The Georgetown Police Department's Blue Santa Program 2014

The Georgetown Blue Santa Program reaches out to the citizens of our community to help make this very special program a success. Our goal each year is to ensure every Georgetown child in need of toys receives gifts from Blue Santa during the Christmas season. Throughout the year, anyone may donate a new, unwrapped toy or make a monetary donation in the lobby of the police department. Your donations are tax deductible and you may request a receipt at the time you make a donation.

In 2013, we distributed toys to approximately 1,800 underprivileged children in Georgetown. Our friends in Sun City Texas have been a tremendous asset to our Blue Santa program for many years. Clubs and organizations have held holiday dinners, special events and toy drives resulting in hundreds of toys and thousands of dollars. With these gifts, we prepare fun-filled boxes of toys and books for every child under the age of 15 whose family has applied for assistance through the Blue Santa Program. On gift distribution day, the children even get to visit with Blue Santa!

In addition to the many events and toy drives held in our community, the Christmas Stroll has become a big event for Blue Santa. Our police volunteers push blue shopping carts along the parade route to collect toys. They keep a close watch for anyone holding up a toy to contribute, and especially love it when they see "kids giving to kids."

In the same vein, I would like to again urge everyone to watch their speed when driving in our community and to stop for pedestrians in our crosswalks. Neighborhood Traffic and Moving Forward

Here we are again, starting the holiday season; it certainly seems to have come much faster this year!

Several weeks ago, Georgetown Chief of Police Wayne Nero made a presentation to the Sun City Rotary Club regarding local crime rates. Though Georgetown has a low crime rate compared to other communities, the crime rate in Sun City Texas is even lower. Chief Nero attributed this fact to Sun City Residents keeping a look out for each other.

GPD CONCERNS FOR OUR COMMUNITY

It was, however, noted that police have three primary concerns in Sun City Texas: traffic, speeders, and fast golf carts. Hopefully, the completion of Rocky Hollow Road (which, according to Pulte, will be finished in mid-2015) will reduce area traffic issues. Our speeders are advised to control their speed by using cruise control. As far as golf carts, Texas Law defines golf carts as vehicles which travel at 15-25 mph. When asked about a cart that travels faster than 25 mph, Chief Nero said that there wasn't a definition. Regardless, we need to be careful, look out for each other and be safe, so we can enjoy future holiday seasons.

EXPANSION TASK FORCES

On Thursday, October 30, Pulte announced the expansion of Sun City Texas from 7,500 homes to slightly over 10,000 homes. Pulte will start to develop in one of the new areas in early 2015. At the same meeting, Pulte announced the formation of four task forces to make recommendations to the developer for the expansion. These task forces are as follows:

- 1. Expansion Task Force
- 2. Research Task Force
- 3. Existing Facility Task Force
- 4. Golf Task Force

Initially, these task forces will do research, compiling recommendations for Pulte on specific modifications to be made to existing facilities in late 2015/early 2016. Golf status will be studied through 2016-2017. Should another golf course come into consideration, it will not be slated to be built until 2019 or 2020. Remaining amenities will be designed and built between 2015 and 2019. We look forward to exciting times ahead for Sun City Texas.

2015 HOA/LMH Payment Election Options

If you would like to make changes to your payment election for 2015, now is the time to make that change. If you are happy with your current election, there is nothing you need to do.

The change form is available online at www.sctxca.org:

- · Log in with Member ID and Password
- · Click on Site Index
- · Click on Forms
- · Scroll down to CA Forms and Applications
- Under Homeowners Association Dues, click on Payment Election and Bank Draft Authorization forms for 2015.

The form is also available at the Member Services Office or by email, if requested, at Learhea.Grant@sctexas.org.

The three options for 2015 HOA/LMH payments are:

- 1. Annual payment in full by credit card, cash or check—due Friday, January 30, 2015.
- 2. ACH bank draft quarterly
- 3. ACH bank draft monthly

December 15, 2014 is the deadline for 2015 changes. All statements will be mailed the first week of January 2015 with no statement fee. Remember, all mailed statements after January 2015 will incur a \$2 processing fee; to avoid this fee you can sign up for E-Bills (see below).



Holiday Safety

As we look toward the holiday season, let's be mindful of celebrating in a healthful and safe way. When buying new tree

decorations, look for the tag or label stating the lights are approved by the Underwriters Laboratory (UL), which sets the safety standards for all wires, cables, and Christmas decorations. Even when using UL approved lights, avoid overloading electrical outlets and keep an eye out for faulty wires – these are the most common causes of residential holiday fires.

When selecting a real tree, give the needles a "tug test" by pulling firmly on the needles. If a significant number of needles come off in your hand, choose another tree. A healthy tree will not shed its needles, which should not feel brittle, but instead seem "soft" to the touch.

There is a greater fire risk with natural trees as opposed to artificial ones. Keeping your tree moist is the best way to prevent it from catching fire. If your tree is pre-cut, it's important to make a new cut across the bottom of the trunk, removing an inch or an inch and a half off the bottom. This will ensure the tree is capable of absorbing water (most real trees will absorb roughly one quart of water for each inch of its diameter, so be sure to top off your stand

daily).

Of all residential holiday fires, one in six occur because of a heat source kept too close to the tree. If you use an electric space heater anywhere in your home. be sure it features an automatic shut-off should it be tipped over or forgotten about. If you do your own outside decorating and it involves using a ladder, maintain 3 points of contact with the ladder: two hands, one foot, or two feet, one hand. Extension ladders should reach beyond the roof edge by 3 feet. It is also recommended that someone hold the bottom of the ladder and be able to call for help in case of an emergency. When hanging decorations inside the home, remember to use appropriate means – not chairs, tables or other furniture - when reaching heights. If your seasonal décor is stored in an attic, please be cautious when using folding stairs. Spring-loaded doors may descend quickly, as may the ladder when pinch points are triggered. Always face your ladder when descending from the attic.

ACCIDENT PREVENTION TIPS

- Keep matches, lighters, and candles out of the reach of children.
- Avoid smoking near flammable decorations.
- Make an emergency plan to use if a fire breaks out anywhere in the home.

See that each family member knows what to do.

- Avoid wearing loose, flowing clothes particularly long, open sleeves—near open flames, such as those of a fireplace, stove, or candlelit table.
- Never burn candles near evergreens.
- Burning evergreens in the fireplace can also be hazardous. When dry, greens burn like tinder.
- · Keep your tree well watered.
- · Use UL approved light sets.
- Use a ladder or a proper step stool when putting up decorations. DO NOT use chairs or other furniture.
- Keep your outside gas grill away from your house. Make sure the hoses are in good condition, pliable and without cracks.

Mistletoe: Magic, Myth or Nuisance?

It is the time of the year when the Cedar Elms and hackberries have dropped their leaves and the evergreen mistletoe is no longer able to hide among the leaves.

MISTLETOE FOLKLORE

From the earliest times, mistletoe has been one of the most magical, mysterious, and

sacred plants of European folklore. It was considered to bestow life and fertility, protect against poison, and act as an aphrodisiac. In Scandinavian folklore, mistletoe was considered a plant of peace, under which enemies could declare a truce or warring spouses kiss and make-up.

EVIL, PARASITIC PLANT?

In reality, mistletoes are semi-parasitic seed plants that feed on trees and obtain water and mineral salts by sending robot-like structures (haustoria) into vascular tissue of the inner bark. It can rob the branches of nutrients, shade out leaves that are important for photosynthesis and, in extremely stressed trees, it can gradually contribute to tree decline and eventually death. However, it is important to understand that it takes a long time to see the kill; usually, the affected trees are those that are already declining. In my research, however, I found my negative opinion of this hemiparasite shifting. In a recent (2012) experiment conducted in Australia, ecologists monitored bird populations following the removal of mistletoe from select woodlands.

ECOLOGICAL IMPACT OF MISTLETOE REMOVAL

The results were intriguing. As would be expected, the one species that feeds almost exclusively on mistletoe berries, the aptly-named mistletoe bird, vanished from the culled woodlands. Species that make their nests in bunches of mistletoe also tended to disappear. But lots of other birds disappeared, too: around a fifth of them, compared with what had previously existed within the culled patches. Conversely, in regions where mistletoe was left in place, the number of bird species increased, probably because of the end of a prolonged drought in the area. Compared with the species diversity in these patches when the final count was made, the number of species in the culled patches of woodland was down by about a quarter. Mistletoe was thus deemed what ecologists call a "keystone species": it supports an entire ecosystem, and removing it has drastic effects for the whole. This study proved what no previous study ever had: evidence from a controlled experiment that keystone species really exist.

With birds spreading seeds from branch to branch and tree to tree, removal of mistletoe from Sun City trees would prove a costly, ceaseless task. So, while we continue to evaluate desirable hardwood trees and heed the actions advised by our tree expert, keep in mind that, the next time you spot some mistletoe, you may be looking at a plant which truly does foster life and fertility.



Raccoons in Sun City

The raccoon is a medium-sized mammal native to North America and seen only occasionally in Sun City. It has a body length of 16-28 inches and a body weight of 8-20 pounds. The raccoon is typically nocturnal and omnivorous, with a diet consisting of berries, acorns, baby mice, baby birds and eggs, and fish. In urban areas, many raccoons will raid garbage cans or eat pet food. It has a grayish coat, of which almost 90 percent is underfur for insulation against cold weather, with a distinctive "mask" across its face.

Renowned for their intelligence, raccoons have been shown to remember solutions to tasks for up to three years. They engage in gender-specific social behavior, with related females sharing a common area and unrelated males gathering in groups of two to four in order to defend against outside males during mating season, and to protect themselves against other potential invaders. Each spring, females bear litters of two to five "kits," which remain with their mothers until late fall.

The original habitats of raccoons are deciduous and mixed forests of North



America, but due to their adaptability, they have extended their range to urban areas, such as Chicago, where many homeowners consider them to be pests. Though raccoons have been known to live over 20 years in captivity, their life expectancy shrinks dramatically to about two to three years in the wild. This discrepancy can largely be attributed

to hunting and traffic incidents, which have become their most common causes of death.

DETERRING RACCOONS

Though raccoons are very comfortable around humans, it only takes a little forethought to prevent them from digging through your trash, nesting in your attic, or tearing up your garden or lawn. Keep your property neat and temptation free. Don't leave pet food outdoors at night, and make sure the lid to your garbage cans are fastened securely – use a bungee cord, if need be. Because raccoons hate sudden lights and noises, a motion-activated light can deter them from slinking around gardens, garage doors, and chimney openings. If you believe your problem raccoon may have a disease or be protecting babies, keep your pets away from the animal and do not attempt to handle the situation alone. Raccoons can be aggressive in these circumstances, so be sure to contact your local animal control agency or health department immediately. A professional will be able to handle the predicament in a safe and humane way.

How does the following Design Guidelines' article impact you?

3.5 LOT DRAINAGE

- a) As provided for in the CC&Rs (Declaration), when any additions, alterations, renovations or landscaping are performed to an existing detached home, no home owner or resident shall alter the established drainage on any lot to increase the drainage of storm water onto any adjacent property without consent of the home owner(s) of the effected property, the Community Association Facilities Maintenance & Landscaping Department, and the Modifications Committee.
 - Per CC&Rs (Declaration) Article 12.8: Every Lot and the Common Area shall be burdened with easements for natural drainage of storm water runoff from other portions of the Properties; provided, no Person shall alter the natural drainage on any Lot to increase materially the drainage of storm water onto adjacent portions of the Properties without the consent

of the Owner(s) of the affected property, the Board, and the Declarant. This easement shall not extend into Preserve Areas.

- b) Home owners are solely responsible for all drainage issues or retaining wall issues created as a result of modifications implemented on their property.
- c) Approval of an Application for Modification by the Modifications Committee does not relieve the home owner's responsibility for drainage within the boundaries of their property, and from their property to surrounding residential lots, common areas, golf courses, public streets, sewers and storm drains.

When you fill out an application, you are required to initial a box on the form acknowledging responsibility for any changes made to the drainage pattern of your lot and the adjoining homeowner's lots or CA-owned property. Taking into account drainage issues is a very important step when planning any project that will add a significant amount of impervious or inert material to your home's lot. Proper project planning can ensure that you get the most use out of any rainfall, while also preventing you from incurring future costs related to drainage issues for a neighbor or common area.

OUTDOOR DECORATIONS

Many of us have had our outdoor holiday decorations and lights up since November 15 and plan to keep them up until January 15. Because decorative outdoor lights are only to be turned on between sunset and 10 p.m., it is important to remember to turn them off before retiring for the night.

At this time of year, we needn't worry about whether decorations in the front yard exceed 36", nor be concerned about light bulbs that aren't shielded. Only at this time, can we have more than ten items attached to outside walls such as wreaths, angels, and strings of lights or have more than two items hanging from trees.

Above all, remember to keep safety first. Don't climb up that ladder without a spotter. If you don't have a service to install and remove your holiday lights from your roof and/or trees, check with your landscaper or look through the ads in the Directory or the *Sun Rays*.

We all want this to be a joyful holiday season and a Happy New Year!

Notes from the Covenants Committee

Sun City Texas is the Shining Apple of Georgetown. Visitors are amazed at its beauty – green mowed lawns, bright beautiful flowers, well-pruned shrubs and bushes, and its wonderful majestic trees – even the rocks on xeriscape lots. Why is it so beautiful? Because its residents care, and they comply with our Governing Documents.

Unfortunately, the Covenants Committee has recently had to address some lots

where new residents have not landscaped in accordance with paragraphs 5.1 and 5.2 of the CC&Rs. Initial landscape plans must be submitted within 60 days after closing on the house. Then, approved plans must be completed within 120 days. Quite simple! In fact, the developer will include initial landscaping as an option for new homes when they are built.

Article 13.2 of the Design Guidelines set the standards for maintenance of landscapes. Again, they are clear and straight forward. Lawns must be kept mowed. Shrubs and bushes must be kept pruned. No weeds – get rid of them. If you can't do it yourself or don't want to do it, others will do it at a reasonable cost.

Just be sure you are not the "Blemish on the Shining Apple." Avoid having the Covenants Committee come calling. Keep Sun City Texas beautiful – just like Texas!

2014 Deer Census Results

This year's Sun City Texas deer census was conducted on the evenings of September 15, 16 and 17. The total average count for all three nights was 546 deer. The results of each night's count, along with the three-night average, are shown

on the table below.

Based on the 2014 deer census, the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department recommended the removal of 190 deer from CA-controlled property in Sun City. The Wildlife Management Committee has endorsed the TPWD recommendation, which has since been approved by the CA Board of Directors.

DEER TRAPPING

The deer trapping program will begin preparations mid-December with the clearing of trap locations and setting up of feeders. Our deer management program strives to remove deer based on Texas Parks and Wildlife recommendations aimed at preventing high concentrations of deer in a habitat too small to support them. This management practice ensures that our deer will thrive in their existing habitat. 



Sharon periodically seeks Julie's help whenever discomfort or mobility become an issue – in fact, Sharon's already lined up Julie's services to help rebound from surgery to replace her right knee sometime next year.

"Julie finds tight areas that keep my knee from moving like it should and works her magic," says Sharon. "A typical training session involves exercising and manipulating my knee using AquaStretch techniques to carefully stimulate and strengthen the muscles and tendons so that I can walk, bend and do other everyday movements more easily. I always come away refreshed and invigorated."

Sharon chose the water to post-rehabilitate her knee because she knew the water's gentle buoyancy would make the process less painful than similar movements on land. The increased flexibility has come in handy on the tennis court, she says, and she's now able to play the sport regularly again with friends. "My surgeon told me I wouldn't play better after surgery, but I wanted to at least play as well as before," says Sharon. "I knew if I didn't get Julie to help me regain flexibility, I might never have it again."

According to Julie, Sharon's range of motion has increased several degrees thanks to the incorporation of buoyancy-



resistance equipment and in-water walking and step training during their workouts. "I also had Sharon practice with a tennis racquet in the water to prepare for ballistic movement," Julie says. "About two months post rehab, she graduated to the Aqua for Balance group fitness class to continue strengthening her knee and increasing mobility and range of motion. Sharon is determined, dedicated and persistent. She really does have the heart of an athlete."

When my children were young (I think it was during one of the Roosevelt administrations), I remember my daughter asking me, "Daddy, why are you riding a bike that goes nowhere?" Now, many years later, stationary bikes are anything but. At Cycle Express, riders roll with rock music, working with a range of speeds and different levels of resistance. In this vigorous class, people are serious about their fitness. However, like many other classes in Sun City, you can always go at your own pace, so don't let the vigor and stamina of these super cyclists intimidate vou. "You'll get there!" says Leslie McCoy, one of the instructors. "Just do your best."

I spoke to all of the cyclists as they were working out. Many didn't seem that out of breath, and some were even singing along with the music. Every person there praised the class for its fun 45 minutes of aerobic exercise — not to mention the enjoyment of riding without the dangers of allergens, runaway deer, unwary golf carts and speeding SUVs.

Leslie tells me you can burn over 300 calories in one session of Cycle

Express. I double checked on my smart phone, and was thrilled when it told me that I was burning that many calories as well! Maybe I should have let it know I was only watching (just so you know, vicarious calories seem to have no effect on clothing sizes, fitness, or health).

During class, the group often plays "Name That Tune." Most also name the artist, and some even name the album, the record label, and if it was a one-hit wonder.

From what Leslie tells me, biking seems to be the ultimate exercise. "Cycling works the quads, hamstrings, glutes, calves and core," she says. "Plus, it's great for anyone with joint issues because it keeps joint impact to a minimum." So get on a bike! The wheels may not go anywhere, but it will still take you on a journey of health and fitness.


AN ACT OF KINDNESS

When I was 15, I moved away from Farmington, but both grandmothers lived there so I went back frequently.

All this, because the owners of a pool hall, a business which many dismissed as a den of ill repute, had known me well enough to push me to finish college and offer on an unsolicited basis the means to do so.





Carving a Place in Our Hearts

he home of Karl and Mary Ellen Fiedler is an astounding one, filled with handcrafted kachinas, paintings, abstract carvings, and even a six foot tall totem pole – but at Christmastime, prepare to be astounded. Christmas carvings and village scenes cover every surface. Ornately detailed figurines with expressive features peer out from between miniature evergreens and tiny cottages, all surrounded by cragged mountains covered in snow. In a climate where snow is so uncommon that it can send whole cities into a panic, the Fiedler's meticulously constructed holiday landscape offers up memories of Midwestern winters past.

Originally born in Munich, Germany,

Karl Fiedler moved with his family to Chicago in 1951. It was there in that he met Mary Ellen, who had been assigned to teach at the same inner-city high school. The two began a relationship, as well as a teaching career spanning almost 35 years. In 1999, they moved to Sun City to escape the rigors of the harsh Chicagoland climate, reveling in the absence of ice and freezing temperatures (as we all do).

While Karl had been working with wood for most of his life, Mary Ellen was inexperienced in the medium, but after arriving in Sun City, decided to try her hand at it. She showed a great deal of natural talent, and within a little while, Mary Ellen and Karl became cofounders of the Sun City Woodworkers Club.

Neighbors have occasionally wondered at the fact that the pair take on 99% of their interests and hobbies together, but I think that's wonderful. As a writer and a human, it's nice to see two people still obviously in love. Additionally, it is their shared interests which have allowed them to create such a personal, unique, and exciting home. A ten foot tall bookcase lines the walls of their office, complete with a ladder which Karl designed to move along a specialized track. There's the old-fashioned roll top desk, rescued from a scrap heap and refinished to perfection, and the centuryold steamer trunk, also refinished, lined

An ornate cuckoo clock of incredible size hangs prominently on a living room wall, not far from the astounding totem pole made for Karl by some of his former students back in Chicago. The shelves (which they built themselves) are all lined with carvings, and repurposed stained glass items, obtained from a Marriot Hotel, have been transformed into one-of-a-kind accent pieces.

The Fiedler's creative spirit really shines in their seasonal work, like the massive art piece which hangs in their front bedroom. Backed by a plywood sheet, they painstakingly cut together hundreds of Christmas cards, découpaging them into scenes and themes, all in one unforgettable work. The crown jewel of their Christmas display, of course, is their winter village. Comprised of ten segments arranged in their enclosed patio, it includes more than 35 houses, five castles, three churches, a sledding hill (complete with sledders sledding), a ski hill (complete with skiers skiing), a railroad, a ski-lift, a lighthouse, a bridge over untroubled waters, and a flying sleigh with Santa at the reins. Built, rebuilt, expanded and rebuilt again over the last thirty years, the entire panorama takes the Fiedlers roughly five days to pull together. Each streetlight is wired and remotely controlled, and all their clouds and mountain ranges are hand-crafted from Styrofoam, then shaped with a hot wire tool. The Fiedlers say that future expansion of the village is currently on hold, as they still want to be able to have access to their barbecue grill. It's an unforgettable sight, and one absolutely worth seeing.

Should you be unimpressed by all of their artistic endeavors, the Fielders also lend their formidable carving skills to Project Cane, a part of the Wounded Warrior program, in which woodcarvers across the nation come together to carve canes for our veterans in need. Since the program's adoption, Sun City woodcarvers have contributed over 70 canes to the Brooks Army Medical Center in San Antonio, TX. The couple helped pass out canes featuring eagle head grips and painted with a state flag to soldiers newly returned home. Though the Fiedlers initially feared a long drive home filled with a heavy load of gloom and sadness, they found themselves amazed by the positive response from the soldiers in San Antonio and felt their spirits lifted by the gratitude and joy. And in meeting these remarkable people and taking in the beautiful work they have done, I can honestly say that my spirits have been lifted as well.

December Tips for a Beautiful Water Wise Landscape

Now is a good time to look around at community areas for drought-tolerant plants that will brighten your winter landscape, such as possumhaw holly, green or gray Santolina, and Color Guard yucca. If you planted spring-flowering wildflowers this fall, they will begin coming up and add cheerful green color as well.

If you plant now, remember to first add compost for moisture retention and drainage as well as nutrients. For perennials, be sure to have covers ready should we have a hard freeze. This is the ideal time to plant bushes and trees. If you plant a tree in an area that does not have soil already amended, dig a rough hole the same height as root ball and fill only with existing soil. Hole depth is important, too. When planted, the crown should be at soil level or a little above to allow for soil settling. You should be able to see the root flare at base of trunk.

On the day before any planting, if the hole is dry, dig and water the hole. If you don't, dry soil will draw moisture from the root ball. Always water any plant the night before planting, whether it is in a container or in the ground, so roots and stem will be well-hydrated.

Make a berm around the plant, so that water will stay in the hole and settle slowly for deep watering to reach roots. At the time of planting, the berm should be at the outer edge of the root ball. As the bush or tree grows, move the berm further out to the drip line. Mulch well!

Fresh herbs such as rosemary, thyme, and sage are delicious in your holiday cooking, and Mexican mint marigold is always our family favorite with poultry. Remember that foliage such as magnolia, silver leaf germander, rosemary, Santolina and yaupon are lovely in your holiday decorations!

DECEMBER GARDENING TIPS

- You can trim oak trees now when temperatures are cold, but all wounds in oak trees must be painted immediately — any time, any size.
- Clean up the garden. To avoid the spread of disease, remove fallen leaves (especially in rose beds and under trees and other plants).
- Do not walk on wet or frozen lawn.
 In addition to compacting the soil, dormant warm-season grass cannot repair itself now.
- Remember, container plants need more cold protection to protect roots.
 Any plant covering should be secured at the bottom. It is the root system

Today we enjoy a total membership of over 250. Membership is based on individuals, but all our events are couples-oriented play days.

The CGA is a great club that allows residents to mix with old and new friends while enjoying a round of golf. It allows us to play golf in a casual manner, yet still allows for a bit of competition. Because Sun City's amenities offer so many options for us, husbands are often busy participating in their clubs and the wives are off in another direction participating in theirs. The CGA gives us the opportunity to come together and participate in a golf activity together.

We were also fortunate enough to have received encouragement from other established golf clubs. It seems that we simply tapped into a need that already existed here.

As January 2015 approaches, we are looking back with satisfaction at our first year of existence, but this is only the beginning! We are looking forward to the club's members and leadership that will take what is currently established and move it forward.

News from the SC Stacks

Tis the season for giving, and many of us spend more than we should to buy gifts for family and friends. I have a gift suggestion which is not new or original: give your time, ideas and energy instead. There are various ways that you can do this to make life better for someone or even many people, such as making time for people in need of help (regardless of whether they are friends or strangers), always looking for the best in people, and being polite and courteous in all situations. If we all could do this, imagine what a wonderful world this would be!

Another way to give is to volunteer. I am frequently asked about volunteering in our Library. Currently, there are about 50 volunteers, as well as a staffing coordinator who ensures the library is managed by at least one person most of the day. There are several women who have been with the library for many years, some almost from the beginning, and I really appreciate all that they have done and continue to do for our library. The rest of us are relative newcomers (seven years or less) and add energy and new ideas to the group.

What does it take to become a library volunteer? Being able to set aside at least two hours each week to work in or for the library is required. The ability to reach high shelves and low shelves, and being able to lift and carry a number of books is desirable. Being neat and organized is a plus. Library experience is not required, but is helpful. An appreciation of books is, of course, expected. We allow time off for trips and vacations and when health issues or emergencies arise - after all, we are retirees as well as volunteers!

Each week, volunteers shelve and straighten books and generally tidy up both fiction and non-fiction areas. About eight volunteers meet on first and third Tuesday mornings to process books donated during the preceding two or three weeks, and this is when we need to close the library so we can work in the small space more quickly with no interruptions and extra people moving about. At each session we process about 200-300 books. An additional group called the Recyclers meets to prepare approximately 300-400 culled books to go to various places such as The Caring Place, Goodwill, Georgetown Library resale shop, veteran groups, small startup area libraries or nursing homes. This has become quite an outreach program for the Library and Sun City Texas.

The volunteers work hard at keeping our library in good order, giving all of us the best possible selection of books in a pleasant and relaxed setting. Their dedication benefits the entire community, and visitors are impressed by our very unique library - I know my daughter was impressed! She admitted after I took her there that she had expected a small room with a few metal shelves and old, worn-out books. Instead, she sees what amounts to one and one-half rooms overflowing with current books in very good condition!

About five years ago, I was asked to estimate the number of hours the 18 volunteers spent working for the library. I polled the volunteers and was surprised to learn that it was nearly 3,200 hours per year! I am sure that the amount of hours has grown tremendously since then along with the number of volunteers.

To volunteer, contact me by e-mail, giving your address and phone number. I give orientations as needed, usually when there are four or more volunteers waiting, about every five to six weeks. The one-hour orientation covers where certain books and items are kept, and how we do our work.

Remember to thank a volunteer when you see one!

he Sun City Singers are a disparate group of people who simply like to sing. The oldest chartered club in Sun City, the Singers was founded about 18 years ago by former band director George Nelson. When Mr. Nelson retired from the position in December of 2005, current director Dick Anderson stepped up to the podium and has been there ever since.

"I try to make each rehearsal an enjoyable one," reports Anderson, who says he uses humor and empathy to instill a sense of fellowship within the group. "The esprit de corps is very high, and our board works hard to encourage and preserve that togetherness."

The Choir itself is made up of approximately 130-140 Sun City Residents, some newly retired, others well into their 80s, and all dedicated to attending weekly rehearsals. They're accompanied by pianists Nancy Wright and Sharon Odom, both long tenured with the group.

From traditional to calypso, the Sun City Singers are prepared to tackle any piece, singing with enthusiasm and joy. Gathering so many individuals together week after week to learn, rehearse,

perfect, and perform numerous musical pieces in a full-house concert is no small undertaking, though some events are more challenging than others. "There have been some difficult pieces that we have conquered that have been special," says Anderson. Enthusiastic audience reception has contributed greatly to the group's willingness to take on more

complex arrangements, including the work of acclaimed British composer John Rutter, whose work will be included in the Singer's upcoming Christmas Concert.

Also operating under the banner of the Singers Club are the Mountain Dulcimer and Traditional Troubadours special interest groups, neither of whom require choral singing. Though both groups focus their interests on informal folk instrumentation, the Dulcimers focus primarily on the unique, zither-like instrument for which its group is named. The Troubadours, on the other hand, are open to jam with most any traditional folk instrument (acoustic only, please).

All three groups celebrate music with enthusiasm and joy, as well as many hours of practice and diligence. Hear their talents with your own ears by stopping in on one of the gigs, jam sessions or rehearsals posted on their website, or by attending their celebrated holiday concert on December 3 or 4. 




