Apply Now for Spring 2015 Citizen Police Academy

Thursdays, March 26 - May 28, 6:30-8:30 p.m.

The Citizen Police Academy is a 12-week course designed to educate the community on police protocol and procedures. These classes are taught by police officers and intended to provide citizens with an insider's view of the Georgetown Police Department's day-to-day activities.

Sessions take place on Thursday evenings, beginning promptly at 6:30 p.m. and ending at 8:30 p.m. Most classes will be held in the training room of the Public Safety Operations and Training Center (PSOTC), located at 3500 D. B. Wood Road, Georgetown. This unique course will be the very first to be held in this new building, which features state-of-the-art A/V equipment. Some classes may also take place off-site.

CLASSES AND TOPICS

In past CPA courses, topics have included Calling 911, Emergency Response Team (ERT/SWAT) Reactions, Texas DPS, Texas Rangers, Williamson County Sheriff's Office K-9, Interview and Interrogation, Warrants/Municipal and Teen Courts, District and County Courts and Magistrates, Juvenile Justice, Georgetown Police Honor Guard, Hostage Negotiations, and Crime Scene Investigations.

Chief Nero typically teaches a class in "Use of Force." It covers topics such as weaponry (lethal and non-lethal) available to officers and a police perspective of when force is called for and why. In light of current national headlines, this class can sometimes be a genuine eye-opener, providing citizens with a more multifaceted understanding of officers' use of force.

Another significant class is "Shoot/Don't Shoot." In this session, attendees engage in an interactive, life-sized video in which they become a police officer. Armed with a laser weapon, participants must decide in different situations if and when to shoot, offering citizens an accurate depiction of what officers face every day.

No one under the age of 18 is eligible to apply. All applicants will be notified of acceptance. Let's Communicate!

Meet Jim Romine

n January, I was delighted to speak at the annual dinner in Neighborhood 46. It was great to get together with this group and discuss some of the goals and major projects we have on the horizon this year. That evening, I was made aware just how little many homeowners know about me – therefore, I wanted to use this opportunity to share a little about myself and my history with the community.

I was hired in July 1996 to manage the Legacy Hills Grille (aka, The Oaks) as their food and beverage director. At that time, the Developer wanted the community to outsource management of this amenity, so the CA contracted with Houston-based food service provider, Prince Foods. The Grille was opened in October 1996, and over the next few years offered lunch and dinner services, eventually adding breakfast on the weekends. Within two years, we transferred management back to the CA, where it remained until 2006.

In 2000, I was promoted to associate executive director, and my responsibilities expanded to include Food and Beverage, Golf, Activities and Communications. These were busy times, and we were in the process of opening Accents Eclectic Eatery in the White Wing Clubhouse. Accents, for those who were not here at the time, was a cafeteria-style restaurant that offered a bakery, deli, grill, and home-style blue plate specials. One popular event we held for many years was the All-You-Can-Eat Burger Night. That was quite popular and I will leave it at that. In 2006, our then-executive director left the company, and the Board appointed a search committee to find a replacement. I was blessed to receive their support and, later that year, was promoted to the executive director position, which I have

held ever since. I have always loved working in Sun City, and have seen many changes over the years. Since becoming the executive director, I have received my Professional Community Association Manager (PCAM) and Large Scale Manager (LSM) designations from Community Association Institute (CAI). I am proud of these designations, especially the LSM, since only 84 people worldwide have achieved this designation. Beyond the Sun City picture, I was born in Huntington, West Virginia, but most of my pre-college school days were on the west coast in California in a then-small town called Calabasas. I moved to Texas in 1981 and immediately went to work as a roustabout on an offshore oil rig, each month spending two weeks on the rig and two weeks off. This was a great experience which sealed my desire to go to college and not be in the oil field business. I graduated in 1986 from Southwest Texas State University (now called Texas State) with a bachelor of Business Administration, and I have remained in this area ever since. I have served on the Georgetown Chamber of Commerce, worked with our local CAI chapter and currently serve on the Community Managers International Association Board of Directors. I am married to my best friend Jerri and have two boys, Jeremy and Jakob. I have always enjoyed running, spending time on the beach and the music of the Grateful Dead. In closing, I would like to thank this community for allowing me to be a part of it for so many years, and for all of the support you have provided me and my staff. I love it here and hope Sun City Texas will remain my home for many years to come. Take care,

Board Member Views Submitted by Gary E. Preston, Secretary

Oh, What a Year We...

HAD! Our staff worked hard and, at the end of the year, fared very well on our resident satisfaction survey. Our Executive Director, Jim Romine, received his Large Scale Manager (LSM) designation, an honor bestowed upon fewer than 85 such managers worldwide! We learned of an expansion for our community, bringing us from a target of 7,500 homes to approximately 10,000. Our HOA fees remain on the low end of the scale for the breadth of our amenities and services. While we acknowledge that crime is subjective, our overall crime rate remains very low - accounting for approximately 20% of the residents in Georgetown, we enjoy a crime rate of less than 3%. We were notified of a significant property tax increase. Last but not least, I think I am seeing more residents set their cruise controls near 35mph when driving our main roads. At least I think fewer folks are blowing by me daily. Wheewh! HAVE! Heading into 2015, Sun City Texas continues to be rated as one of the best "age restricted" communities in the country, while Georgetown continues ranking as one of the best places to retire! Following several years of serious drought, we have budgeted to begin a refresh of our Common Areas. Now

that the new year is in full swing, the refresh has begun and our staff is working hard. Both Board and staff are working to address the tax issue and we are optimistic about the outcome, though we recognize that there is no easy, quick solution and a complete resolution may take some time. As to the expansion, when dealing with the government it never goes as quickly as desired. Pulte was ready to break ground on the extension of Pedernales Falls Drive but, at the time of this writing, is still waiting on City permits. The Expansion Task Force Committees formed by Pulte are getting organized and a Town Hall is tentatively scheduled for April – watch for the notice!

This year, we aim to participate in the expansion process any way we can to ensure we remain one of, if not the best community of its type in the nation. We also intend to capture planning data, which will allow us to develop ongoing plans for the community, and to identify fiscally responsible strategies for independently funding future community features. Studying the sustainability of golf will help determine what Pulte will or will not build. However, as a community, we need to be able to utilize this information after Pulte's departure and over the long haul.

If you are interested in becoming a candidate for the Sun City Texas Board of Directors, you may pick up an "Application to Serve as Director of SCTXCA" in the Member Services Office. These packets, with the necessary forms, will be available beginning Monday, March 2. Be prepared to include with your application a one-page brief biography for posting. Your picture may be taken at the Member Services Office or you can include a personal photograph.

The first day that a candidate can file (turn in their application) will be Monday, March 16; and the last day will be the close of business on Tuesday, March 31, 2015. Per the requirements in the Voting and Election Policy, a Candidate Forum is scheduled for Wednesday, April 22 at 9 a.m., so that all residents will have an opportunity to hear from the candidates and submit questions. Pre-qualified candidates may begin campaigning as soon as their application has been approved by the Elections Committee and do not have to wait until the filing period has ended. The Elections Committee will meet with all pre-qualified candidates on April 1 to review the CA sponsored campaign opportunities and the Voting & Election Policy.

AEDs Added at Legacy Hills and Cowan Creek Pavilions

New automated external defibrillators (AED) have been placed at Legacy Hills and Cowan Creek Pavilions for use in medical emergencies. Sun City Texas now maintains 16 AEDs in various community areas. The use of these units can positively affect the outcome for individuals having a cardiac episode.

The operation of these units is designed to be simple to use for a layperson with no training; however, training is suggested. The Sun City Texas Emergency Management Committee sponsors monthly training on CPR, first aid and AED usage. There is a small fee for supplies and materials. See the EMC section on the Sun City website for class offerings.

2015 Firewise Volunteer Kick-Off Meeting

Wednesday, March 11, 9 a.m. to noon Berry Creek Trail, at Sun City Boulevard and Great Frontier Drive

In an effort to keep our native Common Areas Firewise, we are asking residents to assist once per week with small brush clearing jobs that do not require any power tools. Please consider signing up for small cedar removals, deadwood clearing and fun—all you need is a good pair of work shoes, pruning shears (or similar) and, of course, gloves. Whether you're looking for a couple of hours of exercise or just a little time outdoors, this may be your perfect opportunity.

This spring, we will be concentrating on the Sun City nature trail along Berry Creek. There is a large quantity of downed wood which can be chipped and used on the trail.

Volunteers will meet CA landscape staff on-site, then sign in, so as to keep track of volunteer hours for Sun City's Firewise certification. Following a brief safety meeting, we will begin removing unwanted vegetation from Common Areas. Staff will be on hand to assist with chipping of large items.

Weekly workdays will be scheduled on Wednesdays throughout the year. Once you sign up, you will receive email updates on a weekly basis.

There will be cookies for the early birds! A reschedule will be arranged in the event of inclement weather.

March and April: Time to Apply Ant Bait

Howdy, neighbors! These are the months in which weather conditions are favorable to apply fire ant bait throughout our Common Areas, golf courses, and your residential lawns and flower beds. As a reminder, the CA has posted signs in high traffic locations throughout Sun City Texas. Your Neighborhood Rep most likely has contacted you already to see if you would like to participate in ant baiting.

HOW ANT BAIT WORKS

First, ant bait is not a poison. The active ingredient is an insect growth regulator which works over a period of two to six weeks. The bait is not harmful to your pet. The sandy, corn-sized bait is coated with coconut oil, which is like candy for ants. When temperatures stay in the 70s, ants are actively foraging for food and will travel quite a distance to pick up the bait and carry it back into the mound. It is shared with the soldiers and the queen and, depending on how the growth regulator/inhibitor is designed, it inhibits growth of the mouth so the worker ants can no longer feed the soldiers and the queen and, basically, they starve to death. Ants are quite smart and have shown resistance to baits after a period of time; this is why you need to make sure to switch brands of ant baits every time you apply

it—we schedule ant bait application twice a year.

TIPS FOR SUCCESSFUL APPLICATIONS

- Do not schedule any irrigation for 48 hours after application, and wait until all dew has dried from turf areas.
- Do not apply if there is a chance of rain in the 2-day forecast.
- Do not apply if temperatures are below 60 degrees.
- Use small amounts of bait and broadcast with a small hand spreader. If applying by hand be sure to wear plastic gloves and follow label directions.
- Before purchasing a product, check with your lawn care company to see if this insect control is included in your contract.
- If you live in a Landscaped Maintained Home, you do not need to do anything. Ant bait application is part of the scope of work in the landscape contract. TCB Landscaping will leave door tags at your residence so you know the work has been done.

And, remember, if you see ant mounds during the year and you wonder if the product is working—ant bait is a means of control, not eradication.

Bits of Info from Ginny's Desk

If you are replacing a dead tree with a tree from Appendix E in the Design Guidelines, you won't need a permit as long as you plant the tree at least twenty feet from any other tree, ten feet from the property line, and within two feet of the removed tree. Also on the "No Paperwork" list is the removal of any tree not named in Appendix E's Native Tree list and any tree measuring less than 19" in circumference.

PAINT COLORS

Paint colors can be found on the new website by visiting www.sctexas.org; then do the following:

- Log in with your Member ID and password
- · Click on Departments & Hours

- · Click on Community Standards
- · Click on Paint Schema

You will need to know your home's model name in order to choose the correct series of paint colors. This information can be found under HOUSE MODELS. If you are simply retouching your home's current colors, you won't need to fill out a B-2 form for approval. For help in researching your paint colors when you don't have them with your sales documents, come by the Community Standards Office and we'll be happy to work with you.

HOLIDAY DECORATIONS

For a period beginning one week prior to, and for one week after, you can display decorations appropriate to the holiday. March has two holidays: Texas Independence Day on March 2 and Saint Patrick's Day on March 17.

DISPLAY OF MODIFICATION PERMITS

Finally, modification permits need only be displayed while the project is ongoing and may be removed when the project is complete. The bottom portion of the permit is for office use only. A community standards inspector will not come by to sign your permit, so you can post the permit on the inside of a front window while the project is in progress.



EMC Emergency Evacuation Centers - A Safe Place in Sun City

Did you know that Sun City Texas has an emergency plan in the event of a natural or manmade disaster?

The Sun City Texas Community Association Board established the Emergency Management Committee (EMC) in August 2012. The committee was formed to promote "the preservation of the life, safety, well-being and property of Sun City residents in the event of an emergency/disaster."

The Emergency Evacuation Guidelines state that:

- If a large scale evacuation of Sun City residents is necessary, civil authorities will provide information regarding evacuation routes through the local media.
- If a small scale evacuation becomes necessary, the Sun City Crisis Management Team will provide information to residents through the: CA Communicator; Channel 79; the Sun City Amateur Radio Operators (SCARS); the Citizens on Patrol (COPS); or through your Neighborhood Emergency Coordinator or

Neighborhood Representative.

If you are told to evacuate to a Sun City evacuation center, the following Sun City facilities will be specifically designated for evacuation:

- The resident evacuation center located in the Social Center Ballroom
- The resident evacuation center located at Cowan Creek Amenity Center (will be opened if needed or if the Social Center is not available)
- The pet evacuation center located at The Oaks (it is recommended that pets and their owners locate there and not at the Social Center)
- The first aid station located at the Activities Center (provides limited first aid services and triage until first responders arrive)

The Cowan Creek Amenity Center, if activated for resident evacuation, will also provide a first aid station and a pet evacuation center.

It is very important that Sun City residents are prepared in advance for an emergency evacuation.

Information about how to "Become Emergency Ready" can be reviewed in the 2014-2015 Sun City Texas Resource

Guide and Directory on pages 67-69 as recommended by the Emergency Management Committee. It includes:

- Medical emergencies and weather or home-related emergencies
- Emergency medical information and emergency contact forms
- Listed supplies for first aid and resident emergency/evacuation kits (Grabn' Go Bags) and pet evacuation kits

Over the past three years, the CA and EMC have provided an annual emergency evacuation "drill" to implement and practice a mock emergency evacuation. At the various drills, either specific centers or all centers have been activated for use. The next emergency evacuation exercise drill will be held on Saturday, March 14.

All of the evacuation centers are aided by volunteers at specific centers, as well as volunteer "evacuees." The volunteers are notified of the "disaster" through a phone/text "call tree" and have attended a training session prior to the event.

If you would like to volunteer for the emergency evacuation centers, please contact the EMC. Volunteers are always welcome!

Celebrate the legacy of the oldest operating cotton gin in America! The annual Burton Cotton Gin Festival includes folk-life demonstrations, a tractor pull, pie eating

contest, cotton seed pulling, arts and craft booths, and food vendors.

The festival's centerpiece is the 1914 Burton Farmers Gin. When a group of farmers built the first co-op gin in Burton in 1913, it is doubtful that they could have foreseen that 100 years later it would be touted as the oldest operational cotton gin in the country. The last cotton was ginned commercially in 1974, but in 1987 "Operation Restoration" returned the business complex back to its original glory. A major attraction is the Bessemer Type IV, twin cylinder, diesel oil engine "Lady B," brought in to replace a steam engine in 1925. During the festival the engine is fired up, and cotton bales are ginned like in the old days. The Museum is also a draw with interesting exhibits about when cotton was king in Texas.



Athlete of the Month

Sheri Brainard doesn't like to fly solo. She would shiver at the suggestion of swimming laps in a single lane or taking a long, solitary run.

The more the merrier for this fun-loving extrovert, who lettered in five team sports (softball, track, basketball, tennis and cheerleading) while she was a high school student in Lone Oak, Texas. Even though Sheri's only lived in Sun City Texas for eighteen months, she already feels at home on the community softball field, where she keeps score and tends to the website, and on the pickleball court, where she and her buddies fondly refer to themselves as the "pickle jar." Sheri also clogs and is a member of the Sun City Dance & Drill Club.

Sheri, 54, describes herself as a former "road warrior," whose work and global travel consumed her time and energy. She worried about a family history of diabetes and heart disease, but would nevertheless use food to deal with stress, then turn to fad diets to lose weight. "My excuse was that I didn't have time to exercise," she admits. "Now I do. No excuses."

The turning point for Sheri came when she and husband Scott toured the Sun City Texas Fitness Center during required orientation for new residents and saw the top-notch facilities. She knew it was time to rediscover the former athlete within, and she enlisted Sun City personal trainer Allison Worley to kick the process into high gear.

Sheri says it's the "fun, friendship and accountability" that motivates her to work out with Allison up to three times each week. "I'm very social. Allison understands that I need my workouts to be fun. She mixes things up for me. I don't have time to get bored. She pushes me to work longer and harder than I would on my own."

As a personal trainer, Allison says she believes in training a client to be strong and prepared for the life they want to enjoy. "Sheri was an athlete back in her high school days, so I look for ways to tap into that inner athlete," says Allison. "She is



a great example of someone who likes to have fun, and that's what our workouts are about. We laugh and enjoy our time together. I train Sheri to MOVE, because I really believe that the more you move, the more you move. And that keeps us young and happy!"

hen you hear "Strength Class", what springs to mind? Is it a Spartan gym filled with bulky men clad in torn tee shirts, grunting and groaning under the enormous weight of the barbells they're lifting over their heads? Is it Rocky Balboa? Is it Ahhnold?

Maybe it's time to update that image.

In Marilyn Pagano's Strength workout, you might still hear some grunting and groaning, but it won't be because of 500-pound barbells. Instead, you'll find this energetic instructor giving commands to lift, stretch, push and pull, encouraging class members to engage all their muscles as they move about the room, maximizing aerobic as well as anaerobic benefits.

Described by participants as warm, focused and creative, this writer also observed Marilyn to be a particularly attentive and patient instructor, leading her very inclusive workout with enough vigor to keep everyone moving, but not

so much that anyone fell behind. Using light weights, the class first marched, then danced to the left and the right, lifting their arms and extending so many kicks that for a minute I felt I should get hazardous duty pay.

Marilynn encouraged her group to take breaks when needed. Many of the students took her advice, breaking for water. Personally, I carry a two liter bottle of Coke Zero with me at all times, so I was good to go.

As one might expect from a workout class, the music was active and inspiring. This would be a particularly good class for golfers, line dancers, softball players, couch potatoes, sky divers, or anyone else with a pulse who would like to continue having one. It is recommended that you see a doctor immediately if you notice you have no pulse.



Scaly, wriggly, fork-tongued and sharp-fanged, snakes have inspired anxiety and revulsion for thousands of years. Roughly one-third of adults have expressed some degree of ophidiophobia (fear of snakes), making it the most commonly reported phobia in the world. Scientists have long hypothesized that our tendency toward aversion might be hardwired into our biology and in 2013, researchers even discovered a particular set of neurons in our brains which respond exclusively to snakes.

So if these undulating reptiles haven't exactly been winning any popularity contests, then what would compel an individual to head toward a venomous coral snake – or, for that matter, to rush to the creature's defense after it responds with a life-threatening bite?

For accomplished herpetologist and inveterate snake wrangler Jim Christiansen, the answer lies in a lifetime of curiosity, and a deep understanding for the animal's place in our world.

Growing up on the family farm, Jim spent his childhood surrounded by animals of every variety. Domesticated or wild, it made no difference to Jim – he loved them all, and exhausted countless hours observing the snakes and frogs in



a nearby pond. His passion for wildlife continued through his adolescence and on into college, where he majored in both chemistry and biology. Just three days before graduating as valedictorian of Buena Vista College, Jim received a telegram inviting him to assist on a study of rare turtles in South America, thus launching his lifelong career as a handson herpetologist (scientist specializing in reptiles and amphibians).

When Jim retired from his professorship at Drake University, he didn't exactly trade in his lab equipment for a set of golf clubs. Instead, almost immediately after moving to Sun City Texas in January of 2006, Jim launched himself into an investigation of reptile and amphibian populations within the community, mapping the location of every species — living or otherwise — he possibly could. Jim has also used his post-professional years to

report on the natural history of Iowa's reptiles and amphibians, participate in a study on the adaptability of turtles in West Texas, identify a new turtle shell disease, and provide swift, humane removal of snakes from Sun City homes. It was the last of these listed endeavors that brought Jim out to Neighborhood 16 this past fall, responding to a report of a coral snake – the fourth reported in that area in the past nine years. Though easily identified by its red-on-yellow bands, coral snake sightings are uncommon due to the creature's reclusive, non-aggressive temperament. Accounting for fewer than 1% of all venomous snake bites in the United States, an individual is more likely to be hit by lightning than be bit by a coral snake.

Circumstances, of course, can change the probability of any scenario, and just as standing in an open field won't help your odds in a lightning storm, handling a venomous snake with any less than the utmost of care will create a liability for even the most experienced of experts.

Though well acquainted with snake-removal protocol, on the day he was called in to Neighborhood 16, Jim found himself hurried by an outside appointment. Utilizing specially-designed tongs, he gently moved the coral snake into a cotton bag. However, rather than using the tongs to ensure the snake was secured at the bottom of the bag, Jim had simply pushed the snake down with his boot. As a result, the snake was not where he had anticipated, and as he tied a knot in the top of the bag, the slim reptile made its defensive move, biting his finger through the fabric of the bag.

Unlike rattlesnakes, which strike quickly to inject hemotoxin deep into their victim's flesh, coral snakes must gnaw for up to thirty seconds in order to release their deadly neurotoxin from their fangs. Throwing the bag to the ground,

Jim was able to break the snake's hold immediately. Bleeding profusely and in extreme pain, he drove himself home and instructed his wife to call the emergency room so they could prepare to treat a coral snake bite. Jim began experiencing a strange sensation in his mouth, and the bite area continued to swell and ache with a burning intensity. Refusing an ambulance, he and his wife got in the car and drove to the hospital.

A true emergency, Jim was treated immediately upon arrival to the ER. Harboring one of the world's most potent venoms (only the black mamba's is more powerful), a coral snake's bite can disrupt the connections between the brain and the muscles, resulting in slurred speech, double vision, and respiratory paralysis. Antivenin is scarce and enormously costly—the only American manufacturer ceased production in 2003, and a finite amount of Mexican-produced antidote is held exclusively in Florida.

After considering his options, Jim decided to hold off on the antivenin. Only one of the snake's fangs had made contact with his skin, and he had been able to remove the snake swiftly, limiting the damage it was able to inflict. Following a 24 hour stay in the hospital, Jim began to heal at home. Within four days, the pain was all but gone, and the numbness in the bite area returned to normal after a few weeks.

It is crucial to note that, while Jim's experience was a truly life-threatening one, he holds the utmost respect for both the dangers posed and benefits offered by venomous snakes, which are an essential part of our native ecosystem, keeping rodent and other small animal populations at bay. As the weather warms, human encounters with snakes cooling off or hunting for food in garages, crawl spaces, gardens and pools will become more likely.

To avoid contact, Jim advises residents to look before they leap – or step, or reach. Never stick your hands or feet into thick vegetation if you can't be certain what's in there. Wear thick boots when hiking (on trails, of course) and use gloves when gardening, landscaping or gathering firewood. Snakes generally only bite for two reasons: for food or defense. If you can avoid provoking a snake - knowingly or otherwise – you can usually avoid getting bit. If you spot any reptiles, living or dead, call a wrangler. They'll pick it up and use the information to add to the Sun City Texas reptile distribution map. Jim's final and perhaps most important tip? Be sure to keep your garage door closed all the way. This is how snakes get into the house, and you don't want to find one in your kitchen - but if you do, call a snake wrangler and go out to eat.

The study of genealogy has become a popular hobby; research tools, including genealogy management software and advances in DNA technology have helped those who enjoy this pastime gather information about their relatives.

magine taking on a puzzle you've never seen before, with no idea how many pieces it contains or what the end results might be. Challenging? Definitely. But for many, watching as something recognizable takes form can be a captivating process of discovery. Such is the experience of genealogy research. Between photos and names and government documents, the range of information available can be overwhelming, but whether you're an investigative novice or a seasoned research veteran, chances are, someone in the Sun City Computer Club's Genealogy Special Interest Group (SIG) will be able to steer you in the right direction.

Since its inception in 1997, genealogy has grown from eight members to a current mailing list of over 200. The only one of the club's original three SIGs still in existence, the group hosted 625 meeting attendees and 587 class participants in 2014 alone. Clearly there's no shortage of ancestral curiosity here in Sun City! Betty Jean Steinke, Genealogy SIG

leader since 2007, and her support group leads—Bonnie Berg (Family Tree Maker), Lori Trenk (Legacy) and Betty Fowler (DNA)—maintain close contact with groups like the Williamson County and Austin Genealogical Societies, both rich sources of information and speakers. The SIG's monthly meetings offer a wide variety of topics, including (but not limited to): how to navigate specific software; utilizing websites and blogs; developing your own website; ordering films from the LDS Family History Center, and access online indexed records (Genealogy SIG members frequently volunteer to index files for the LDS website). Speaker topics have included how to prepare for a research trip; which records to search, where to find them, and what information might be gleaned from each; and how to "read between the lines." The Genealogy SIG's web page lists educational opportunities, nearby genealogy resources, websites, research tips, regularly scheduled local meetings and notices of special events.

When many began tracing their families' roots in the 1970s, there were no genealogy database applications. A limited number of documents were stored on microfilm, but in-depth research often required writing numerous queries to genealogical publications or trips to courthouses and museums to review historic records. In 1983, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints (LDS) introduced its free PAF (Personal Ancestral File) genealogy management software. Followed by the release of Genealogical Data Communication (GEDCOM) in 1986, data from numerous different software programs was linked together, enabling users to review, save, and share a robust amount of information, and giving rise to the genealogy technology industry as we know it today.

Locating an ancestral family home can involve intricate research and lead to surprising results. Betty Jean began researching a man she thought might be the brother of an ancestor and discovered he had fought in the Civil War,

but hesitated to spend the money for his pension record. When she finally ordered the packet, she received a document that was an inch thick, as the man had applied and been turned down for his annuity numerous times. The documents did, however, verify his relation to Betty Jean, and provided additional information which led her to search other types of records. Betty Jean's hunt for further details ultimately led her to the discovery of relatives living in Germany.

"The Internet only accounts for ten percent of the information," says Betty Jean. "You still have to do physical visits." Visits could be as simple as a trip to your local library, so they may take you on unexpected journeys. Through an Internet query, Betty Jean found and shared information with a distant cousin online. The two met for the first time at the Stuttgart airport, then proceeded together to the village of Erlaheim. There, unable to locate anyone at the local church or priest's residence, they stopped to talk to a couple working in their garage. Betty and her cousin spoke no German, and the couple spoke little English, but the couple's surname was the one they were looking for. An English speaking couple, called in to translate, hosted a party attended by the entire village, whereupon Betty and



her cousin determined they were probably related to most of the village. Fourteen years later, they are all still in contact. Just as it can produce surprising and exciting discoveries, investigating one's own family history can also be a frustrating hobby, as researchers attempt to connect the dots between decades of evidence. For years, Bonnie believed that the couple listed as living next door to her third great grandmother, Susanna Margaret Wierman, might have been Susanna's parents. However, her only sources for this information were the 1840 and 1850 censuses, leaving Bonnie struggling to verify Susanna's relationship to the couple in question. Some time later, while doing research at a library in Ohio, Bonnie discovered that Samuel Gardner Wierman – her great grandmother's next door neighbor - had deeded a parcel of land to a Mrs. Susanna Smith. Though helpful, the deed did not specify that Susanna was Samuel's daughter, and could not provide Bonnie with the conclusive evidence she needed. "Then," says Bonnie, "I did something we should all do routinely - I looked Samuel up on Find-A-Grave." She emailed the site's administrator, Jim Wierman, who sent her copies of the Bible records naming Susanna as the daughter, and listing her husband John Smith and their first four children. However, because Susanna had been born when her family was en route to Ohio from Pennsylvania, there was no record of her birth in either state, taking Bonnie back to square one. "Don't give up," Bonnie adds – she hasn't.

In addition to research, many ancestral discoveries are made with the help of others who share an interest in genealogical histories. Sarah Christiansen, who maintains the SIG's web page, received an email through her own website from a previously unknown third cousin twice removed in Poland.

The cousin provided her with the names of their common ancestors and how she is descended from them. When Sarah announced her good fortune in being contacted because of her website, someone asked about the site. Sarah published its link, and soon thereafter, another person accessed her "Help Solve Mysteries" section with information on a similar story in her husband's family.

Recently, advances in medical technology have made tracing one's genetic heritage as easy moistening a cotton swab with saliva, allowing descendants to take a break from the traditional paper trail and consider a biology-based look at their ancestry. There are three types of DNA tests available for use in genealogical research: Y-DNA, autosomal, and mitochondrial. The Y-DNA test follows the direct paternal line. Because only men carry the Y chromosome, women are not included in this test. Autosomal testing looks at a mixture of both maternal and paternal DNA, and is unique to each person. Though this test is available to both men and women, the challenge is to determine whether an individual's genetic profile matches to someone in the maternal or the paternal line. The third type of test, mitochondrial, traces direct maternal lineage. This line consists entirely of women, although both men and women have their mother's mtDNA. A challenge with this test is that the female's surname changes with each marriage, though it can provide researchers with a very robust ancestral picture when coupled with traditional document research.

Although Betty Fowler's DNA test results were completed in July 2012, one of her biggest thrills came in April of 2013, when she received an email from a woman who had just received the results of her own test. A comparison of their genealogy research pointed them to a common ancestor, their great grandfather. When Betty mentioned through email exchanges that she had only one very faded photo of this ancestor, she received digital copies of two photos she would never have seen otherwise. "We never know who might have inherited a family Bible or photos, or who might have information that would further our research," Betty says, "and DNA testing for genealogy continues to provide new opportunities as more and more people are testing."

March Tips for a Beautiful Water Wise Landscape

It's springtime in our hearts (regardless of the temperature), so let's roll up our sleeves, sharpen our tools, dust off our sun hats, and get ready to get to work! As always, remember to avoid digging or walking on wet soil, as this will cause compaction.

Replacing turf with a drought tolerant bed will save you money on your water bill and reduce lawn maintenance. Prepare for the switch with a soil test. which will help determine the best treatment plan for your landscape. For many landscapes in our area, organic amendments are the key to improving moisture retention and providing essential nutrients. A good example of organic amendments in action can be found in the Master Gardener Earth-Kind rose bed at the Texas A&M AgriLIFE Extension. Planted with organic soil additives several years ago, the only maintenance it requires is replenishment of organic mulch and trimming in the spring – no additional fertilizer or use of any chemical required. In addition to healthy soil, putting the right plants in the right places will get your beautiful, drought-tolerant landscape off to the right start. Plants which are native or adapted to this area will be healthier for you and the environment, while also requiring less maintenance. To aid in your plant choices, the Sun City Garden Club has prepared a notebook titled, What Grows Here, obtainable at both the Texas Drive and Cowan Creek Monitors' Desks. Additionally, the Grow Green book, Native and Adapted Landscape Plants of Central Texas by the Texas AgriLIFE Extension and City of Austin is available for purchase from the Member Services Office.

March and early April are prime time for garden shows, gardening classes and plant sales! Take advantage of these opportunities, as well as the Sun City Garden Club monthly meetings, for fresh plants and information to enhance your landscape.

The following plant sales will have experienced gardeners available to help you with selection:

Ample water wise gardening ideas will be available during the Sun City Garden Tour, taking place Saturday, May 2 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., and Sunday, May 4, from noon to 3 p.m. Advance ticket sales will begin online at www.sctexas.org on March 2, under Buy Tickets.

MARCH GARDENING TIPS

- The average last date for frost in our area will be March 15.
- Avoid wounds on oak trees February through June. Beetles carrying a fungus are most active in periods of mild temperature.
- Divide summer and fall-blooming perennials when new shoots are about 3" tall.
- To encourage bushier, branching growth from high-growing herbaceous perennials, pinch back the leading shoot tips. Do this at least a month before flowering to reduce the plant's ultimate height by as much as a quarter.
- Top dress bulbs with compost to ensure good blooms next year. Remove spent flowers, but leave foliage until it dies back so bulbs can store enough energy to bloom next year.
- Turf: Aerate when soil is moist (but not wet) with a machine that removes plugs. Aerating followed by top dressing of compost allows some of the compost to filter into holes, amending soil texture. You can hire a contractor

or get together with neighbors to rent an aerator.

- Do not fertilize until after second mowing of grass.
- Fertilize Bermuda and St. Augustine in late March to early April. Buffalo and Zoysia should be fertilized in late April to early May. If you use top dressing, skip fertilization, as this would provide too much nitrogen. Overfertilization causes more leaf growth and less root growth, making plants more susceptible to drought.

The following is an informative and humorous approach to the subject of "pace of play," originally created by Betty Ann Preston, former chairperson of the Sun City Golf Committee and current president of WGA-9 Hole Club.

ell, it's that time of year again. Time for the annual reminder of Pace of Play and time for the annual "eye roll" because you don't think it pertains to you. In the past, some members have even said that it *couldn't* be them! "It's all the new folks."

Nightscape photographer Doug Farrell found the wilderness of northwestern Wyoming the perfect place to capture the core of the Milky Way galaxy.

n March 23, 1840, just one year after news of the daguerreotype reached America, chemist John William Draper positioned himself on the roof of New York University and took the first successful photograph of a celestial object: the moon. Draper's image (an impressive one, even by today's standards) ignited a flurry of interest in the astronomical possibilities of photography, and scientists, hungry for ever-more detailed images, became a driving force in the rapid advancement of camera technology. However, as astronomers turned their camera lenses ever-deeper into the universe, our ability to view the night sky unimpeded has diminished. Over the

years, the yellow haze of artificial light has become so commonplace that, for many, the standard night sky resembles an unplugged television, the former brilliance of distant galaxies blotted out by a fog of light. Here in Sun City, one photographer is determined to recapture some of the wonders that lie beyond our modern, incandescent veil.

"I'd always had an interest in astronomy, but I just never had the time," says Doug Farrell, a former engineer and computer programmer. "You can't really stay out late at night when you have to get up for work at four in the morning."

However, Doug knew he wanted to make the most of his time in retirement, and began developing a plan to follow his passions. "A couple years before I retired," he recalls, "I started to consider how I was going to focus my time." A casual photographer all his life, Doug buckled down on teaching himself the core concepts of the craft, reading books, attending workshops and seminars, and taking all the pictures he could to improve his general photo skills.

As his technique improved, his subject material became more particular. "There's so much to learn in every area, it really helps to focus on what speaks to you," says Doug. "I like to get out and shoot landscapes and wildlife, so I'm what you'd call a 'nature photographer'.

But even then, you're constantly discovering new things – it's a lifetime of learning, but that's one of the things I love about it."

Last July, Doug learned of a workshop that would allow him to combine his interest in astronomy with his photography practice, and jumped at the opportunity. Bracing himself for several long, sleepless nights, he gathered his gear and trekked out to the Grand Tetons National Park, lens aimed towards the sky.

Darkness is essential for nighttime photography, and out in the Wyoming wilderness, Doug found plenty of it. "When you're trying to capture starlight, patience is essential," he says. "Patience – and planning." When attempting to capture the core of the Milky Way (the galaxy's brightest portion), Doug had only a brief window of time before the rotation of the Earth would ruin his optimal shot. Weather, moonlight, even the time of year – these too can all have an impact on what can be seen in the night sky.


Of course, the darkness can work against you, too. Doug's images typically require a minimum exposure time of thirty seconds to capture the starlight. Sometimes, depending on what is being photographed, exposures can even be hours long, capturing the subtle movement of the horizon as it drifts overhead. Such long exposures make his camera extremely sensitive to light – even too much moonlight could blow out an entire photograph. "It helps to be away from people," says Doug, who once had a shot unexpectedly illuminated by the headlights of a passing car. Laughing, he adds, "It's not always that easy."

Back in Central Texas, the glittering intensity of the Milky Way disappears behind the glow of civilization. For Doug, however, the vast wonders of space are never too far away. Advances in technology have obscured the night sky our ancestors once knew, but it is also through technology that we are able to capture, observe, and understand our universe better than we ever have before. Now free to observe the night sky as he never could during his working years, Doug says he relishes the freedom to indulge in his passions and the ability to share his discoveries with others. Doug recalls an evening when his granddaughter joined him with his telescope. As she gazed through the scope, he directed her toward a particular point in the sky. Doug smiles as he tells the story. "I said, 'See that cluster of stars? That's twenty million light years away." Laughing, he asks, "Can you imagine something being that far away? Twenty million. For us to be able to see something like that, even for a moment, is unimaginable. But it's there, and tomorrow it will be there again, and that's amazing."

If you don't have a telescope, you can view the universe through Doug's eyes at the Round Rock Area Arts Council's seventh annual Imagine event, where three of his photographs will be on display through spring.

MARCH YARD OF THE MONTH JEFF AND WANDA KANODE • 520 DAVIS MOUNTAIN CIRCLE (N59)

Covering your outdoor plants when temps dive into the 20s? Finding winter days too cold to sit a spell on your patio? Jeff and Wanda worked with their yard designer to avoid such pinch points for their new home while constructing a landscape that deftly interfaces with the beauty around their property. As you exit the rear door of the new four season room, you step onto a massive rear patio. First impression tells you that Jeff and Wanda were not the first to build there. That honor goes to the blue heron, deer, owls, and a fleet of goldfinches working on lunch. These creatures make their home in the sizeable grove of mature trees complete with a creek that comprises the green belt behind the property. They focused on beauty along with low maintenance by including hardy plantings such as roses, rosemary and wax myrtle that tolerate both heat and cold. Pathways and patios have lights mixed in with the stone flooring, and two fire pits keep you warm and toasty in winter. Drip irrigation is incorporated across the landscape, even when it comes to refilling the fountains and the beautiful water wall. *Nancy Hontz*
