retention. How can this be? The shale has been heated to such a high temperature that it explodes, leaving little holes in its structure that retains moisture and then slowly releases it as needed.

If the soil needs more acidity, you can use cotton burr compost, which is available right here in Sun City Texas at the Horticulture Club's Gardens.

NOVEMBER GARDENING TIPS:

- Only water as needed. Continue monthly irrigation check and watch temperatures. If you have been watering twice a week, you should be able to cut that to once a week now or not at all during periods of adequate rain.
- Add compost for nutrients and mulch for protection from temperature extremes, or you can just add mulch knowing that, as it breaks down, it will add nutrients.



NEXT MONTH: Join me for ideas to limit turf to reduce water usage.

- If you plant now, be sure to mulch well. This is a good time to plant shrubs and trees to develop roots to be well established for next summer.
- Check your landscape for bulbs that need to be divided. Overcrowded bulb plants will not bloom well.
- Remove dead and overgrown branches from shrubs and trees not susceptible to oak wilt.
- If you did not spread top dressing last month, do so now to add nutrients to the soil and help it retain more moisture next summer.

The Treasure Left Behind

hen World War II ended, current Sun City Texas resident Larry Simpson couldn't have been even a gleam in his father's eye.

Today, with his father having passed away in 2011 at age 89, there's a gleam in Larry's eye whenever he thinks about and talks about the late Colonel Thomas S. Simpson.

"About eight to ten years ago, Dad was packing away a lot of his memorabilia and thinking about going to a care facility," Larry related. "Helping him, I saw a large box of pictures, logbooks, programs, all relating to his service career, including the China-Burma-India region in the 1940s."

Also drawing Larry's attention was the white dress uniform with all the service ribbons and two wings. One wing was the standard Army Air Corps type; the other was from the Chinese Air Force.

The younger Simpson might momentarily have thought his father had been in the Flying Tigers, the famous fighter plane unit more officially known as the American Volunteer Group (AVG).

"But, no, even though he flew 18 different aircraft in his overall career and logged at least 6,000 hours and earned Command Pilot's wings, he never piloted a P-40," Larry declared.

"Actually, Dad's single largest total, about 4,000 hours, came at the controls of the two-engine B-25 bomber. Part of that time, he flew in support of General Claire Chennault's AVG and then the 14th Air Force." As a result of learning this much about his father, Larry was able to ask a lot





more questions that might not have been answered at an earlier time in his life. MILITARY LIFE

Born in 1948, Larry was no stranger to military bases. "We basically lived on a runway, and I remember we were at Webb Air Force Base in Big Spring, Texas, and then at Hickam and Wheeler in Hawaii as late as 1962."

That was a significant year in Colonel Simpson's life and career. The latter ended not too long after he was selected for a permanent promotion to a one-star (brigadier) general.

"As I understood it at the time, considering I was only in my early teens," Larry

explained, "he turned down the promotion because it meant he would be re-assigned to another base and command, thereby taken off flying status. He loved flying too much to accept the change." As noble as that was, the military couldn't (and probably still can't) feel the same way. Thus, Colonel Simpson became Citizen Simpson on December 1, 1962.

Hardly a broken man, Simpson shortly became a stock broker for Dean Witter and went on to become a wealthy man. "But a modest and humble one," his son declared. "If I ever write a book about my father, the title will be 'Real Heroes Don't Talk.' He bragged about just one thing in his entire life, saying 'I was the best pilot in the Air Force."


HEROIC TALES RETOLD

Now, it's Larry's turn to brag about what the contents of that large box revealed. He has appeared before about 20 service clubs and other organizations, spinning heroic tales of his dad. Depending on where and when he is asked to speak, Larry draws on anecdotes that his father related. Always, though, mention will be made of the Silver Star that then-Captain Simpson was awarded in 1945 for "gallantry in action" a year and a half earlier. After a forced landing behind enemy (Japanese) lines, Simpson first had his crew abandon the plane; then, despite the danger of fire and explosions, returned on his own to man a turret gun and kill or disperse an advancing group of soldiers. He and his crew then escaped into the jungle, making their way back to base seven days later.

Some audiences might see the medal personally pinned on the colonel by Madame Chiang Kai-shek; a June '54 graduation program from Air University listing both then-Major Simpson and Colonel Paul W. Tibbets, Jr. (nine years earlier the pilot of "Enola Gay" over Hiroshima); or countless other historical items.

Oh, and how about that large B-25 tire that supposedly landed in the pool at the Taj Mahal? Will that story ever be part of Larry's presentation?

"I haven't looked at everything yet, but this is a treasure trove my Dad left behind," Larry affirmed, his eyes gleaming brightly.



The Princess & the Sailor

Ken and Irene "Renie" Gormley, both World War II veterans and Sun City residents, have been married for 69 years after meeting in the Navy in 1944.

She said, "I don't believe in divorce." She said, "Bingo!"

Good enough proposal! They've been married for 69 years, and rumor has it, it's going to last!

Irene ("Renie") and Ken Gormley, 89 and 93 respectively, are still very much "with it," still entertaining, still dancing, and still very much in love. It shows.

WHERE IT ALL BEGAN

In the early 1940s, President Roosevelt signed a legislation into law that officially made WAVES (Women Accepted for Voluntary Emergency Service), a branch of the U.S. Navy, and from which other services would follow. This act opened many doors for women to serve in the military, and Renie was determined to walk through one of them.

She would often join her father as he flew his airplane for the Civil Air Patrol, so she knew a lot about airplanes, and loved what she knew about them. Renie desperately wanted to become a WAVE and work in aviation, but first she had to reach her 20th birthday to be eligible. She was so afraid the war would end before that happened—it didn't.

Renie celebrated her 20th birthday in 1944 and, in October of that year, realized her dream, was sworn into WAVES, and headed to Pensacola, Florida. She became an airplane mechanic and earned the rank of Aviation Machinery Mate. As it turns out, Ken was there at the same time as an enlisted man studying to be an aviator.

THE NEXT ACT

One day, Ken's good buddy, Duffy, pointed out a WAVE in a swimsuit, hoping to set them up on a blind double date. "That one right over there. But if you don't like what you see, you can choose another one." Ken's reply... "Do you think I'm stupid?"

The date was set, and they went to a movie on base. Not surprising, they were late that night—typical guys—but Renie didn't especially care. In fact, she was relieved, thinking, "Now I don't have to meet that guy." No such luck; the men did show up.

After the movie, the group decided to

walk down the road to the local watering hole, and that's where Ken blew it... He asked a personal question, to which she replied, "None of your business!" and filed him away. "He's just another sailor," she thought.

THE PRINCESS & THE SAILOR

Renie remembers men as gentlemen back in those days, but said they still never missed a chance to whistle at the girls. Her way of dealing with it was simply to ignore them, which earned her the nickname of "The Princess" for being snobbish. She didn't care; she was focused on being the best WAVE she could be.

Ken continued to pursue the pretty lady, and as they got to know each other better, she decided he wasn't "just another sailor" after all, and they settled into a promising romance. The walls of their home tell much of the history of their journey together. Renie pointed to one picture in particular of Ken in dress uniform and said, "He was so handsome, wasn't he?" To which I replied, "Indeed he was, and still is! In fact, I think he looks just like Paul Newman in that picture." Truth be known, I would have fallen in love with him, too!

LIFE AFTER THE WAR

As a married woman, Renie was scheduled to muster up and out of the Navy when the war ended, but at least she got to serve an exciting year. Back in 1944, vou'll recall. Renie was afraid the war would end before she could even qualify to be a WAVE, so she was grateful for that year. And Ken? Well, Renie proudly tells me he was a "Mustang." Now, the only mustang I knew of was a horse, so she had to explain. A "Mustang" in the military, she told me, was someone who came up through the ranks the hard way. Ken started at the bottom and retired as a Lieutenant Commander after 30 years of dedicated service to the Navy. During those 30 years, he flew 38 different airplanes. Proud? Of course!

The family moved to many countries around the world, "Too many to count," Ken said. But the children, a son and a daughter, were the big winners because they were afforded educational riches above and beyond what they could have received had they been grounded in the U.S.

Ken and Renie were stationed in Hawaii when they celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary. Remember Duffy, the buddy who introduced them? Well, he and Renie's best friend, Barbara, both came to Hawaii for the occasion. "It's really something when your best man is there for your 50th." Yes, Ken, it is. And it's also really something when your Maid of Honor shows up too, isn't it, Renie?

HONORED VETERANS

Both veterans were on a recent Honor Flight to Washington, D.C., to visit the WWII memorial. Spouses aren't normally included on these flights, but Renie, as a female veteran, was an exception. In fact, the two are the first and only couple so far to go on this trip. When asked to speak at the dinner that evening, Renie remembered this poem written by a WWI military veteran (yes, you read it right, that's World War I): *"I am a Woman and a Veteran,*

And I say it with great pride. I gave the very best I had,

As soon as she said the first words, "I am a woman and a veteran...," she immediately received emotional applause from her fellow veterans in the room. Speaking directly to the many female veteran attendees in the room, she called attention to the incredible timing of the poem—almost 100 years—and ended with, "Look where we women are now! 

Panhandle Gold

A Breathtaking Canyon; a Stirring Musical; and a Musician Like No Other

At her visit to the Texas Panhandle, Sandy Nielsen watched a production of *TEXAS* at the Pioneer Amphitheater in the Palo Duro Canyon (above), and visited the Buddy Holly Center in Lubbock (below).

wilight descends over the canvon. Audience members settle into their seats in the outdoor amphitheater, anxious for the show to start. Suddenly, along the rim of the canyon wall in front of them, a lone rider appears, carrying the Texas flag. He kicks his horse into a gallop across the rim, the flag streaming proudly behind him. As the audience wipes away a tear or two, TEXAS, the 48-season long musical, gets underway. There are so many highlights of a trip to the Texas Panhandle area, that it would be hard to choose just one to share. There is the magnificent Palo Duro Canyon itself, drenched in color and in history. There is the musical that plays most nights in the Canyon from June through August. There is the Cadillac Ranch, a wacky art installation. There is the wonderful Panhandle and Plains Historical Museum. And, there is a museum tribute to Buddy Holly, the rock musician who paved the way for all the others.

At 476 miles from Georgetown, Amarillo—a good base for exploring the region—is hardly a day trip. There are



ample hotels available, however, and two nights should allow you to cover most of what is described here.

The Palo Duro Canyon is arguably the biggest draw for visitors. At 120 miles long, between 6-20 miles wide, and at times almost 1,000 feet in depth, it is the second largest canyon in the United States. The upper part of the canyon was purchased in 1934 by the State of Texas and turned into a state park. Its steep mesa walls and multi-colored layers of rock provide rewarding vistas for hiking or biking. Another less energetic but

equally enthralling way to see the canyon is through a jeep tour organized by Elkins Ranch, a working cattle ranch, owned by the same family for three generations. Their staff will take you in open-air, black-and-white "cow" jeeps along the rim of the canyon, stopping occasionally for photos and telling stories about the geology, ecology and history of the canyon. Guests learn about the canyon's role in one of the last battles of the Red River War in 1874. Colonel Ranald Mackenzie was sent to remove a large band of Indians from the canyon to reservations in



Oklahoma. Knowing the dependence of the Indians on their horses, he concentrated on capturing their herd of more than 1,000 ponies, later destroying most of them. The disheartened Indians slowly trickled back to the reservations.

No history of the area would be complete without a retelling of the Cynthia Ann Parker story. Comanches kidnapped Cynthia Ann from her family when she was 9 years old. She was assimilated into the tribe, marrying a chief and having his children. Her son, Quanah Parker, was one of the last great Comanche chiefs. After moving to an Oklahoma reservation, he was able to negotiate successfully with the military for Comanche rights, and became a wealthy rancher in the area. His great-great-great grandson plays Quanah Parker in the *TEXAS* production.

After the tour from the top of the canvon, it makes sense to see it from the bottom up, and there's no better way to wind up a visit than sitting in the amphitheater that uses the canyon wall as its spectacular backdrop. Galloping horses, trains, and wagons all appear on stage at various times. In between song and dance numbers that tell the history of the Panhandle, there is a thunderstorm so realistic it has audience members looking for their umbrellas, and there is a plains fire that lights up the night sky. A water and fireworks show, complete with patriotic salute, is a grand finale that will satisfy anyone's craving for special effects. A visit to the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum the next day in Amarillo will round out an understanding of the area. Exhibits on the development of the

oil industry, the natural history of the area, weather, geology, and daily life on the prairie are inviting, entertaining, and instructive.

Don't forget to save some time for a visit to the Cadillac Ranch, an art installation dating back to 1974 of 10 older model Cadillacs half buried nose-down in a cow pasture (at an angle—they say—that corresponds to the Great Pyramid of Giza in Egypt). Uniquely, graffiti is encouraged here, so most people leave their mark, and the Caddys will have a different look from one day to the next.

A great way to wrap up a trip to the Panhandle is by visiting the Buddy Holly Museum in his hometown of Lubbock. In only a short year and a half, this pioneer of rock-and-roll stole the show on the world's stage, and his death in a 1959 plane crash was commemorated years later when Don McLean wrote about "the day the music died" in his song *American Pie*. The Beatles, Rolling Stones, and Bob Dylan are among the rock-and-roll greats who say it was Buddy Holly who showed them the way.

The Panhandle is quintessential Texas, in its scenery and history. Visitors will learn a lot, laugh sometimes, and marvel always at the natural and other wonders with which we have been blessed. The only question you'll have after you visit is why you didn't do it sooner.

the report in total or may reject certain items that are suggested in the report while approving all other items.

Once the report is approved, the Director of Golf Maintenance oversees the implementation of the approved items based upon 1) available funds for the project and/or 2) manpower availability. Rather than detract from ongoing maintenance of our golf courses by using our personnel for larger, time consuming projects, a better approach is to bid those larger projects to experienced contractors, which is done as funds become available.

PROJECTS & RECOMMENDATIONS

Two high-priority projects have been given to contractors this year. The first project is the repair of the cart path at Legacy Hills #2, where the path meets the bridge—a gap has appeared due to settling. This project is being contracted out so that the path will be raised and the concrete will be re-barred and abut the bridge entrance. The second important task is the repair of the cart path at Legacy Hills #16.

Almost every hole on each course had a recommendation for improvement by the Playability and Safety subcommittee; some were easy and quick to implement while others needed to be put on the backburner until there was sufficient time to attend to them.

A few items that were relatively easy to accomplish include the 14th hole at Cowan Creek in which one mower-width of long rough was added along the front edge of the lake.

In some cases, it is just a matter of cleaning up or making certain there is adequate sand in a bunker. There is a lot of tree and bush trimming recommended and an occasional out-of-bounds marker review. Drainage is always on the table and being reviewed.

Erosion around the cart paths has created some problems that need to be attended to for safety purposes. This is an ongoing situation—holes that appear are repaired, but foot traffic and water erode the fill and create the danger again.

LOOKING AHEAD

Many of these items should be complete in the coming months, and you may even notice some of the improvements! Those who step up to the blue tee box at Legacy Hills #6 should find that pesky tree to the front right has had a haircut, or the zoysia grass has sprung up on the green tee box at White Wing # 5 (making it a consistent, usable tee).

Look for a lot of improvements taking place in the days and weeks ahead. We hope you enjoy them!

Inside COPs

UFOs, a herd of longhorns, and why did the turkeys cross the road?

Sun City's Citizens on Patrol monitor the community expertly and efficiently. While on patrol, they observe everything from leftopen garage doors to suspicious-looking persons on campus.

ost of you know that COPs patrol, observe and report. We slowly drive around, wave at you and generally look out for our neighbors. We drive and get to know Sun City's layout, listening to our favorite music or spending some quality time with a friend or spouse, all the while keeping an eye out for our community. Most drivers do two two-hour shifts a month, which are usually routine, but every once in a while, a shift is anything but routine.

TURKEY TRAFFIC JAM

On an early patrol one morning, a driver stopped at a golf cart crossing for a flock of 12 wild turkeys crossing the road one at a time. He watched and waited while the turkeys strolled safely across. As he was about to start up, the lead turkey turned around and started back across the street, followed single-file by all 11 birds. The COPs driver, thinking she was having trouble, pulled in behind her and walked to her car. She explained that she was waiting for him to give her a ticket. The COPs driver explained, "We don't do that, we just patrol, watch and report, but we don't report traffic violations unless there's an accident."

RODEO IN SUN CITY

A driver was called and told that cows were loose on Stetson Drive. This area abuts a working ranch and, since cows know grass is always greener on the other side of the fence, over they came. AARP courses do not qualify for ticket dismissal in Texas unless you have previously contacted the appropriate court and received approval to take this course in place of a Defensive Driving Course.


