

Con Games and Fraud Schemes

Most people feel they are too smart to be conned, but the fact is, people from all walks of life are defrauded every year! By educating yourself on some common scams, you can avoid falling victim to fraud.

CON GAMES

Pigeon Drop – A stranger approaches, informing you about finding a large sum of money and they want to share it with you – provided, of course, you can front some "good faith" money. This tactic – often seen in scam emails and with very tight time restrictions – comes out of the blue. Before agreeing to anything, ask yourself: why would a stranger reach out to *you* before contacting their own friends and loved ones?

The Obit Column Sting – In their most vulnerable time, surviving spouses may suddenly receive bills for phony debts, purchases, etc. Do not allow these "charges" to go unresearched! According to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), surviving family members typically are under no legal obligation to resolve the debts of the deceased, and are protected by the Fair Debt Collection Practices Act (FDCPA) from aggressive or abusive collectors (this includes collection agencies, consolidators, and lawyers). If suspicious bills arrive in the mail or aggressive "collectors" start phoning following the passing of a loved one, notify the FTC immediately.

The Pyramid Scheme – Pyramid schemes always follow a predictable formula, offering you the opportunity to make a high return on a small investment, provided that you ask others to do the same. In reality, only those running the schemes make any money, while you (and anyone you convinced to invest along with you) lose out big. Always research opportunities thoroughly before handing over your money.

FRAUD SCHEMES

Medical Fraud – Beware of any offer promising a "miracle cure" or specialized medications without a doctor's prescription. See your physician when health issues arise, and be sure to ask exactly what you will be charged and what your out-of-pocket costs will be. Never sign blank insurance forms, and never give your insurance/Medicare information to anyone other than those who have provided you with medical services.

Foreign Lotteries – Playing a foreign lottery through the mail or over the phone is a violation of U.S. law, plain and simple, and you can rest assured that you have not won any contests that you never entered in the first place. Depositing strange "prize winnings" will not only provide scam artists with direct access to your bank account – it will leave you holding the bill when your bank fines you for overdrafts and bounced checks.

Recovery Fraud – Targeting former victims of fraud, scam artists pose as legitimate organizations, promising to recover lost finances – for an advanced fee or donation, of course. No legitimate consumer or

2015, Here we go!

The holidays are past and we're kicking off another exciting year here in Sun City Texas! I hope everyone had a great holiday season. We have a lot planned for the year, and I am thrilled to have this opportunity to share a few of these plans with you.

LANDSCAPING ENHANCEMENTS

Per the budget process approval, we will be spending a considerable amount of time and money enhancing the landscaping along Del Webb Boulevard. Work will begin just south of Berry Creek Bridge on Del Webb, and advance out toward Williams Drive. Much of this work involves replacing necessary turf, changing landscaped bed configurations, reducing irrigation when possible and generally improving aesthetics. I hope everyone will appreciate the changes to this area and, please know, we have more years of work ahead to complete Del Webb Boulevard.

NEW WEBSITE

The unveiling of our new website is coming up quickly, ready to provide residents with greater ease and access to our community's information. Scheduled to launch in February, this project has been in the works for some time and I am confident our residents will love it! I would like to take this opportunity to thank Krystal Wilson, Rob McFall and everyone who worked so hard to get this site up and running.

EXPANSION

The expansion of Sun City Texas continues to be the buzz of the community, and I encourage all residents to stay engaged with the process. When requested, please complete expansionrelated surveys and provide input on what you might like to see included in our community. Keep in mind, however, that we will be responsible for the financing and maintenance of projects once the developer is gone.

SAFETY

With the help of the Emergency Management Committee, we will continue to ensure everyone's safety and plan for the unexpected disasters we hope never to face. Our COPs will continue to patrol our community and our Firewise efforts will continue reducing fuel loads in our Common Areas. While we take pride in being a safe community, we will never let down our guard. The EMC will continue to provide informative articles and friendly reminders on the importance of safety and proper planning.

STAFF COMPENSATION

Over 150 employees keep our community running, day in, day out. To ensure we are compensating these individuals properly, we will be contracting with a third party to perform a compensation study, determining where we are today and where we need to be. This Board-supported project has budgetary funds allocated in 2015, and our goal will be to conduct such studies every five years.

ARTICLE 13 INSPECTIONS

To ensure our community continues to look good and property values remain strong, the Community Standards team will continue inspections of all homeowner property in Sun City Texas, confirming adherence to the protocol laid out in Article 13 of the Design Guidelines. By the end of 2014, approximately 2500 homes had been inspected. Note: non-compliance issues are addressed privately with the homeowners.

GOLF COURSE PROJECTS

Our golf team will continue to work with the Golf Committee to ensure that maintenance projects on our three great courses are completed in a timely and cost-efficient manner. Major focus areas will include tree trimming, sand replacement of Legacy Hills' greenside bunkers, cart path drop-off mitigation, enhancement of decomposed granite areas and resolution of drainage issues. Also, our golf team will continue working toward Audubon Certification for our three courses.

There are many more projects and plans in the works for 2015, but I hope this short list has given you an idea of what's to come! Happy New Year to all,

Nominating Committee 2014 Fall Cycle Report

This cycle we had forty-two applicants file for twenty CA Advisory Committee openings. Two candidates withdrew their applications, and two did not meet the minimum requirements to serve. These numbers were down significantly from the spring cycle. We hope this decrease was attributable to the heavy interest in the Expansion Task Force, whose recruitment process coincided with the normal fall cycle.

The Nominating Committee interviewed thirty-eight Sun City residents. Of the nine incumbents who reapplied for second terms, all were approved by the Board of Directors to continue serving. Of the thirty-eight interviewees, twenty-nine were men and nine were women. The Board of Directors appointed fourteen men and six women to our committees.

Of the thirty-eight interviewees, twenty-three have been residents for five or fewer years, nine had been residents for six to ten years, and the remaining six had resided in Sun City for over ten years.

This Committee is dedicated to recommending the very best candidates to the Board in the most impartial and fair manner. It has been our goal to make the experience as pleasant as possible for candidates. Carbon Monoxide Dangers

Carbon monoxide (CO) often is called the invisible killer. Odorless, tasteless and colorless, this gas is created when

fuels burn incompletely. CO can build up in the home when fuel-burning appliances (such as furnaces, stoves, hot water heaters and fireplaces) are used improperly or without correct ventilation. Cooking equipment can also serve as a source of CO, as can exhaust from motor vehicles.

Easily absorbed by the lungs, CO robs you of life-giving oxygen by displacing the oxygen in your blood. Symptoms of CO poisoning are similar to those of the flu, including headaches, fatigue, nausea, dizzy spells, confusion, and irritability. Sustained exposure can result in

unconsciousness and, eventually, death. Seniors, individuals with compromised immune systems and those with heart and lung problems are particularly vulnerable.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission recommends that every home have at least one carbon monoxide detector installed near the sleeping area. Unlike smoke alarms, which trigger when smoke is detected, a carbon monoxide alarm triggers based on CO exposure over a period of time, ensuring occupants are alerted before they begin to experience symptoms.

Never ignore a CO alarm. If it sounds, don't panic. Press the "Mute" button to quiet the alarm temporarily. Move outdoors or to an open window. Call 9-1-1 from the fresh air area and wait

for emergency personnel to arrive. Leave the CO alarm where it is, as emergency responders will want to check it when they arrive. Do not re-enter your home until the emergency responder has arrived, your home is aired out and your CO alarm returns to normal operation. Carbon monoxide risks can be lowered by having your fuel-burning home equipment inspected by a professional every year. Never use an oven to heat your home. Do not operate an automobile engine inside a closed garage. With minimal safeguards and some common sense, you can easily protect your family and yourself from carbon monoxide poisoning in the home.

Water Conservation Methods: A Test of Two Products

When it comes to keeping your turf and landscape alive and looking good during a Texas summer, the wealth of available products can make it hard to know where to invest your dollars. Should I install a SMART irrigation controller? Should I irrigate with spray heads or drip? Should I add a soil moisture sensor to my system? Should I change my soil's profile? Should I replace turf with hardscape? And what exactly will be my return on investment should I choose to make major changes?

In an effort to resolve these questions, we, at the CA Landscape Department, would like to share some of what we've learned in our ongoing effort to find effective and affordable landscaping solutions. Over the past year, we have been testing two products, the pros and cons of which we would like to discuss. We'll start with an amendment to our existing irrigation system.

Probably you are aware of the little plastic rain sensor on your roofline which shuts off irrigation during a rain event. Ever wonder if it does what it's supposed to do? A simple check after a rain event will give you the answer. Open your controller after a rain event, and you'll find a little red light, along with the notification "Irrigation Suspended by Rain Sensor." Of course, your rain sensor switch must be in the "ON" position in order to work properly.

What if you want to check it right now, with no rain in sight? Simply get out your garden hose and get the rain sensor wet! The light will come on when the sensor interrupts the circuit. Generally, these rain sensors hold up well, but upgraded sensors recently have been put on the market. Consider investing in a wireless Rain/Freeze sensor.

PROS

The wireless sensors can be situated in the perfect location along the roofline, away from the controller. Make sure there are no tree limbs overhanging the device and that the sensor is facing north (and please let the professional get on the ladder).

The Rain/Freeze sensor also will suspend irrigation in the event of a freeze. When temperatures drop to 38 degrees, the irrigation system will not be allowed to run. Should you forget to cut your system

off, no one will pay to skate on your lot's new ice rink.

CONS

One common complaint about the rain sensor prevails: It dries out quickly in wind and sun. So, while an inch of rain may fall and thoroughly saturate the soil, the irrigation system will still run on the next scheduled day unless the controller is physically turned off. What is the solution to this problem?

Just as your rain sensor suspends irrigation during rainfall, devices known as "Soil Moisture Sensors" will suspend irrigation while soil is already wet. Sensors range from wired to wireless, and one product even has a built-in freeze sensor. Should you opt to add the soil sensor to your lot's irrigation system, we suggest not disconnecting your rain sensor. Rain sensors save gallons during a rain event, just as a soil sensor saves gallons after a rain. Overall, it's more savings for you when sensors are used in combination.

Over the past year, we have been collecting data on 35 Maintained Homes equipped with both sensors. During 2014's mild summer, we saw plenty of rain events and great results. Perhaps most amazing was the soil sensor's ability to pick up on a heavy morning dew and, calibrated and set correctly, save irrigation water.

The new city ordinance for new landscape construction requires a soil moisture sensor to be installed along with existing rain sensors. Installation of this product is fairly simple, but is best left to a professional with the experience and knowhow to troubleshoot issues.

Expect an average investment of around \$200-230 for an average water savings of 30% (though in some of our test homes, we saw up to 60% savings, on average). The more rain we receive, the bigger the savings. Once all is dialed in, you can leave town for up to six months, confident in your conservation.

Now: What if you could increase your soil's moisture holding capacity, leaving it wetter, longer? Until our article continues in February, we'll say only this: Aqua Smart!

Happy New Year! What is going on in the Landscaped Maintained Homes? TCB is working on the perennial cutbacks of dormant plant material which was missed due to December Christmas lights. TCB will also continue to perform monthly irrigation checks, weed control beds and apply mulch to maintain a two inch depth throughout. Pruning and canopy lifting for building clearance will be performed in February and March on any installed trees.

Aaron and I will continue to monitor landscapes and start planning for spring replacements. Water wise and drought tolerant plants will continue to be utilized, as well as the implementation of xeriscaping principles where applicable.

Bits of Info from Ginny's Desk

Happy New Year! Please continue to enjoy your decorations until January 15, which is the deadline for taking down holiday decorations.

If you are changing or modifying the outside appearance of your residence, you will need approval from the Modifications Committee, which can be obtained by way of an application (this excludes projects listed in the "No Paperwork" table of the Design Guidelines.) To locate the Design Guidelines on the website, please go to www.sctxca.org and log on with your Member ID and password. Choose "Site Index" at the top of the menu, then, under "D", choose Design Guidelines for the most recent version.

If the change you are contemplating is a paint project, you will need to submit a Form B-2 for any color changes. Remember to map the color sample in the paint chip binder if your shade isn't a custom reproduction pulled from the binder. You will also want to submit a color chip so that the Committee can decide if the color is close enough. Be sure to use the paint only for its intended use (i.e. accent for shutters, stucco for garage door and stucco, trim paint colors for fascia, etc.).

Please use a Form B-1 for any other modification.

When you bring the completed application with attachments to the Community Standards Office, we will review the form and make sure all the required information is submitted, helping to make a successful outcome more likely for your modifications.

This year, the Modifications Committee

will meet in the Andice Room at Cowan Creek on the first and third Thursday of each month (excepting January, in which the meetings will be the second and fourth Thursday). The deadline for application submittal remains the same as before: noon on the Friday prior to the meeting.

When your project is approved, you will receive a permit via email, attached to your approval message as a PDF file. Your permit need only be posted while the work is ongoing. Upon completion of the project, you can dispose of the permit as you wish. The CA staff will inspect your project within roughly six to eight weeks following approval.

Happy New Year, Sun City – we're here to help keep you safe!

COPs, or Citizens on Patrol, is a large part of the reason Sun City has the lowest crime rate in Georgetown. Our highly visible cars patrol day and night, deterring those with bad intentions and helping to keep residents safe.

COPs started in 1998, when some residents, intending to supplement Neighborhood Watch groups, proposed to the Executive Director a Citizens on Patrol effort. The original heroes (of whom there are too many to name) collaborated with the Georgetown Chief of Police and Training Officers to hash out a plan,

stressing that volunteers were to observe and report without getting involved or being put in harm's way. Over 103 recruits volunteered for the cause!

Del Webb, very concerned about safety and security, made COPs possible. They leased a patrol van, while the very supportive Georgetown Police Department supplied some of the equipment used. As COPs grew, a second van was leased in 2000, followed by the donation of two patrol vehicles by Don Hewlett, providing a significant savings to the Community Association. SCTXCA is still responsible for insurance, fuel, and any damage to the vehicles, but manages to

cover these essentials on a budget of less than \$20,000 per year. Compare this to the estimated \$75,000 or more each year outside patrol services would cost.

Over the years, hundreds of residents have been COPs for some period of time. New members are always needed! If you're a concerned citizen crazy about Sun City, we'd love to welcome you!

You will need:

- · Valid driver's license
- · Good driving record
- · No criminal convictions

You won't have to confront, chase or challenge anyone. You don't have to uphold community standards. You won't have to carry a weapon, personally or in the car. You just might help find a lost person or pet...reward in itself!

COPs volunteer just 4 hours a month in 2-hour shifts. You can drive, staff the office (at home) or maintain cars (gas up, take in for service or to the car wash). Call the office for information: 512-966-1362, Monday–Friday 9:30 a.m.–5 p.m.

Veteran Burial Benefits



Are you an honorably discharged veteran from active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces? If so, you and your spouse are likely eligible for this incomparable State of Texas Veterans Cemetery benefit. Internment at the Central Texas State Veterans Cemetery-Killeen is at no cost for the veteran and minimal cost for the spouse. The benefit includes: space, concrete liner (for caskets), opening/closing, headstone, engraving and perpetual care. There are three options for cremated remains: Columbarium Wall; Scattering Garden; and In-ground Internment. Military Honors are arranged through your Funeral Director. Misinformation continues to keep eligible veterans from applying for this benefit, including:

- · You must be a Texas resident: False
- My spouse cannot be buried there: False
- · You must be killed in action: False
- · You must be a disabled or retired veteran: False

Unlike the National System, the Texas program allows you

In early 2002, eight Veterans presented the CA Board of Directors with a plan to build a Veterans Memorial. With the Board's approval, they raised the funds to build the Georgetown-Williamson County Veterans Memorial, officially dedicating it on Memorial Day, 2003. These veterans became the nucleus of the Veterans Memorial Advisory Group (VMAG), a sub-committee of the CA Property and Grounds Committee which oversees our Memorial and conducts the annual Memorial Day and Veterans Day ceremonies. Today, the VMAG has grown to 24 dedicated members, each committed to ensuring our service men and women, veterans, and their families are honored appropriately.

Coyotes in Sun City

Coyotes are a part of Sun City's wildlife. Urban and suburban coyotes, like urban deer, are symptoms of a broader issue resulting from the continued expansion of human housing and developments into what used to be open wildlife habitats. Particularly on the expanding fringes of large metropolitan areas, this trend increases the potential for encounters and conflicts between people and wildlife.

The coyote is a native member of the dog family, weighing an average of 25-40 pounds and standing about 26 inches at the shoulder. Similar in size to a small German Shepherd, the coyote has long, slender legs, a bushy tail with a black tip, and large, triangular ears which are held erect. Coyotes have very acute hearing, and their sense of smell is highly developed. There is no mistaking the yellow eyes and black, round pupils. When moving through their habitat, coyotes typically do the "dog trot" or a gentle lope, but can gallop up to 35 miles per hour if pursued or chasing prey.

The food habits of coyotes are varied. They are omnivorous, and will feed on almost anything which can be eaten, including garbage, carrion, fresh meat

in the form of both wild and domestic animals and insects. Strong swimmers, it is not uncommon for coyotes to prey on frogs, fish, and snakes. Fruits and vegetables are commonly consumed in the autumn and winter months. Although their natural diet consists largely of rabbits, rodents, and carrion, covotes will prey on poultry and smaller livestock. Urban and suburban coyotes have been known to eat human rubbish, and will catch cats and dogs, though the bulk of the coyote diet in both urban and rural areas is comprised of rodents. Experiments have shown that removal of covotes results in a dramatic increase in rodent abundance.

As with any warm blooded animal, a coyote's bite carries a risk of rabies.

If you spot a coyote(s), avoid contact at all costs and move slowly out of the area. To be safe, follow these general rules:

- Maintain pets on a leash at all times, especially when on walks on nature trails. Do not use extension leashes, as these are easily dropped or jerked out of your hand, allowing your dog to get too far ahead of you.
- 2. If you encounter a coyote while walking a small dog, pick up and carry the dog; this will prevent it from attacking in an effort to protect its owner.
- Coyotes are attracted to dog food. Do not leave pet food dishes outdoors, as the coyote will eat any food left in the dishes and come to regard your yard as a source of food.
- 4. Ensure garage doors remain closed and trash containers covered when put out for pickup.
- 5. Use noise-makers or other scaring devices when covotes are seen.







Athlete of the Month By Lynda Dufour

n 1918, Babe Ruth's Boston Red Sox beat the Chicago Cubs in a World Series highlighted by the first-ever playing of the Star Spangled Banner during a professional sporting event. The band's performance during that first seventh inning stretch rallied Americans, weary of World War I and the Spanish flu pandemic. That same year, entertainment news covered the first marriage of silent film star Charlie Chaplin, politicos debated women's suffrage, and our Athlete of the Month was born on January 8 in Des Moines, Iowa.

Those who do the math know that makes Stuart Foulke 97 years old this month. It's a number that's hard to fathom when you watch Stuart – spry and always smiling – easily push 50 pounds on the seated leg press, or 25 pounds on the tricep extension machine, doing two sets of 12 repetitions on both at the Sun City Texas Cowan Creek Fitness Center.

"I inherited good genes from my parents," says a modest Stuart, the youngest of 10 children. "But first and foremost," he adds, "my relationship with my Lord Jesus Christ has given me a positive outlook on life."

Stuart served with the Army Air Corp for several years before graduating first in his class from the University of Iowa School of Dentistry in 1951. He started playing tennis at age 15 and golf at age 28. Coupled with a busy lifestyle, those two sporting activities kept him in shape for many years after he retired in 1996. According to his wife, Betty, that's when his activity slowed and his energy level began to decline. "You could just see him not having any energy," says Betty. "It was just too easy for him to sit in the chair and watch Fox News."

With Betty's encouragement, Stuart began working with personal trainer Don Elgin following the couple's move to Sun City Texas in the spring of 2014. Stuart continues to train three days each week under Don's supervision. A typical session begins with cardio warm-up on the Nu-Step machine, followed by upper, mid- and lower-body strength training. Each

session ends with stretching on the slant board.

"Stuart has a great attitude," says Don. "He is a true gentleman with a quick wit and a great sense of humor. Stuart demonstrates that it's never too late to improve a person's physical fitness. At his age, he is an inspiration to us all."

or those of us who could use a good stretch, this is the class to attend. This course will also help to enhance your balance, and as I can't even balance my checkbook, I figured I should get myself to a Pilates class sooner rather than later. After spending a day as an observant, I can tell you that I plan to take it (so if you see me there, please don't laugh when I'm floundering on the mats like a whale on a sandy beach).

Instructor Anna Easterling has a mellow voice which invites you to perform the exercises at your own pace and at ability level. She's not some shouting drill instructor, so you will come out feeling refreshed and fulfilled (instead of paranoid and alarmed).

Anna was trained in teaching Pilates through a five-year program led by certified instructors. In addition to Pilates, she is a trained yoga instructor and recently has begun teaching aqua aerobics as well. Her upbeat and welcoming demeanor makes you glad you joined the Pilates class.

Pilates, Anna told me, is a combination of breathing exercises intended to develop concentration, control, alignment, precision, and relaxation. Combined, these elements help in the development, strengthening and stability of the body's "core muscles;" then, that centered connection radiates vitality throughout the body. The class is also aimed at improving your flexibility. I'm presently about as flexible as a steel girder, so the class should do wonders for me.

When participating in this class, be absolutely sure to give yourself lots of space! Though there's not much equipment involved in Pilates, there's plenty of movement. If you don't want to take a

foot to the head, be sure to be thoughtful about where you put your mat.

I got a kick out of this class, the way it was presented, the benefits it provided. Odds are you will, too, so give Beginner Pilates a try! The class meets on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays at Cowan Creek, from 11:45 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. You will need to purchase tickets, which you can do at the the monitor's desk in either fitness center.

n a state that treasures its longhorns and "Hook'em!" is an instantly recognizable phrase (and hand sign), to discover that the University of Texas (UT) mascot was once a pit bull mix named Pig is nothing short of astonishing. "Sic'em, Pig!" just doesn't raise the adrenaline, does it?

But, that was a long time ago. It's been 98 years and 14 Bevo incarnations since the longhorn took his rightful place at sports events, pep rallies, bowl games and Presidential inaugurations as the quintessential embodiment of Texas pride, determination, resilience, and independence.

And, like any love affair, there have been occasional moments of high drama, like the time Bevo II charged an SMU cheerleader who had to defend himself with his megaphone, or when Bevo III escaped his enclosure and spent the next

two days running amok across campus. There was the time Bevo V broke loose and scattered the Baylor band, and the Cotton Bowl incident in which Bevo XIII missed the game after breaking away from his handlers and heading for greener pastures. His spur-of-themoment stand-in was on the grey side, and fans commented how much "Bevo" had aged since the previous week.

The last two Bevos have come from a ranch northwest of Austin, where XIV currently lounges when he is not otherwise scheduled to whip up Texas pride and UT fan support. In 2004, XIV assumed UT mascot duties at only two years of age. In one of his first official functions, the young Bevo headed to Washington, D.C. in January 2005 for the inauguration of President George W. Bush. Closer to six feet than five feet tall and a hefty one ton in weight, he cuts

an imposing figure (Bevo that is). Members of the Silver Spurs, UT's student handler organization, hold long leads to his halter, keeping well out of reach of a casual toss of the horns (which measure 78 inches, tip to tip).

Bevo's owners say proudly that neither XIII nor XIV has ever been drugged in order to stand calmly at the sidelines during a UT game, though the owner is always at hand in case of emergency. This policy was instituted after Bevo took exception to some fireworks which had not been discussed previously with the handlers or owners (not good to upset a behemoth with REALLY long horns). Both Bevos were bred for docility and have been handled by humans since they were babies. They even earned national championship status in the show ring before their careers took a celebrity turn. Even now, the owners know that they

REVEILLE

Texas A&M University - College Station, Texas



If kids revered their parents the way A&M does Reveille, we'd be living in a very different world. During World War II, Reveille was granted the honorary title of Cadet General, making her the highest-ranking member of the Corps of Cadets. She has her own wardrobe (daily and formal), towels, bedding, and a blanket emblazoned with five diamonds. The only non-service animal allowed in campus buildings, students are dismissed whenever

can pet and caress XIV without risk of upset on his part (though the parttime journalist maintained a comfortable distance).

As popular as longhorns are now, it was only 125 years or so ago that they were at greater risk for extinction than the buffalo. The product of natural crosses between wild cattle left by the Spanish and settlers' free-range domestic cattle, longhorns became known for their ability to survive on minimal and varied vegetation, their easy calving, for their adaptability and longevity, and for their resistance to many diseases and parasites. Returning Civil War veterans found millions of them roaming the plains of Texas, and between 1866 and 1895, trailed about ten million of them to markets to feed hungry people in the North.

Fencing of the open ranges and the importation of other beef breeds in the late 1800s did to longhorns what the prairies of Texas couldn't do - virtually wiped out the breed. In an effort to save the longhorns, the Federal Government took action in 1927, appropriating \$3,000 to finance a 5,000-mile round-up of the remaining twenty-three longhorns in the southern Texas/northern Mexico area. Later, other private parties began building herds as well, and the Texas icon was preserved.

Unlike other cattle, longhorns come in a variety of colors and patterns, and their meat is very lean - some research claims longhorn steaks contain less cholesterol than skinless chicken breasts. Not that Bevo XIV is worried about appearing on a dinner table – from his calm demeanor amidst the accolades and hoopla, it's clear he was born to be a star.

JUDGE JOY & JUDGE LADY

Baylor University - Waco, Texas



Baylor began competing in intercollegiate sports as early as the 1890s, though a mascot was not selected until 1914, when bears beat out contenders such as the Baylor Ferrets and the Baylor Bookworms. Baylor's first live bear was provided in 1918 as a parting gift from the 107th Engineers, stationed at Camp MacArthur (with, apparently, bears). Against all common sense, students (particularly Aggies) have made multiple efforts to feed,

free, and even kidnap Baylor's bear, including one incident in which two A&M students, in an attempted abduction, watched helplessly as their enraged captive tore apart their vehicle from the inside out. Lesson learned: don't steal bears. *Photo: The Texas Collection at Baylor University*

PERUNA

Southern Methodist University - Dallas, Texas



Named for a Prohibition Era medicinal with a curiously high ABV, Peruna the Shetland pony may seem out of place at the helm of the SMU Mustangs. But, like his namesake, there's more to Peruna than what meets the eye. To the delight of SMU fans everywhere, Peruna remains unapologetic for the following: knocking Bevo to the ground; subjecting Texas Tech's horse, Misty, to his untoward attentions; "fertilizing" TCU's newly

branded field turf, and perhaps most notably, kicking the Fordham ram in the head, killing it instantly. *Photo: SMU Rotunda Yearbook, 1933*

RALPHIE

University of Colorado - Boulder, Colorado



You might not expect the role of a mascot named "Ralphie" to always be filled by a female. But then, you wouldn't expect an institution with such pride in its physics program would hand some sophomores a fully grown buffalo. A regular at games since 1966, the handling of 1,300 lb Ralphie has been a learning process, with valuable lessons including the level of damage a charging buffalo can do to an infield, how many votes it takes to crown a

January Tips for a Beautiful Water Wise Landscape

Begin 2015 knowing you can have a lush, beautiful green landscape that is drought tolerant. Whether you are new to our area or have enjoyed lovely Sun City for years, you can find intriguing design ideas simply by driving around and studying the beautiful community and individual landscapes. Find what fits your needs, lifts your mood, and makes you feel comfortable! The help you need to realize your goals is readily available in each step to success in water wise landscaping.

Plan: Water wise, drought tolerant landscaping begins with a plan. The research-proven techniques best suited for our area that preserve and protect our environment can be found in the Earth-Kind program at the Texas A&M University Horticulture Earth-Kind website (http://aggie-horticulture.tamu. edu/earthkind/files/2010/10/design.pdf). Also, be sure to check our Sun City Design Guidelines; to locate them, please go to www.sctxca.org and log on with your Member ID and password. Choose "Site Index" at the top of the menu, then, under "D", choose Design Guidelines for the most recent version.

Soil Amendment: This process is the essential first step to water efficient, beautiful landscaping. Soil with organic content in it will not only nourish the plant but allow for drainage, aeration, and better moisture retention. Begin with a soil test which will tell you any specific amendments needed, then include four to six inches (or one-third total) organics (compost). See my November 2014 Sun Rays article for additional details.

For information on soil tests, how to submit a soil sample and meaning of the results, go to http://publications.tamu.edu/SOIL_CONSERVATION_

NUTRIENTS/E-534.pdf. If you decide to have your soil tested, go to soiltesting. tamu.edu and click "Our Submittal Forms," then, "Urban Soil Submittal Form."

Plant Choice: Native/adapted plants are adapted to our changing climate. These monthly Sun Rays articles recommend plants, but the greatest help available is the notebook produced by the Sun City Garden Club, "What Grows Here," available at the Monitor's Desk at both Texas Drive and Cowan Creek Centers. The Grow Green book, "Native and Adapted Landscape Plants of Central Texas," by Texas AgriLIFE Extension and City of Austin, is available for purchase from the Member Services Office at 2 Texas Drive.

On-the-spot help for choosing plants will be available at the Sun City Horticulture Club and Master Gardener plant sales this spring. Further information will be available in the March issue of *Sun Rays*.

Maintenance: This column can be found in every issue of *Sun Rays*, featuring information about timely planting, trimming, watering advice, and more. Stay tuned!

If websites are too impersonal, come to the Sun City Garden Club Help Desk before each meeting, or contact the AgriLIFE Extension Office. These organizations are staffed by master gardeners who love to share and help you! The Garden Club meets the second Wednesday of each month and begins at 12:30 p.m. with the question/answer period.

JANUARY GARDENING TIPS

 Major pruning of non-flowering landscape trees and shrubs is best done while dormant. You can trim oak trees now, but paint wounds on oak trees immediately, any size, any season.

- · Transplant dormant trees and shrubs.
- Trim shrubs and trees which bloom on fresh spring growth (such as crepe myrtles).
- Keep beds well-mulched.
- Check your sprinkler system once a month. Water before a freeze, but always avoid overwatering.
- Enjoy new seed catalogs, but remember to choose native/adapted plants!





Albuquerque Balloon Fiesta

an you be both wide-eyed and bleary-eyed at the same time? Ask the 31 Sun City Texas RV Club members who attended the 2014 Albuquerque Spirit of the Winds International Balloon Fiesta, and the answer will be a resounding, "Yes!"

In those quiet, pre-dawn hours, just after a rare lunar eclipse, the dramatic Dawn Patrol - a small group of balloons that light up the dawn - ascended to assess winds and weather. Suddenly, a green flag was waved, and the infield became a beehive of activity as crews scurried about, inflating hundreds of balloons. Quickly, the morning sky began to fill

with vibrant displays of magnificent, multicolored balloons of all sizes and shapes. For the next two hours, we were captivated and bedazzled as balloons from the "Flight of the Nations Mass Ascension" brightened the New Mexico skies.

But, I'm getting ahead of myself.

The trip began on September 30, when fifteen RV rigs independently arrived in Amarillo, TX. The group bonded over a pot luck supper, then spent the next few days touring the Amarillo area. Many RVers enjoyed a beautiful day at Palo Duro Canyon, one of the treasures of

Texas. The RV Museum, antiquing and shopping were also among the popular activities. Of course, no visit to Amarillo would be complete without an obligatory dinner at the Big Texan Steak Ranch, home of the free 72 oz steak! In spite of much coercing, we couldn't convince any of the group to take-up the challenge especially after learning that the world record is held by a 120 lb young woman who demolished the steak in under five minutes.

Travelling on to Santa Fe, the group took a tram tour of the Old Town which

allowed for plenty of time to sightsee and visit the many art galleries, restaurants and places of interest. There was much to see and hardly enough time to see it all, though we did manage to explore the Tent Rocks National Monument, Bandelier National Monument, Las Alamos, Taos, and the ghost towns lining the Turquoise Trails.

Before departing from Santa Fe, we partied at the "Doo Wop Soda Shop," grabbing a bite as we sang and danced to tunes of the '50s and '60s, then rolled out to Albuquerque early the next morning. We arrived, caravan-style, on October 7. Thanks to meticulous planning by Wagon Masters Art and Beth Schmitt, we procured VIP camping which was not only right on the Fiesta grounds, but was directly under the take-off flight path! Everyone in the pack was thankful for their forethought and effort.

Now in its 43rd year, the Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta is the largest hot air balloon festival in the world. In 2014, over 500 balloon teams, hailing from 22 different countries, participated in the nine day event. Albuquerque's unique location and winds, colloquially known as the "Albuquerque Box," allow these balloons to launch first in a southwest direction and then, as they rise, north easterly winds prevail, allowing balloonists an unusually high degree of control over their aircraft. Working with these winds, skilled pilots can adjust their altitude to control their flight paths, allowing them to circle back and land in the same field. In fact, there is even a competition among the race balloons known as The Ring Toss. Here, pilots attempt to navigate five tall poles, trying to get close enough to place a ring over each pole. Each successful placement earns that pilot a prize. In another event called

The Fly-In, pilots drop weighted markers onto specified targets in an impressive exhibition of skill and beauty.

The second day of the event, we found ourselves enraptured as 106 nontraditional, specially-shaped balloons took flight directly over our RVs. The air above our heads filled with a spectacular display of fanciful balloons of every imaginable size, shape and color, including clown balloons, whale balloons, bee balloons, carriage balloons, multiple flying pig balloons, and, perhaps most remarkable of all, a flying Elvis balloon! Day after day, we watched in awe as the sky filled with a vast array of colors and shapes. A long-time attendee standing near our group said it best: "You just can't see this enough. Every time I see it, it's spectacular!" The bursting sounds of the propane firing, watching the magical

shapes take form as the air within them warmed, the quiet ascent of each craft as it floated upward until the silhouette of their magnificent figures struck out against the bright blue morning skies was, to say the least, a breathtaking, astounding experience.

After the morning ascensions, we spent the remainder of our days visiting the sites of Albuquerque. We took a 2.7 mile tram ride up Sandia Peak, ascending to a height of 10,378 feet. The ride provided dramatic vistas across the canyons, peaks and valleys. Over lunch at the High Finance restaurant on the peak's summit, we were able to enjoy a 360 degree panorama of 11,000 square miles across New Mexico. Another memorable stop was our group lunch in Old Town Albuquerque. This 300 year old neighborhood was central to

Albuquerque's history and development, with a square, church, hotels, bars and stores. Today, the town center is surrounded by shops, boutiques and restaurants offering southwestern goods and services in a picturesque adobe setting.

Many of us forged out time to visit the Balloon Museum, located right on the Fiesta grounds, which featured displays of early balloons, detailed significant flights, and provided an essential understanding of ballooning that greatly enhanced our visit.

The morning after a thrilling evening fireworks show marked the end of our remarkable trip. Each party went off in their own direction, bound for further adventure or making a leisurely return home, basking in the memory of this splendid experience.

Golf Course Improvements

Submitted by the Golf Committee

As a result of the Playability Sub-Committee's detailed work last fall, many course improvement suggestions were made. The golf and maintenance staff have reviewed these items and have compiled a description of the work to take place from late 2014 through 2015 (see below). Our thanks go to the golf and maintenance staff for their cooperation and responsiveness to these requests.

Tree Trimming

One of the biggest items identified in the playability reports was the need to get caught up on tree trimming. We will start to address this problem in the fall and winter. The "in house" trees will be done by our maintenance staff, and the larger trees will be contracted out. The 2015 budget includes \$30,000 for tree trimming, which will be split between White Wing and Legacy Hills, the largest of these areas being #8 and #14 at White Wing and #8 and #14 at Legacy Hills.

The Non-Capitalized Improvements line item includes \$55,000 for course improvements in 2015. We have put in preliminary numbers for each item on the playability report, and we will complete most of this work in the first quarter. The list totals \$33,200 in project work and \$22,400 in tree trimming, leaving us with an additional \$7,600 in tree trimming and \$21,800 in course improvements to be identified and addressed in the second quarter.

Legacy Hills and Cowan Creek Greenside Bunkers

The greenside bunkers were shelled out at the end of November and will be played as ground under repair, as we did at White Wing last year. We will start putting the new sand in place in January and will have the Legacy Hills greenside bunkers complete before March 2015, if not sooner. Also, greenside bunkers at Cowan Creek will be redone in the first quarter of 2015. This project is funded from our golf reserves.

Legacy Hills Mainline Leak

The leak under Del Webb Boulevard was repaired in late 2014.

Pre-Emerge

Pre-emerge has been applied wall-to-wall on all three courses.

Overseed

Overseed has been put out on the Par 3 tees, Driving Range Tees and the tees with highest amount of winter traffic.

Fertility

We have all three courses continuing to use liquid fertigation for the fairways, roughs and tees, which allows us to fertilize as we irrigate the golf courses. We will continue to fertilize greens at all three courses with liquid fertilizers. Remember, you can always review golf course maintenance details at the blog at sctxgcmaint.blogspot.com.

Manfred Reimann's

Escape from East Germany

or many, the Berlin Wall could not be more distant – a crumbled relic from a period long since passed. But for Sun City resident Manfred Reimann, memories of a life divided remain crystal clear.

Born in Berlin and raised in East Germany, Manfred came of age in an era when Communism was gospel. In every school, in every grade, every curriculum preached the glories and achievements of the Soviet Union. Professional skills were heavily emphasized, and topics with the potential to reach beyond the prescribed nationalist ideology were heavily restricted – foreign languages, for example, were limited exclusively to Russian or Latin.

It was not only difficult to stray from these norms – it was dangerous. The Ministry for State Security (commonly referred to as the Stasi) employed plainclothes officers to intimidate and monitor every citizen, regardless of age or status. Despite the risk, Manfred's father arranged for him to learn English through secret lessons. Through books smuggled in from the West and by listening to the British and



American Forces Networks on the radio, Manfred was able to further improve his English language skills.

Following completion of his basic education, Manfred studied marine electronics at one of the oldest universities in the world, Rostock University (est. 1419), graduating with a degree in engineering (Dipl.-Ing.). During his 18 month draftee service in the National People's Army, he operated a radar station — an experience which proved helpful in his professional life as a test-engineer operating from the Port of Rostock on the coast of the Baltic Sea. As one of very few English-speaking employees, Manfred became his company's

technical translator, dealing with Western companies who wished to sell their electronics to the Communist state's merchant and fishing fleet. It was a good job, but Manfred's language skills and frequent interactions with Western-based industries had an unintended side effect: it brought him to the attention of the secret police.

The direct successor to Hitler's Gestapo, at its height, the Stasi had officers planted in apartment buildings, hospitals, universities, and every major industrial plant. As many as one in every thirty people worked for or reported to the Stasi. The Stasi behaved as a law unto themselves, and they

had become determined to recruit Manfred as a spy. Manfred, for his part, was equally determined not to sign up.

The Stasi's pursuit began reasonably enough, though after several refusals, they began to turn to less conventional tactics. In a move that could have been pulled straight from the pages of a James Bond script, the agency arranged for a beautiful young student to "accidently" run into Manfred. Posing as an English student, her mission was to gather all the information on her subject as she possibly could, then report back to the Ministry of Security – unfortunately for them, the relationship between the young woman and her target did not last very long.

The Stasi turned up the pressure. "If you want to succeed in this country," they said, "you MUST enlist." But again, Manfred declined, stating he preferred to advance on his own merits, rather than through some secret security shortcut. The recruiter threatened to evict Manfred's mother from her flat in Berlin, but still Manfred refused, though now he could feel the danger mounting.

During this time, Manfred found himself assigned to a visiting British ship, demonstrating radar systems for a Western company. He developed a friendly relationship with the captain and the crew, even joining them for dinner the night before they left for business in other countries. It was a cheerful goodbye, and the captain invited Manfred to a good-bye drink when they returned in ten days.

The day after the ship's departure, Manfred's boss informed him that, by dining with the captain, he had fraternized with the "class enemy." He was sternly forbidden from any further contact with Westerners, effectively putting an end to his career.

Defecting meant leaving everything he had ever known behind - his friends, his family, and above all, his 66 year old mother! But Manfred felt he had no choice; he decided he could no longer live under these conditions in East Germany. He would have to escape.

Escape – but how? The border to West Germany was patrolled night and day with armed guards and dogs. It was laden with land mines, barbed wire, and selfshooting devices – it would be suicide to try. But then, the glimmer of an idea ap-

peared in his mind: the British ship.

It was a long shot, but he was willing to try. He withdrew his savings, took his few valuables and visited his mother in Berlin. For fear of the STASI, he couldn't tell her or any other good friend the truth about his escape plan. Instead, he told her he might be transferred to Berlin, which made her happy, and said he'd be taking a short vacation to the island of Hiddensee, the same story he'd told his boss. When the ship returned to Rostock, Manfred came aboard.

Once in the West, Manfred faced an ironic problem: he was detained for questioning by German, British and American intelligence. Suspicious of his time in the East German army, they regarded him as a potential Stasi agent! It was some time before he could convince them he had no one to report to.

Back in East Germany, the Stasi interrogated Manfred's mother and all his friends, but no matter what they asked, there was nothing to tell: no one knew about his escape plan. Even his old "girl-friend", the Stasi plant, turned up at his mother's flat, pouring on the sympathy in an effort to get information, but his mother, knowing nothing, was safe. A massive investigation was launched in an effort to discover how he had escaped, but Manfred had covered his tracks, leaving the Stasi hunting for a loophole that would never be found.

After his escape, Manfred took up work as an electronics officer on a cable ship in Vietnam and an instructor teaching radar in London, eventually making his way to America. In the 1970s and 80s, Manfred's mother was able to visit the


United States several times, as any woman over sixty could get an exit permit to the West (if the women didn't return home, the government figured, it would save itself the cost of a pension and get an apartment back). Manfred asked her to stay, but she refused, insisting that she was a true Berliner and that, "One doesn't transplant an old tree."

In 1989, Communism crumbled, and along with it came down the great dividing Wall. Under the German Freedom of Information Act, Manfred was able to request a copy of his STASI file from the Berlin archives. Several inches thick, it showed copies of reports made by his friends, colleagues, and neighbors, statements giving negative information about him, and his expressed political views. It documented the Western radio broadcasts he'd listened to, the 'forbidden' books he'd read and even the 'decadent' western hit tunes he'd played on his guitar – all strictly against the rules of the Communist party. Manfred realized, had he confided in any of his 'friends', Stasi would have imprisoned him on the spot. The final report in his file, written by the STASI, admitted a complete failure in determining just how Manfred had escaped. In the end, it was Manfred's own secrets that had outwitted the secret police, earning him passage to a place where one did not have to live in fear. For Manfred, the only way to live, and the way he has lived ever since.

Further details of this remarkable man can be found in his autobiography, *Chas*ing the Sun, and its sequel Singed by the Sun, authored under the pen name Patric Sanders.



Instead, I entered the Activities Center on Texas Drive and found a whole bunch of people playing cards.

Social Bridge, as it turns out, is a card game, and an incredibly popular one, at that – according to the World Bridge Federation (the game's international governing body), anywhere from 25-36 million Americans regularly engage in bridge which, apparently, has 635,013,559,600 possible hands of play. All that from just a standard 52-card

deck! Makes your head spin just thinking about it.

The game is played in groups of four, with two partners in each group. The Sun City Texas Social Bridge Club allows players to arrange partnerships in advance or simply to show up and find a partner at the game, making for a very welcoming, low-pressure group. After four hands of play, players switch partners and tables, giving everyone plenty of opportunities to meet new people and engage in a variety of play styles.

I can tell you that this is one card game that will take more than just luck. Requiring analytic skill and communication between partners, bridge is a game of strategy that will help keep your brain active. In fact, bridge and chess are the only "mind sports" which have been recognized by the International Olympic Committee (alas, they were not found eligible for the main Olympic program). I witnessed many smiles between play-

ers and acquaintances at the SCTX Bridge Club, though I did notice that, despite the veneer of sociability, one player at every table was being openly called a dummy. In all fairness, the dummy rotated around the table giving everyone a chance at dummyhood, though it seemed a bit mean that dummies were never allowed to comment on anything happening during the game.

Despite this lapse in nicety, all of the folks seemed to have a good time. I heard furtive laughter, as well as a guffaw or two and a chortle and a snicker. Of course I don't know the game well enough, but they may have been talking smack to each other.

The Social Bridge club plays four times a week, on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. New players are allowed to join in play up to three times before being asked to join. Annual dues are \$8. For additional information, contact Dee Pokluda at 361-935-6124.

AARP Driver Safety Program Smart Driver Course

The AARP Driver Safety program offers the nation's first and largest refresher course designed specifically for older drivers.

The program consists of one (1) four hour session and costs \$17. The course helps drivers refine existing skills and develop safe defensive driving techniques. Both AARP members and non-members may take the course; however, non-AARP members must pay an extra \$5 at the door. AARP members must bring their AARP card to avoid the additional charge.

Upon completion of the course, graduates MAY receive a discount on their automobile insurance premiums. Please check with your auto insurance carrier to see what discount, if any, will apply.

AARP courses do not qualify for ticket dismissal in Texas unless you have previously contacted the appropriate court and received approval to take this course in place of a Defensive Driving Course.
